IRRIGATION.

Editor Eagle:
From time to time I have received many letters from the farmers living in my district urgently requesting me to secure, if possible, an order from the Department of Agriculture again assigning Mr. H. Culbertson, the irrigation expert, to work in the 14th Congressional district. Early in January I took the matter up with the Department, but found some difficulty in accomplishing the desire because of the very small amount of money available for irrigation work. Recently I received the following letter from Mr. Mead, chief of irrigation investigation.

House of Representatives.
Dear Sir:
Replying to your favor relative to having Mr. Culbertson detailed for work in the 14th Congressional district I will say that I feel that this work is of such practical value that we ought not to neglect it longer, and I am now looking for some one to take up Mr. Culbertson's present work. 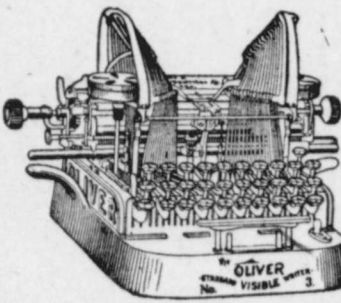

NEIGHBORING NEWS.

ITEMS CULLED FROM THE LEADING LOCAL PAPERS.

BROWNWOOD.

The executive committee of the Farmer's union warehouse met Saturday at which time about \$2000 of the required \$4000 was reported.

Lewis Joiner has sold his farm place, four miles south of town, to J. B. Jones, consideration \$5000. The place contains 240 acres of fine farming land.

Mrs. Ward of Lockhart and sister, Miss Minnie Clark, are here to spend the summer with their parents, J. S. Clark and family. Mrs. Ward is here for her health.

Inspector M. M. Warren, who made an examination of Brownwood with a view to recommending the establishment of free mail delivery, has reported unfavorable, and the chance of securing the service has passed until a more opportune time.

The city council met in adjourned session last night to further consider the matter of bids on the new dam to be erected across the Bayou. All bids were rejected because they were thought to be excessive, and the council decided to build the dam under their personal direction.

Judge M. M. Brooks, candidate for governor, delivered an address to the voters of Brown county at the court house Friday, which was very well attended and listened to with the closest of attention.

The Gulf, Brownwood and Cisco railroad company was formally organized Saturday afternoon. G. H. Connell was elected president; J. C. Weakley, vice president; J. A.
