THINGS IN GENERAL.

The Texas legislature convened in regular session Tuesday. Hon. T. B. Love of Dallas was elected speaker of the house of representatives. Governor and Mrs. Lanham will return to their home at Weatherford to reside. A Mexican revolutionary junta was organized by prominent Mexicans at San Antonio this week. A young man was arrested in Beaumont this week for collecting subscriptions for a paper in that town without authority. The strike of the firemen and clerks on the Southern Pacific railroad was declared off by those organizations this week. Andrew Carnegie has given \$50,000 to build a Creek memorial hall at Okmulgee, I. T., in honor of the Indian chief Eparhaokor. The Fort Worth Telegram office was badly damaged by fire Saturday morning and the paper has since been issued from the office of the Record. An engine on the Houston and Texas Central railroad exploded while standing on the siding at Curry, a small station near Corsico, the fireman was killed and the engineer was badly hurt. Arnold Kingcade was arrested in Chicago this week on a charge of attempting to pass counterfeit money. After being arrested he stated that he was wanted at several places in Texas on similar charges. The manager of a theatre in Dallas was arrested last Sunday for violating the Sunday law and the house was closed. There were 2000 people in the audience when the performance was stopped by the officers. A young man at Paris was amusing himself by firing his pistol as he was returning home from a party Monday night. Finally it failed to fire and as he looked into the barrel the charge exploded and he was killed instantly. The election in Travis county last Saturday gave a majority against Senator Bailey. The election that was order in McLennan county to determine the sentiment of the people in the Bailey controversy has been called off.

Emperor William of Germany is sent an officer of his government to the United States to study the commercial and financial conditions of this country. He is also sending, at his own expense, six army officers to this country to travel several months for general benefit. Assistant Attorney General Purdy has returned to Washington after spending some time in Texas investigating the Brownsville trouble of several months ago, wherein the negro soldiers went on a rampage, shot up the town and killed one man. He came as the representative of President Roosevelt. The papers that are continually fighting the mail order business are wasting time, energy and space in a cause without effect. The mail order houses get business because they advertise and make the public believe they sell goods cheaper than the home merchant. That's all there is to it.—Wills Point Chronicle. B. G. Sweet of Brownwood and C. A. Doose of Ballinger and their associates have purchased the Houghton & Robinson ranch, containing 15,000 acres, paying \$150,000. The rich and fertile body of land is situated in Runnels and Coke counties, and the waters of the historic Colorado flow through it.—Brownwood News. The Wells Fargo Express company's office in Dallas was robbed by two young men on Dec. 30 of a package containing \$2000 consigned to a bank in Dallas. A young man was arrested in that city this week and admitted that he was one of the robbers. He gave the name of his confederate and said the other fellow had taken \$1700 of the money and gone to St. Louis. Dr. Shirley Bragg, president of the convict board of Alabama, in a report to the governor of that state, says humanely would be best served if the jails in the state were burned. Says he: "It would be more humane and far better to stake the prisoners out, with a ring about their necks, like wild animals, than to confine them in places that we call jails, that are reeking with filth and disease and alive with vermin of all kinds. In many jails men and women remain for months without means for washing their faces and hands."

DEATH'S VISITS.

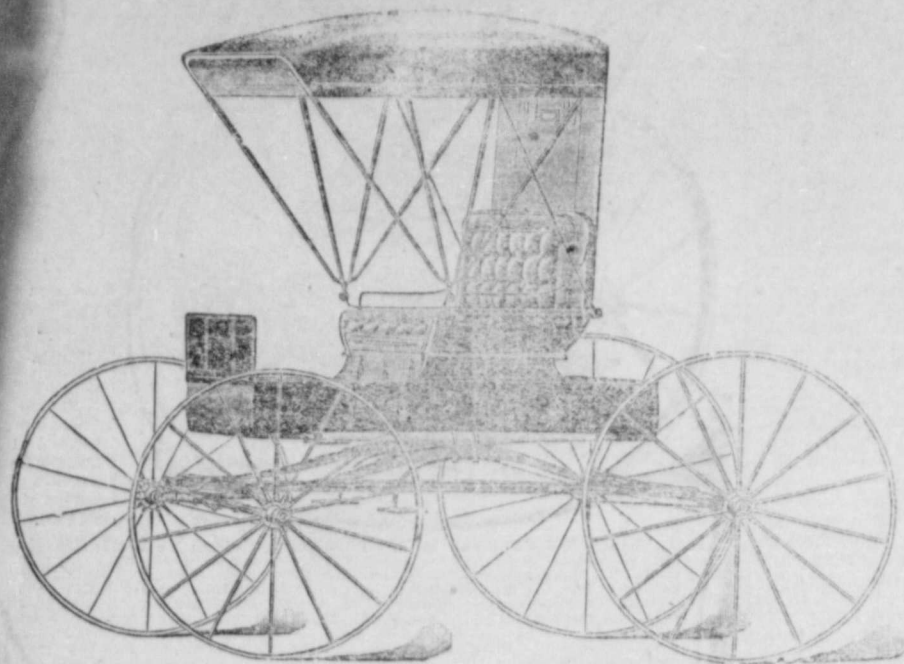

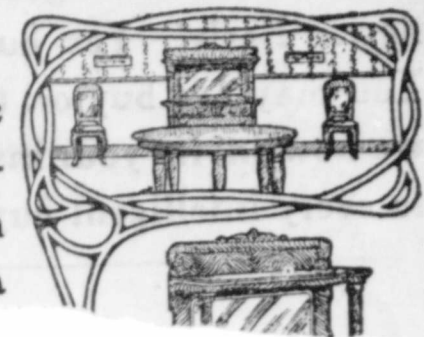

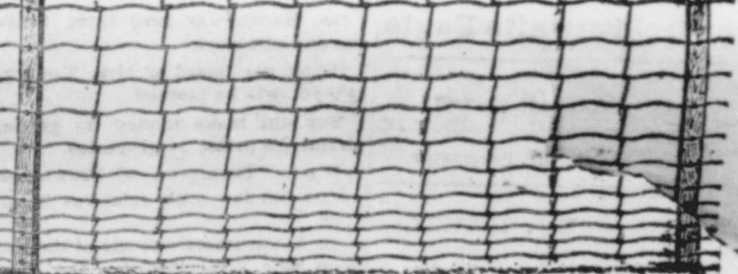
BUSINESS CHANGE.
