Prehistoric Picture Gallery.

A picture gallery that dates from the stone age has been unearthed in a cavern near Evzies, France. The pictures, which are all of prehistoric animals, were not only cut in the rock, as is usually the case with such representations, but were painted in several colors, and given some evidence of artistic skill. There are eighty pictures, of which forty-nine represent bisons of various kinds. The pigments used, which are shades of red and brown, have been found, an analysis of Moissan, the eminent French chemist, to be ochres mixed with minute fragments of transparent silica.

Editor Eagle:

The distance from here to Texas is great, but not great to cause me to forget my native land, and while there is a vast difference in this country and that, the difference is such as to make a Texan want to be back in the balmy breezes and sunny clime of Texas; especially on this the 24th of May we are bogging around here in 12 inches of snow and it looks like now that the dose would be repeated before night.

My brother-in-law, Rev. I. Lamb, and I left Fort Worth on the 30th of April and reached the Plains that night. At Amarillo we found the ground covered with snow, and we have not been out of sight of snow since. Our trip through New Mexico, Colorado and Utah was grand indeed, the high mountains, deep gorges and long tunnels are too numerous to mention in detail, but will try to describe faintly the grand canyon of Colorado. We entered this canyon about 1:30 o'clock in the evening and went out about 8 o'clock, mountain time one hour slower time than ours. We entered the gorge at Canyon City, a beautiful little city of perhaps three thousand. It looks to be clean and a nice place to live, if one wants to be in sight of beautiful grove, in hearing of tumbling waters and under the shadow of vast mountains; it is in the fertile valley of the Arkansas river. At this place the valley stops and the grand canyon commences. The railroad runs on the right bank of the river and sometimes near the water's edge, the mountain rising up almost perpendicular for thousands of feet it seems, and the over-hanging rocks look dangerous. The road winds its way up the gorge for some fifty miles at one place. The canyon has an iron bridge across it to catch the falling stones. As we came through it was snowing on the south side and the sun shining on the north side; some places we could not see the top of the mountain for the snow storm raging there; sometimes we would come to a few acres of fertile land and there would be a cabin or two apparently separated from the outside world, living a hermit life. All heads were at the windows, but none dared to stick his head out for fear of coming in contact with over-hanging rocks. Then comes two short whistles from the engine, but none knew its meaning, and all at once it would be dark as Egypt; the ladies would scream not knowing what had happened, some would laugh and I suppose the lovers aboard would be kissing; but ye scribe confesses the first time we entered into darkness that he was a little scared. At Salids, a mining town at a wide place in the canyon, a stop was called and twenty minutes given to get supper, but the writer being a little slow failed to reach the counter in time to be served before the time was up to move on, but he could console himself in knowing that he was not the only hungry man on the train, but some fared worse than others for the train left them at

the counter, but as our train was a tourist train running in about five sections, they boarded the next train and overtook us at Junction City. Soon night came on and the grand visions were shut out from view and we settled down for a night's repose.

The next day we were in Utah, and so hungry we could not enjoy the sights until we got breakfast, which was at 11 o'clock. At Helper we managed to be on the front car steps and well gaunted for a run of a half mile to get a 75c breakfast, and we sure won the race and ye scribe and his preacher companion got a half chicken a piece for our share besides what other stuff we consumed. From here we went up the Spanish Fork; almost as fine scenery as the grand canyon. At Soldiers Summit we were on the highest point that we would reach in Utah. Here we stopped for ten minutes to view the sights and for the northern people to play a game of snow ball, but as we were so much higher than Texas and our hearts thumping like an air pump, we did not indulge lest we should slip off the mountain top and land in New Mexico or Salt Lake City alone and among strangers. We reached Salt Lake City at about 3:30 o'clock. It is a beautiful city, but not as much up-to-date as some of our Texas cities as to residences. Got into Ogden at 5:30 o'clock and lay over until 1 o'clock next morning. At 1 o'clock next day we reached Palasaid, 84 miles from our destination; passed the night there and left the next morning for Eureka on the narrow gage railroad. It took us all day to come 84 miles; the fare is ten cents per mile and it has but two depots, one at Palasaid and the other at Eureka. We found everything alright and the mines that our uncle left us to be very valuable property. They have yielded thousands of dollars in the past and have only commenced to be worked compared to what they will yet yield. There are three of them, so ye scribe feels a little up in the world as well as ten thousand feet up in the air. They are rich in the quality of ore and it gets richer the deeper they go and the larger the pockets. Plenty of timber for timbers in the mines, also for fire wood, consisting of pine, cedar and mahogany. We have been working in the mine for several days and have learned to find our way through its many tunnels and shafts. So Good-bye at long range

From Rev. Edgar Owen.

Editor Eagle:

I will now redeem my promise to a number of my friends and brethren to let them hear from me through your most valuable paper,

We arrived at Texico, N. M., on Wednesday at 3:30 p. m., after leaving Goldthwaite Monday evening. Thursday we secured a house, and all of our things having arrived, we went at once to housekeeping. I have been traveling around considerably since coming here and have done some preaching. My first sermon in New Mexico was in a dugout to as many people as could crowd in. That was on the afternoon of the 3rd Sunday in May. That night I preached to almost the same audience in a shack, the roof of which was not high enough on the lower side for me to stand straight. This was the neighborhood where Luther Smith and the Evans boys and some others from Mills county settled. It was the first preaching they had had in that neighborhood. Brother Luther Smith will preach to them regularly from now on, and they will have Sunday school every Sunday. The brother in whose dugout, or rather dugout and half house I preached has more room than any one else and he told the neighbors to come to his house every Sunday afternoon. I preached twice last Sunday to good and appreciative audiences in the Presbyterian church house in Melrose. There is a small Baptist organization here, and they have a pastor, but he has lost his voice and can't preach and is so feeble in health that he can't get around. I agreed to meet with them at their next regular meeting.

This is a fine country. Some of it is considerably rolling, and some of it as level as a floor for miles. The water is as fine as I ever drank, but in places you have to go pretty deep for it. In the sandy country they get water shallow. The land is fine and can nearly all of it be put in a state of cultivation. It grows corn, the ordinary feed crops and potatoes. Some think it will be a successful small grain country, while others think differently. It is thought by some that broom corn will be the money crop. All this remains to be tested. Practically all of the land where I have been is taken up. There is occasionally an 80 acre tract that has been left. Quite a number of relinquishments can be bought very cheaply. A large majority of these claims are being improved. There are lots of people here. There are places where you can stand and count seventy-five to one hundred houses, dugouts and shacks. In nearly all of them some one lives. A good many nice houses are being built, which indicates that people mean business by coming here. Quite a number, like myself, are poor and not able to put much improvements on their places. Some say that quite a number of poor people are not going to be able to stay on their claims, that they will have to go back where they come from, but I don't know how they are going to get away from here, unless they write to their friends to send them money to come on. For my part I am not ready to do that yet.

New towns and new school houses are springing up in many places on the plains. Very soon there will be new churches organized all over the country. We are now having a great revival at Texico. Rev. J. L. H. Hawkins of Oklahoma is doing the preaching. Texico is a wicked town, but it is being considerably stirred religiously. The meeting is now in its second week. Quite a number have been converted, and a great many more are inquiring the way of Life. My two elder children are among the number converted. Several have united with the church, but as I have not been here all the time I do not know the number. Oh, how I would rejoice if I could hear of such a revival at Goldthwaite.

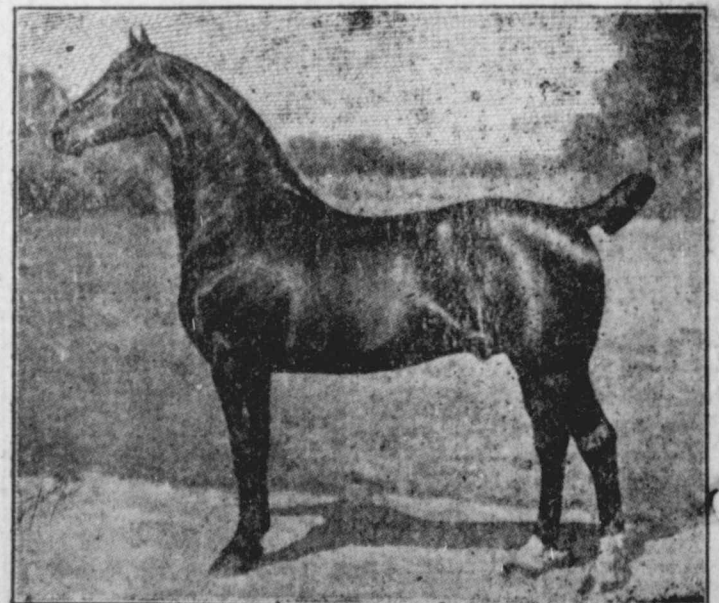
