IRRIGATION MEETING.

The San Saba Colorado Irrigation association met in regular session at San Saba April 7, at 1 p. m. with President Joe A. Williams in the chair. On account of the inclement weather the attendance was small and the program, as previously arranged, was postponed until the next meeting.

Messrs. John Kelley and J. R. Cunningham were enrolled as members of this association.

A motion was unanimously adopted to ask the San Saba Fair association for space in which this association could make an exhibit of its products at the next fair to be held at San Saba, July 31 to August 3, and President Joe A. Williams and Secretary W. B. Leverett were appointed a committee to confer with said fair association with this object in view and report as early as practicable.

The sample of printed stationery submitted by the San Saba News was adopted with the word "pecans" added to the list, and it was also agreed that any member of this association might add his own or firm's business to said letter head.

A resolution was unanimously adopted that the members of this association are under many and lasting obligations to Hon. James L. Slayden, the Department of the Interior and to the Irrigation Bureau of the Department of Agriculture for the numerous favors extended in the way of bulletins and other publications, but especially for the personal services and instructions in practical irrigation given by Mr. H. Culbertson in the years 1904 and 1905.

By motion the secretary was instructed to furnish copies of these minutes to the San Saba and Goldthwaite papers with the request to publish same.

San Saba was chosen for the next meeting place and all members and all others interested are cordially invited to be present and participate in the proceedings. **JOE A. WILLIAMS, Pres.**

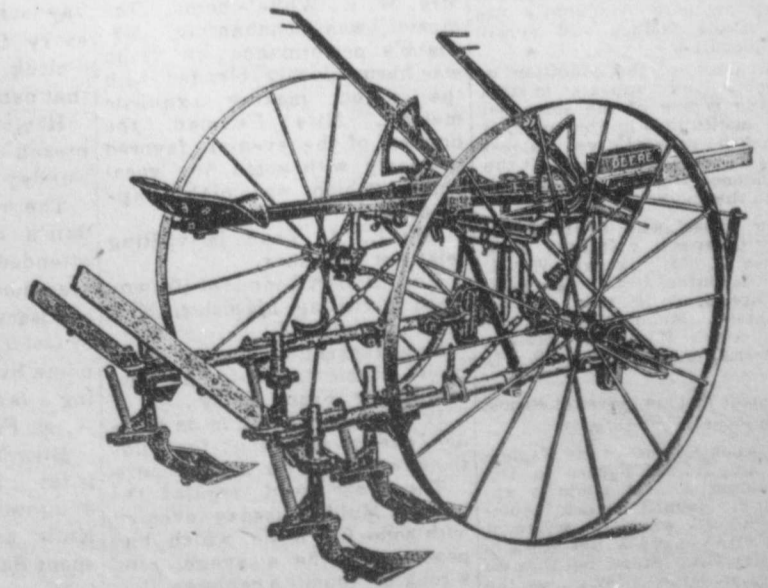
