The reports of county and precinct officers were examined and approved.

The allowance made to M. H. Hill was increased to \$7.50 per month.

Allowance to Harriet Harman as an indigent was discontinued.

M. J. Strickland was appointed constable of precinct No. 1, and his official bond was approved.

The sum of \$9.90 was returned to J. T. Tubbs, he and Capt. Street having paid that amount of taxes on the same tract of land.

The resignation of Henry Morris as constable of precinct No. 2 was received and accepted.

The annual report of Dr. E. M. Wilson, treasurer of Goldthwaite school district, was examined and found correct.

NARROW ESCAPE.

SCHOOL BOARD.

The school board held a meeting last Friday night and transacted routine business and the following accounts were allowed: J. H. Kelly, repairs on building, \$107.95; account for globes, etc., \$6; Urbach Bros., pump stand, work, etc., \$9.95; Prof. Price, fixing stoves, etc., \$4; insurance on building, \$37.50.

The treasurer was instructed to pay building bond No. 7, which was the last outstanding bond, and the school district is now entirely free from debt.

It was learned that the board could not order an election on a bond issue without being petitioned to do so, hence the matter was deferred.

The board held a meeting this week and ordered the election to be held March 26 and appointed Jas. Rahl presiding officer and appropriated \$20 to pay the expenses of the election.

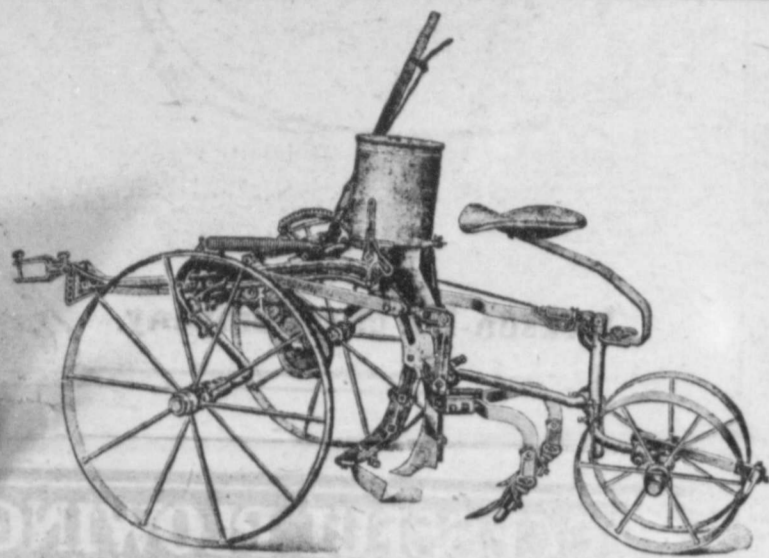

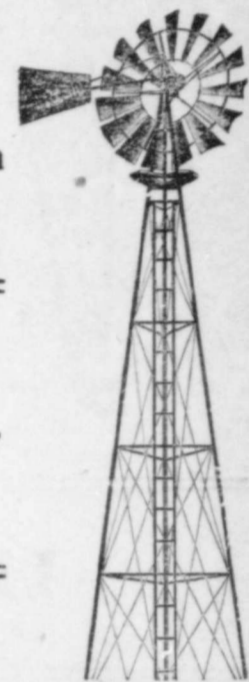

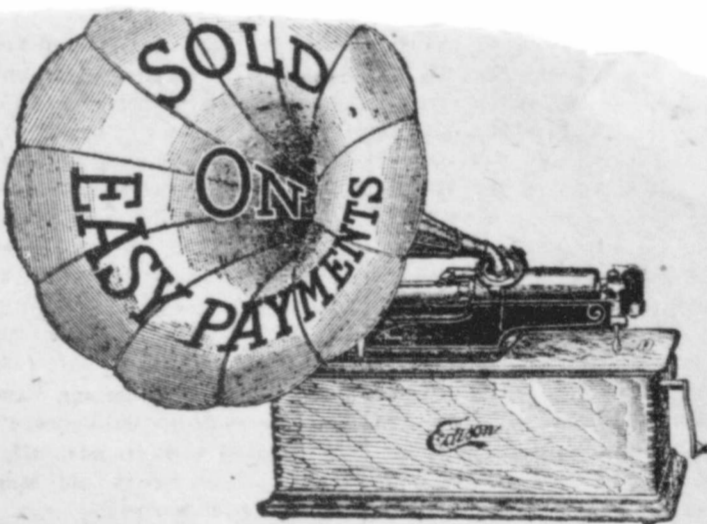
