THINGS IN GENERAL.

The public school building at Gatesville was burned a few nights ago and the indications are that it was the work of an incendiary. The building cost \$25,000.00 and was insured for \$15,000.00.

The sentence of death imposed on Mrs. Aggie Myers of Kansas City and Frank Hottman of Higginsville, Mo., who were convicted of having murdered the woman's husband in 1904, have been commuted to imprisonment for life by Governor Folk.

At the last term of district court in McCulloch county two cases were tried wherein a club man at Mercury was charged with violating the prohibition law. He was proven guilty in both cases and fined \$85 and forty days in jail in one case and \$75 and forty days in jail in the other.

A two days' session of a good roads convention was held at Comanche last week. An address by President Moore of the National Good Roads association was a feature of the meeting. Over 1,000 farmers from all over the county attended the meetings and a county association with over 200 members was formed.

The Tom Green County Medical society has passed a resolution to memorialize the city council to instruct and authorize the city physician to fumigate and disinfect premises occupied by tubercular patients. The resolution also requests that physicians, hotel and boarding house keepers report promptly to the city physician all cases of tuberculosis coming under their observation.

News of the death in Hong Kong, China, of Bishop James N. Fitzgerald of the Methodist church was received a few days ago. Pleurisy was the cause of death. The bishop's home was in St. Louis. Bishop Fitzgerald, who was one of the general superintendents of the Methodist church, was engaged in making one of the quadrantal visits

to make to the mission stations at the time of his death. He was 60 years of age and was elected bishop in 1888.

The members of the committee of insurgents with whom Secretary Taft and Assistant Secretary of State Bacon made arrangements for peace in September last in Cuba, had a conference with the secretary Monday. Secretary Taft, in spite of the request of the committee, refused to give his visitors the date of the withdrawal of the American forces from Cuba. There is a general impression gathered by what Secretary Taft said that the American occupation of Cuba will last for another year at least.

Jacob Seehler Coxe, of the Coxe army of 1894, is planning another great national crusade, on new and sensational lines and he may commence operations during the present year. In an interview in New York he said: "I am preparing to take up my campaign of education where I was forced to leave it several years ago. I shall conduct this campaign on new and original lines, and in a way that will attract the attention of the nation. I will travel on an entire train of cars, and with a tent capable of seating many thousands. This country is becoming ripe for just such a great movement."

A prominent society woman of Tulsa, Ok., was dangerously injured to that city Sunday by bites from six ravenous dogs, which were fighting on a business street. She was attempting to pass the dogs, when a quick turn by the yelping aggregation caught her in its midst. She was bitten in a dozen places. It is feared that the dogs may have had hydrophobia.

A member of the United States engineer corps who has charge of building the dams in the Ohio and Allegheny rivers, in the vicinity of Pittsburgh, Pa., has submitted a report to the government in connection with the recent flood. He says that Pittsburgh, like Johnstown, is in danger of devastation some day by a flood of overflowing the levee of thousands of lives and millions of dollars worth of property.

Rain is needed in nearly every part of Texas.

A prohibition election is to be held in Fort Worth April 27.

The explosion of a gasoline stove caused \$200,000 loss by fire in Galveston Monday.

Capt. D. B. Wilson, a prominent man of Kaufman county, suicided at his farm near Terrell by shooting himself.

The new city charter of Fort Worth requires the saloons to close at midnight and remain closed until 5 o'clock in the morning.

Jason Wilson of Mullin was in Zephyr yesterday on business. John Grundy, a horse buyer of Goldthwaite, was here Saturday. Rev. Moon, of Mullin, preached at the Methodist church Sunday night. His sermon was very interesting. Rev. L. J. Vann and wife of Mullin, spent Sunday in our city.—Zephyr Mirror.

CITY COUNCIL.

The city council met Tuesday night and completed the business of the outgoing administration and the oath of office was administered to some of the newly elected officers. All of them who were elected last week have now entered upon their duties. Mayor Smith and Alderman Bodkin being the last to qualify and they were duly installed Wednesday.

At the council meeting reports were received from the collector and treasurer. They showed a balance on hand of \$933.41. City Marshall Fox was allowed \$120 balance due him for salary, and he was paid \$23.24 commission on collections of taxes.

The account of City Secretary Miller for \$24.75 for four months services was ordered paid.

A loan of \$50 was made the street fund from the general fund.

The city marshal was authorized to employ a scavenger temporarily until the council could make a selection.

UNION MEETING.

The Mills county Farmers Union met with Cold Springs local April 4, 1907. Most of the locals of the county were represented and a report from the different locals shows the Union to be in very good condition.

Some very important subjects were discussed, considerable business was transacted and I think a great deal of good was accomplished.

Cold Springs local took in nine new members while we were with them. The people are just beginning to see that co-operation is the only salvation for the farmers and the South in general.

The people of Cold Springs know how to make the delegates and visitors feel welcome and the ladies of that community have our thanks for the nice dinner that was spread for us.

Peace and harmony prevailed and the Union adjourned to meet with Fisher local the first Tuesday in July. S. J. COOKRELL.

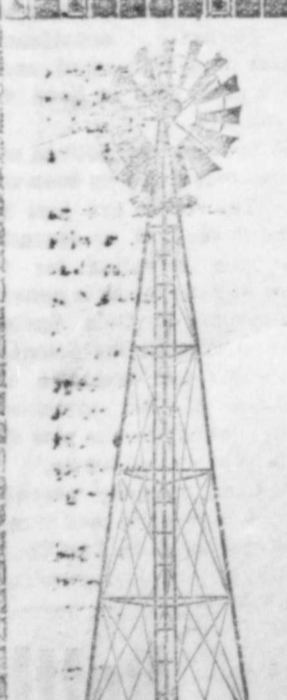

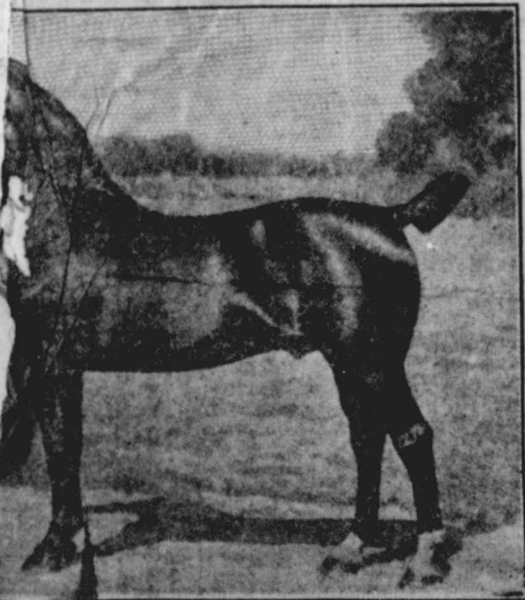

NEW ROAD LAW.

The law creating a more efficient road system in Mills county has been signed by the governor and as it carries the emergency clause it is now in full force in this county.

This law makes each commissioner ex-officio road commissioner and allows him \$2.50 per day for his services, provided he does not receive more than \$240 for such service in any one year. He is allowed to have a deputy to do the work if he so desires, but in that case the deputy gets the pay. The commissioners court is to continue to exercise general supervision over the road work in the county and can open and close roads at will and may work roads and build bridges by contract.

Each commissioner has supervision over the road overseers in his precinct. Any person appointed road overseer who fails to perform the duties is liable to a fine of \$25, unless he has a valid excuse. Each overseer shall be allowed \$1.50 per day for all work on the road except for the five days required by law, provided he does the extra work by instruction of the commissioner. All tools, machinery, etc., necessary for the work that may be owned by the county shall be delivered to the road overseer, who shall give a receipt for it and shall not allow its use for private purposes.

A man liable for road duty has the privilege of paying \$3 on or before February 1st to the commissioner of his precinct or to the county treasurer and receiving therefor a receipt which will exempt him from road duty for the current year and persons who fail to pay poll tax shall be liable for three days extra road duty.

All money collected from those liable for road duty shall be placed to the credit of the precinct in which they reside and all changes and new roads shall be paid for out of funds belonging to the precinct where the roads are located.

The commissioners court has power to order an election to determine whether or not a tax of 15 cents of the \$100 valuation

of property shall be levied in the county and this special tax does not exempt from road duty those who pay it. In this connection it is understood that the court now has in contemplation the ordering of such election and the proclamation will probably be issued next week.

The State of Texas, County of Mills: Be it remembered, that on this 29th day of March, 1907, there was begun and holden at the court house of Mills county, in the town of Goldthwaite, in Mills county, in pursuance of a call made by Hon. L. E. Patterson, county judge in and for Mills county, Texas, on the 25th day of March, 1907, a call session of said court for the purpose of reforming an order of the Commissioners Court of Mills County, Texas, made and entered in said court on the 19th day of October, 1905, declaring the result of an election held in and throughout the said county for the purpose of enabling the voters of said county to determine whether or not intoxicating liquors shall be sold throughout the said county, and which election is of record in the Minutes of the said Commissioners Court in Vol. Three pages 43 and 44; the following officers were present and participating to wit: L. E. Patterson, County Judge, presiding; M. O. Humphreys, County Commissioner Precinct No. One; J. F. Jones, County Commissioner Precinct No. Two; J. A. Fletcher, County Commissioner Precinct No. Three; and S. L. Cook, County Commissioner Precinct No. Four; E. G. Overford, County Clerk, and E. O. Small, sheriff, when the following proceedings were had, to wit:
In the Local Option Election, Mills County, Texas, it is remembered that whereas the Commissioners Court of Mills County, Texas, met and was in special session, on the 19th day of October, 1905, for the purpose of opening the polls and counting the votes of the special election therefor, and that the said election was held on the 17th day of October, 1905, for the purpose of determining whether or not the sale of intoxicating liquors should be prohibited within the limits of Mills county, Texas, as provided in Title LXXIX, of the Revised Civil Statutes of Texas, and thereupon the court in open session opened the polls and counted the votes as the same were returned by the proper officer of each voting precinct, in and throughout said county, as required by law; and therefrom it appearing to the court that the total number of votes cast at said election was seven hundred and thirty nine, and that five hundred and thirty two of said votes were cast for prohibition, and that two hundred and seven of said votes were cast against prohibition, and it further appearing to the court that the result of said election was that a majority of said votes were cast in favor of prohibition, and the result of said election was therefore as declared in the order of prohibition; and whereas the order declaring the result of said election was probably improperly entered, and the election therefrom probably not properly made; therefore, it is ordered and decreed by the Commissioners Court of Mills County, Texas, that the sale of intoxicating liquors within the limits of Mills County, Texas, be and the same is hereby absolutely prohibited, except for the purposes and under the regulation prescribed in Title LXXIX, of the Revised Civil Statutes of Texas, until such time as the qualified voters of said county may at a legal election held for that purpose by a majority of the votes decide otherwise. And it is further ordered by the court that this order declaring the result of said election and prohibiting the sale of such intoxicating liquors within the limits of Mills County, Texas, be published for four successive weeks in some news paper published in Mills County, Texas, and that the same be published by the County Judge of Mills County, Texas, for that purpose, and that the fact of said publication shall be entered by the said County Judge upon the minutes of the Commissioners Court, and that there upon the said election shall become operative.
It is further ordered by the court that the record of election returns Volume one, page fifty five, be and the same be forthwith made a part of the court records.
