SPECIAL PROGRAMS

Large Crowds Attend the Reunion
and Chautauqua and the
Occasion Is Much
Enjoyed.

The great Confederate reunion is now with us and the people who are attending appear to be having a good time. Some good speeches have been made and the band has supplied excellent music for the occasion, but the most enjoyable feature of the time, for the old soldiers, no doubt, is the meeting and mingling together and exchanging of experiences during the years of their noble and patriotic service.

These reunions grow more popular as the years go by and the people have now come to look forward to the reunion as a time of festivities and enjoyment. Thousands attend upon every day's exercises and many came the first day and have remained through the entire time.

The reunion of the soldiers will close with today, but the chautauqua will continue until Tuesday and each day will be a special day at the grounds. Today will be Farmers Union Day and thousands of those who are engaged in farming and who are in sympathy with the organization of the union will be here to take part in the exercises and to enjoy the day.

Sunday there is to be a religious rally at the grounds and Dr. Shouse of the chautauqua entertainers is to lecture. It has been proposed that the Sunday schools unite in the rally and that the members of the different Sunday schools march to the grounds at 10 o'clock Sunday morning. There is some opposition to this plan and it is doubtful if there will be any concert of action along this line, but it is likely that the great majority of church going people will attend services at the grounds at the hours to be arranged for the rally and religious service.

Monday will be Odd Fellows and Woodmen day and these orders will be well represented and doubtless will arrange some special program.

Tuesday will be old settlers and sons and daughters of Confederates day. Just what arrangements, if any, have been made for this day the Eagle is

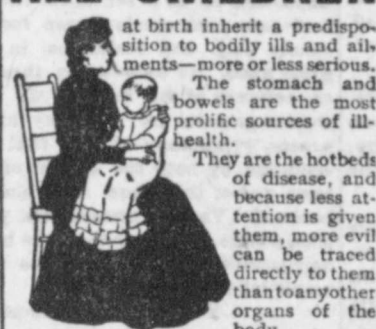
W. W. Kirkpatrick left for Bronte Saturday, where he has gone to visit his friend Prof. S. J. Gross, who has his headquarters at that place.

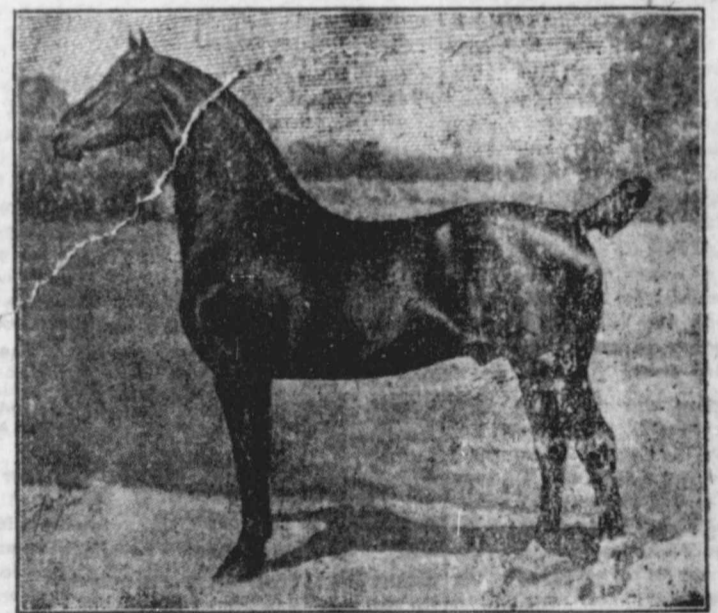
