A permit has been granted a

Judge John W. Goodwin is being favorably mentioned as a suitable candidate for member of the court of civil appeals.

Officers made a raid on the five club rooms of Brownwood a few days ago and the stock and fixtures of each and every club were confiscated and hauled out on floats.

Reports from all parts of Kansas, western Missouri, Oklahoma and Indian Territory indicate almost complete destruction by frost of tree fruit crops and serious injury to bush fruits, grapes and strawberries.

A special train carrying a large number of Shriners on an excursion wrecked at Hondo. Cal., Saturday afternoon and 85 people were killed outright and pounds. many others were fearfully injured and many more deaths were expected.

shall be expended in the territory in which it is yoted, and no other, and this provision of the constitution shall be self-enacting without the necessity of further legislation. PROPOSED AMENDMENT TO THE STATE CONSTITUTION PROVIDING FOR THE CREATION OF IMPROVEMENT DIS-TRICTS IN CERTAIN CITIES

Joint resolution amending Section 9, of Article 8, of the constitution of the state of Texas, providing for the creation of improvement districts in cities of more than five thousand inhabitants, and charging the cost of certain improvements made therein

against the abutting property.
Section 1. Be it resolved by the legislature of the state of Texas:
That Section 9 of Article 8 of the constitution of the state of Texas, be so amended as to hereafter read as

follows:
Sec. 9 The state tax on property, exclusive of the tax necessary to pay the public debt, and of the taxes provided for the benefit of public free schools, shall never exceed thirty-five cents on the one hundred dollars valuation; and no county, city or town shall levy more than twenty-five cents for city or county porposes, and not exceeding fifteen cents for roads and bridges and not exceeding fifteen cents to pay jerors, on the one hundred dol-lars valuation, except for payment of debts incurred prior to the adoption of the amendment September 25, A. D. 1883, and for the erection of public buildings, streets, sewers, water works and other permanent improvements, not to exceed twenty-five cents on the one hundred dollars valuation, in any one year, and except as is in this constitution other-wise provided; and the legislature that a majority of the qualified prop erty tax paying yoters of the county voting at an election to be held for that purpose shall yote such tax, not to exceed fifteen cents on the one hundred dollars valuation, of the property subject to taxation in such county.
