C. E. Hudson of San Angelo, president of the Goldthwaite Mercantile Co., was here the first of the week looking after business matters.

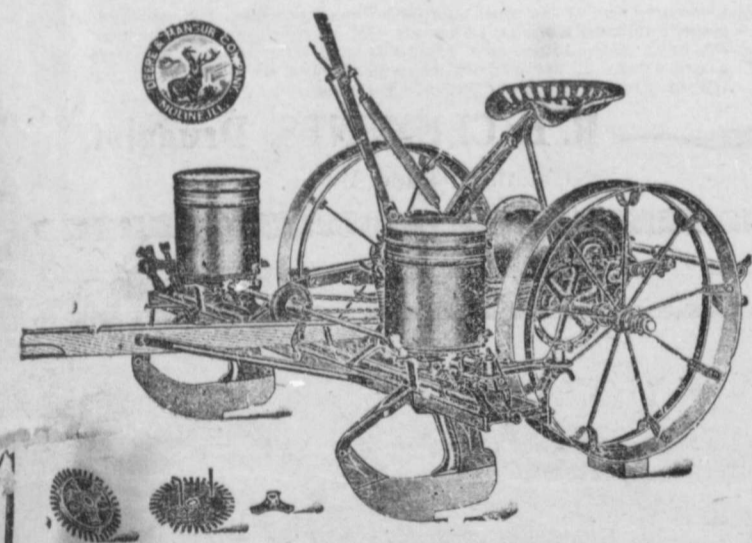
M. O. Kirkpatrick of Mullin had business in this city the first of the week.
