AN INTERESTING TALK.
PRESIDENT CALVIN GIVES MUCH NEEDED INFORMATION TO THE PEOPLE.
If anybody has had the idea that the Farmers Union was antagonistic to the business interests of the country or was seeking to tear down any line of business or industry, that idea was certainly dispelled Monday afternoon, when State President E. A. Calvin made a masterly speech in the court house to a large audience.
The hour for the speaking was fixed at 2 o'clock and a few moments after that time President J. D. Ryan of Mills County Farmers Union, called the house to order, and Secretary W. A. Bayley introduced Mr. Calvin in a short and appropriate address.
Mr. Calvin is not a politician or a professional speaker, but he is a farmer in Lamar county and understands the needs and environments of the farmers of the South. He is a man of experience and observation and has made a careful study of the objects of the Farmers' Union and know what that organization has accomplished. He interspersed enough of pleasant in his talk to prevent it becoming dry, but he made every anecdote illustrate some truth he wished to impress upon his hearers. He said the Farmers Union was no fighting the commercial interests of the south, but were fighting for them and all other interests of the great cotton growing section. He showed how the work of the organization had already been beneficial to the entire country and explained the advantages of the warehouse system. His remarks elicited frequent applause and his entire speech was free from any kind of unpleasant comparison or any unnecessary rebuke. He simply wanted to convince the farmers that it was to their interest and the interest of their country to organize and be in position to protect themselves and benefit the people of the South.

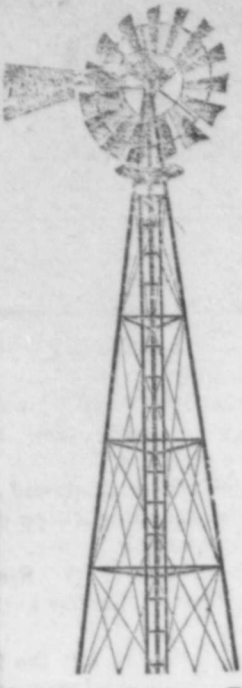

Editor Eagle: We have been thinking some time of writing to the dear Old Bird, and we decided to put our thoughts into action this beautiful sunny morning.

We had a fine rain last Friday night, which was appreciated by everyone. The ground was getting almost too dry to plow.

The ground is covered with green grass and wild flowers. The winter has been so mild that the Buffalo grass was not killed to the ground and since the rain the green sprouts have put out at every point from six to twelve inches. And now you can see green bunches of grass about an inch scattered all over the prairie. The fruit trees are in full bloom and the air is filled with the sweet perfume of the spring flowers.

People are busy breaking land and planting corn, maize and alfalfa. Some have planted their gardens and a few of the vegetables are coming up. Health is very good with the exception of a few cases of measles and lagrippa. Our school has been stopped for an indefinite time on account of them.

This country is settling up very fast. Carpenters are kept busy all the time. We can stand in one place and count fifty-two houses that have gone up since the first of November, and that is eight miles from a town. How is that for west Texas.

We will soon have a railroad in Scurry county. They have the grading almost completed. The cars will be running from Roscoe to Snyder by the 1st of July. The railroad men have put headlights on their large scrapers and work at night. The road runs angling across the county. It starts in at the southeastern corner and runs to the northwestern part. That gives Scurry county a considerable mileage of railroad.

A new town called Hurlough has been surveyed about three miles from here on the railroad. A national bank has already been chartered for the place. Since we moved here in August land has advanced from \$10 to \$30 per acre.

Snyder, the county seat of Scurry county, has a population of about 3000. Over 200 resident houses have gone up in the last six months. A new eight or ten thousand dollar concrete hotel is just being completed, and four concrete business houses are being built now.

There is a steam laundry just gone up this winter and will soon have an ice factory and electric light plant.
