and promises on my part that I write to the Eagle and its many friends in regard to this country.

The first thing we want to note is the difference in the growth of vegetation on the north and south of the high range of mountains, between the head waters of the Llano and Nueces rivers. As we came on the north side the grass and weeds had just begun to spring up and the mesquite flats were as black as in December and stock very thin until we passed Rock Springs in Edward county and started down the canyon to the Nueces river on the south side the change in the growth of vegetation was wonderful; down the southern slope a distance of fifty miles put us into grass and weeds shoe mouth deep, merquite in full bloom and stock looked like mid-summer. and oats in full head and corn beginning to tassel, and at this writing is in full eilk and tassel and looks fine with three-inch rain fall yesterday and the day before. So you see this country is sure for corn this year. This country from Uvalde to Prairieview in Dimmit county certainly is a fine stock and farming country, with both black wax and red sandy land with plenty of mesquite timber for fence post and fire wood, Some of it is very heavily timbered on the Leon river across the east end of Zavalla county, There is plenty mesquite two and a half feet through and forty foot high, the telephone post are mesquite.






