Editor Eagle:

It is by request of many friends and promises on my part that I write to the Eagle and its many friends in regard to this country. The first thing we want to note is the difference in the growth of vegetation on the north and south of the high range of mountains, between the head waters of the Llano and Nueces rivers. As we came on the north side the grass and weeds had just begun to spring up and the mesquite flats were as black as in December and stood very thin until we passed Rock Springs in Edward county and started down the canyon to the Nueces river on the south side the change in the growth of vegetation was wonderful; down the southern slope a distance of fifty miles put us into grass and weeds about mouth deep, mesquite in full bloom and stock looked like mid-summer, and oats in full head and corn beginning to tassel, and at this writing is in full silk and tassel and looks fine with three-inch rain fall yesterday and the day before. So you see this country is sure for corn this year. This country from Uvalde to Prairieview in Dimmit county certainly is a fine stock and farming country, with both black wax and red sandy land with plenty of mesquite timber for fence post and fire wood. Some of it is very heavily timbered on the Leon river across the east end of Zavalla county. There is plenty mesquite two and a half feet through and forty foot high, the telephone post are mesquite. Thousands and thousands of this land has been sold in the last three months at \$3 per acre and is being put back on the market at \$5 per acre on easy terms.

Well, we arrived here the 27th of April and we are now building, fencing and grubbing while our stock is getting fat on the grass. We will go to planting cane and maize and melon seed next week. Well, the onions, the onions by the car load. The streets of Cotula are crowded with onion wagons every day, waiting for their turn to weigh and unload. Well, there is a great deal I would like to write, but I guess I had better close for fear of making this too long. With best wishes to the Eagle editor and its readers.

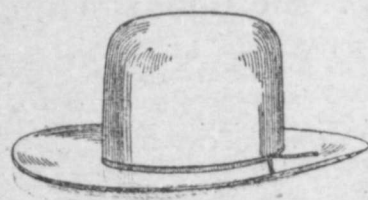

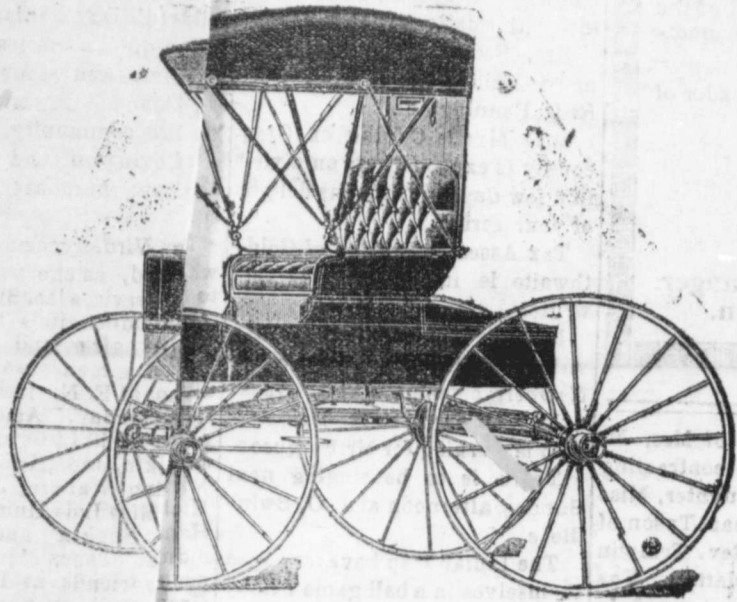

The boy was standing by the bars when a mule ran against them, causing one to strike him across the face and side of the head. He was rendered unconscious for a time, but he will soon be all right again.

Thursday afternoon Jim Tom Fox, son of Mr. D. Y. Fox, was returning from the South Bennett community, in company with his sister, Mrs. Elmer Queen and Miss Douglas Fox, when the horse turned the buggy suddenly and he was thrown to the ground. He did not appear to be hurt and came on to town in the buggy. Soon after reaching home he complained of being sick and in a short time he lost consciousness. A physician was called and in a few hours the young man was on the road to recovery.

COMMISSIONERS COURT.

Very little business was transacted in the court after the Eagle was put press last week.

The tax rate for 1906 was fixed as follows: 25 cents on \$100 valuation for general county purposes; 15 cents for court house bonds interest and sinking fund; 15 cents for road and bridge bonds interest and sinking fund; poll tax 25 cents; occupation tax one-half of amount imposed by the state.

A special tax of 20 cents on \$100 valuation was levied for school purposes in school districts of Williams Ranch, Evans and Big Valley; 150 on \$100 valuation for school districts of Live Oak, Washboard and Bull Springs.

M. H. Hill, who is blind, was allowed \$5 per month for his support. The court met in special session Thursday and is still in session checking over the tax rolls and making annual settlement with the collector.

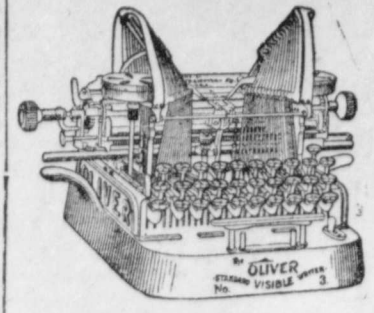
