THINGS IN GENERAL.

Hon. Thomas M. Campbell was inaugurated governor of Texas Tuesday.

Nearly 1000 indictments have been returned against the oil trust in Ohio.

Anti-trust suits have been instituted in Mississippi for penalties aggregating \$11,000,000.

Don Gray of Valley Springs, Llano county, shot and killed Will Phillips in that community Saturday.

A man was convicted in Brownwood last Friday of selling liquor in a prohibition town and was fined \$100 and given 60 days in jail.

Mrs. Joe Mahoney of Venus, Johnson county, shot and killed her husband, from whom she had been separated. She surrendered to the officers at Cleburne and was released on \$1000 bond.

An article by Andrew Carnegie, published in the Review of Reviews, expresses the belief that a millionaire should share his fortune with the poor, but with the limitation that the division should not be made until after the millionaire's death.

The residence committee of the Methodist church, which was appointed to purchase a home for Bishop Hoss, has sold the property for \$7000 that was purchased in Oak Cliff. This is understood to mean that the bishop will not reside in Texas.

A special from Austin Monday says: Hon. P. H. Clements made the point, when the mileage and per diem bill was called up, that there was no law under which the legislators could draw mileage and per diem. There is a maximum mileage and per diem rate fixed by the constitution and the legislature of 1876 passed a bill fixing the rate, but in the revision of 1879 the law was left out of the statutes. Mr. Clements has pending a bill fixing the mileage and per diem of members of the legislature.

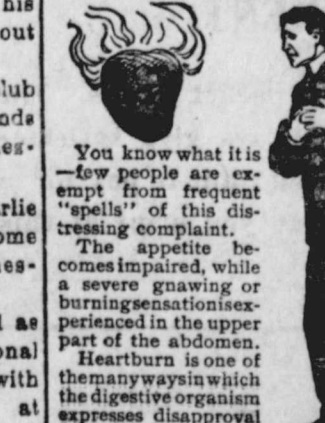

SALARIES OF PREACHERS.

Editor Eagle:

Will you please allow me through the columns of your good paper to correct an impression that may have been unintentionally made in this way: 1st. In the program of our recent fifth Sunday meeting held at Mullin I was on the program to open the discussion of the subject, "Is it scriptural for ministers to demand a stipulated salary for their services." This program was published in the Eagle.

2nd. In the Eagle of Jan. 5, we have a write up of the Mullin meeting by Bro. J. H. Smith in which he says, (with reference to the discussion of the subject which was assigned to me) "after much discussion over a subject on which we were all agreed, the final outcome was about this: that it was scriptural; that Paul did demand it of the churches of Macedonia, etc." Now, I want to say to one and all that on account of my ill health I was not able to attend the meeting, and therefore, did not agree in the discussion, and in the next place I feel just like I want everybody that knows me to know that there is one little old Baptist preacher in Mills county, Texas, that still holds to the old Baptist doctrine, that it is unscriptural and inconsistent with the teaching of Baptist "to wit," (that the Holy Spirit directs the church in the call of the pastor and also directs the pastor in accepting the call of the church.) Now, if this position of Baptists is true for a minister to demand a stipulated amount before he will accept the call of a church, which is directed by the Holy Spirit, and he himself having been called of God by the Spirit to preach the gospel and also impressed to accept the call of this church, to stop and first demand that a certain amount of money be paid him or secured to be paid, or he will not preach for them, to me it does not appear to be consistent, if further looks to me as though he really cares more for the dollars than he does for the direction of the Spirit or the souls of men. Next, is it scriptural? Brethren, I cannot find it if it is. I find that Paul preached at Corinth for over one year and six months and made tents for his living. See Acts 18th chapter 1:3-11 verses and 18th verse; again in 20th chapter Acts 18th verse we

find Paul preached at Ephesus for three years, 34th verse he says, "His own hands had made his living," in the 35th verse he says, (and he was talking to preachers) "I have showed you all things how that so laboring ye ought to support the weak and to remember the words of the Lord Jesus, how He said it is more blessed to give than to receive." In 2 Thes. 3:7-8 verses he says, "For yourselves know how ye ought to follow us, for we behaved not ourselves disorderly among you; neither did we eat any man's bread for nought but wrought with labor and travail night and day that we might not be chargeable to any of you." Again in 1st Thes. 2nd chapter 9th verse he says: "For ye remember brethren, our labor and travail for laboring night and day because we would not be chargeable unto any of you, we preached unto you the gospel of God." Many other scriptures might be given, but certainly these do show that Paul did not preach for a stipulated salary. One more and I will close. 1st Peter 5:1-2 reads, "The elders which are among you I exhort, who am also an elder and a witness of the sufferings of Christ and also a partaker of the glory that shall be revealed, feed the flock of God which is among you taking the oversight thereof not by constraint, but willingly; not for filthy lucre but of a ready mind." Brethren, place your own construction on this last scripture, but allow me to believe that it forbids the accepting of the pastoral care of a church for a stipulated amount.

I thank Brother Smith for his good article; it made me feel that I had missed much in not being at the Mullin meeting. I further wish to say I have not written this for controversy, but I do wish to be understood on this great question. I hope I may not be misunderstood with reference to the just compensation of the ministers, who lovingly preach the gospel for the good of souls. We should stand by them and see that they lack for nothing, but communicate unto them all good things. Gal. 6:6. Fraternally,

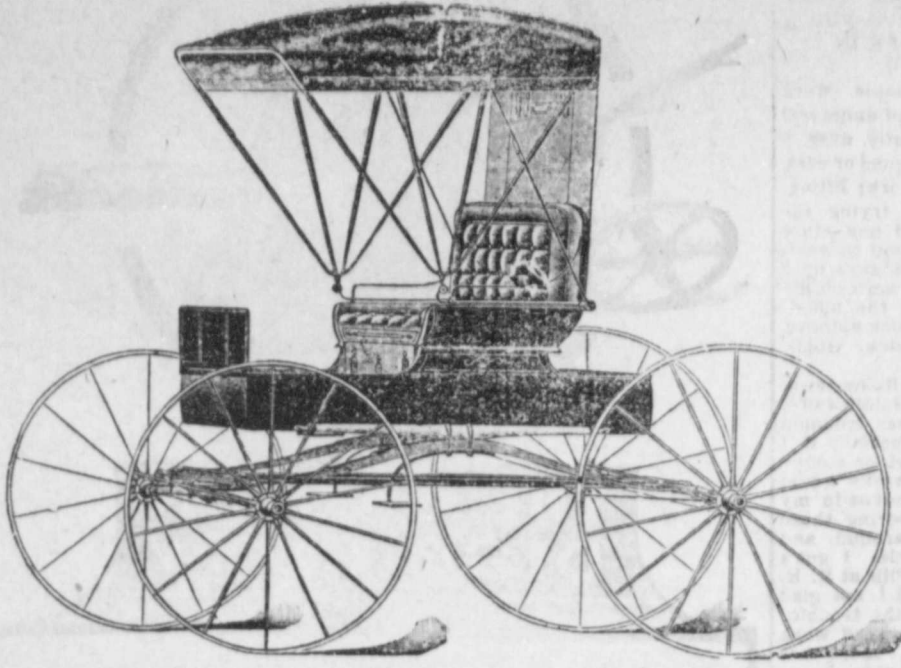
