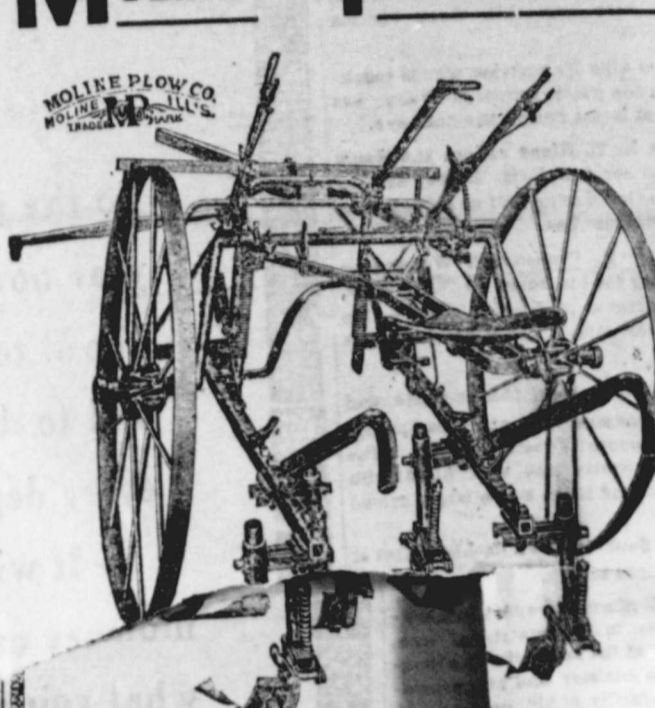
POSTOFFICE IMPROVEMENT.


