### NEIGHBORING NEWS.

#### Items Culled From the Leading Local Papers.

##### COMANCHE

J. R. Lewis and wife left Friday morning for a trip to New Mexico.

The Methodist Sunday school enjoyed a nice picnic at Fleming Park Thursday.

We understand the deal which contemplated the establishing of another newspaper in Comanche has been declared off.

Last Saturday F. E. Adams sold his stock in the Adams, Burke Simmons Co. to the other members of the firm.

Mr. and Mrs. M. E. Woodard's little 5-year-old son died Sunday at noon and the remains were buried in Oakwood cemetery Monday morning.

J. W. McNeil and his neighbor farmers have finished working a terrible sand bed with clay, between their farms and Comanche. They spent something over \$500 on this one road.

Mrs. Oscar Roberts is circulating a petition to the governor asking a pardon for her husband. You will remember Mr. Roberts was given a life sentence two years ago for killing Henry Carter.—Chief.

The commissioners court has ordered an election to be held September 21, to vote on a bond issue of \$170,000 to improve the roads of the county.

The city council has ordered an election to be held Monday, September 23, to vote bonds as follows: \$11,000 to complete the high school building; \$6,000 to put in a sewerage system, and \$5,000 to improve the waterworks system.—Exponent.

##### SAN SABA.

Walter Lindsey of Richland Springs was in San Saba Thursday. He has just returned from North Texas.

The commissioners court made a trip to McAnalleys Bend Tues-

day to inspect the county bridge at that place.

Prof. Eugene Oliver, wife and daughter of Kountz, Texas, are visiting at the home of his parents, Mr. and Mrs. J. K. P. Oliver, at San Saba.

Mrs. P. A. Harris died Tuesday evening at the home of her son, D. A. Harris, in the southern part of town. Grandma Harris was in her 74th year at the time of her death and had been a resident of this county for fifteen years.

Will Maxwell was up Saturday from their irrigated farm on Rough Creek and said that they had gathered off of their 18 acres of onions this year 4000 bushels all well matured and were selling them for about \$1.07 per bushel, making the crop bring them something over \$4000.

Mr. and Mrs. T. A. Renfro spent several days in San Saba this week and report crops fine on their place just across the Colorado river from Warren crossing. Mr. Renfro says that the river overflowed the farm last year and the result is a fine crop this year, with cotton that will average over a bale to the acre.

One of the very best acts of the commissioners court, while in session last week, was the setting apart of about \$4000 to be applied to the improvement of the main public roads of the county. While some of the court voted to lower the rate of taxation for the reason that property valuations had been raised by them to the extent of about 12 per cent, a majority of the court were in favor of letting the rate remain the same and collect the money and apply the surplus to the improvement of our public roads.—News.

##### BROWNWOOD.

Just after noon Thursday J. M. Smith of Bangs drove into town with the first new bale of cotton for this season.

Thursday evening at the home

of the bride's parents in this city Miss Margaret Scott Dodds was married to Mr. E. R. Sims, of Mineola.

Miss Willie Ferguson returned to her home at Dallas this morning after a visit to friends at Brownwood.

Chas. L. Camp and Miss Eugenta Beller were united in marriage at the Baptist parsonage Sunday afternoon at 2:30 o'clock.

At the home of J. H. Jackson last Sunday the 18th, near Jenkins' Springs, eight miles from Brownwood were married Mr. C. H. Hammond and Miss Donnie Jackson, daughter of J. H. Jackson in the presence of a crowd of their friends and associates.

Through the direct efforts of the Brownwood Fifty Thousand Club, the Commissioners Court Saturday appropriated \$1,500, as part of a fund with which to construct a good road from Brownwood to the county line near Rising Star.

Thursday morning at 9 o'clock Rev. J. W. Smith of the First Christian church spoke the words that made man and wife Mr. H. L. B. Skinner and Miss Pearl Glass. The ceremony was performed at the home of the bride's parents, Mr. and Mrs. J. A. Glass, in Coggin Addition.

Tom Ratliff has filed suit in county court for alleged damages to the amount of \$783.50 on a shipment of cattle to Morris, I. T. He claims that the cattle, 447 in number, were not properly cared for and were handled roughly while being shipped and that two of the number died from such treatment while en route.—Bulletin.

##### HAMILTON.

The first bale of cotton marketed in Hamilton this year was bought in last Saturday by A. P. Barnes, who lives on Lee Beard's farm 3 miles east of Shive.

J. A. Carpenter, an enterpris-

ing young man of our town was married to Miss Fanny Andrew of Dublin, last Sunday, at the home of the bride.

T. K. Rea was in Hamilton Wednesday on his return from Clifton, and made the Herald a friendly call as usual. While away he sold a span of his splendid horses for \$400.

In a difficulty at the railroad camp near the river last Thursday, Columbus Carter was severely cut about the face and in the back by a boy who was working on the grade. We do not know how the trouble came up, but understand Carter had the boy down when the latter pulled out his pocket knife and proceeded to get in his work.—Herald.

##### LAMPASAS.

The first bale of new cotton was brought in Saturday.

Campers in the Hancock Park are getting scarce now, nearly all of them having returned to their homes.

Machinery for the new ice factory has been ordered, the ground upon which it will be located has been selected, the owner is here ready to work.

The school board has accepted the resignation of Mrs. A. R. Mace as a teacher for the ensuing year, and elected Miss Edith Hickman to fill the vacancy.

Frank Forehand is at the Forest Park hospital in very bad condition, a result of a fall from the train between here and Kempner Thursday night, or of being set upon by some parties in that part of the country after falling from the train.

Miss May Evans is seriously bruised as the result of an accident Tuesday evening. Some colored people were riding in a trap with a single horse attached, when the king belt or some other part of the coupling broke, and the occupants fell in the street, while the horse ran away with the front wheels attached to him.

After running around a block or two, the animal came near the residence of Conductor Philippe, where Miss Evans, Eugene Philippe and others were walking. The wheels of the vehicle struck Miss Evans and knocked her down, brousing her in many places, and also struck the bicycle of Eugene Philippe and wrecked it. Miss Evans is not seriously hurt, but is painfully bruised.—Leader.

#### Protect The Bridges.

Among the laws enacted by the thirtieth legislature was one that is of interest to those who operate threshers and traction engines. It reads:

It shall be unlawful for any person to transport or carry over any bridge or culvert upon any public road or highway, or any street or alley in any incorporated town or city, any traction engine with lugs on the wheels thereof, and to carry or transport over any such public bridge or culvert any traction engine or separator without having first provided and placed in position skids upon which the wheels of said traction engine or separator shall be run, which said skids shall not be less than three inches thick, twelve inches in width and sixteen feet in length; and any person violating the provisions of this article shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction thereof shall be fined in any sum not exceeding five hundred dollars.

Governor Campbell has issued a proclamation designating Labor Day, which is next Monday, as a legal holiday in Texas. The printing of the report of the Bailey investigation committee will not be completed for several weeks yet. It is said the printing will cost \$2500 or more.

John D. Rockefeller receives \$73 95 from the United States as a witness fee for testifying in the recent hearing before Judge Landis in the Standard Oil case in Chicago.

Hon. E. E. Noel of Holmes county, Miss., has been nominated by the Democrats for governor of that state. The nomination in Mississippi, as in Texas, is equivalent to an election.

The attorney general of Texas has brought suit against the International Harvester company for penalties for violating the anti-trust law of this state and also to cancel the company's permit to do business in Texas.

The Atlantic battleship fleet will start for the Pacific in December, according to an official statement by Secretary Loeb, at the direction of President Roosevelt. The statement was made following a conference between the President and representatives of the Navy Department.

The new Oregon law requiring every patron of the saloon to take out a license costing \$5 a year before he can be served at a bar, would certainly put many good drinking men out of business in Texas if that was the law in this state. The new law also makes it necessary that the names of those taking out a drinking license shall be published in a newspaper once a year, that the bartenders may know who is entitled to be served drinks. Wonder what the local mint drinkers would think of such a law?—Palestine Herald.

It has been decided to hold the next reunion of Hood's brigade at Jacksonville.

The board of equalization of Bexar county has raised the rendition of one citizen from \$20,000 to \$250,000.

It is claimed that a \$50,000,000 oil company has been formed in New York to develop the oil fields of Mexico and compete with the Standard oil company.

Patterson, county judge of said Mills county, constituting the commissioners court of said county and each one of us, do hereby certify, upon our oaths, that on this, the 13th day of Aug., A. D. 1907, at a regular term of our said court, we have compared and examined the quarterly report of G. W. Templin, treasurer of Mills county, Texas, for the quarter beginning on the 30th day of April, A. D. 1907, and ending the 31st day of July, A. D. 1907, and finding the same correct have caused an order to be entered upon the minutes of the commissioners court of Mills County stating the approval of said treasurer's report by said court, which said order recites separately the amount received and paid out of each fund by said county treasurer since his last report to this court, and for and during the time covered by this report, and the balance remaining in each fund on the 31st day of July, A. D. 1907, and have ordered the proper credits to be made in the accounts of the said treasurer, in accordance with said order required by Article 867, chapter 1, title xxv, of the Revised Statutes of Texas, as amended by an act of the twenty-fifth legislature of Texas at its regular session, approved March 20, 1897.

# Mills County Tax Values

## REMARKABLE INCREASE IN RENDITIONS FOR THE PRESENT YEAR.

A Fine Showing for the Substantial Conditions in the County and the Prosperity of the Citizens—The Careful Work of the Tax Assessor and the Good Business Judgment of the Commissioners Court Make a Reduction of the Tax Rate.

Tax Assessor Joe H. Frizzell has completed the compilation of the county tax rolls for 1907 and an increase of more than \$1,000,000 is shown in the valuation over last year. This increase is more remarkable when it is understood that a large decrease in the acreage of the land on the unrendered rolls by the court expunging a large number of "doublets" from the rolls. A number of tracts were covered by two abstract numbers, hence there was heretofore a double rendition of a considerable amount of land and this has now been corrected.

By the careful work of the tax assessor in listing the property and the splendid business management of the commissioners court the tax rate for this year has been materially reduced and there are few counties in a better financial condition.

### A Prohibition Ruling.

The court of criminal appeals has decided that a prohibition election can not be legally held in a school district, for the reason that the school district is not a "political sub-division" of a county. The ruling was made in a case appealed from Raines county, but it has the effect of annulling the indictments returned by the last two grand juries in this county against parties charged with selling liquor in this district.

Prohibition was first adopted in the Goldthwaite school district and afterwards in the entire county, but as the commissioners court had not complied with all requirements necessary to putting prohibition in effect prior to the alleged violations, the indictments were returned under the law that was then in operation in this school district. We still have county prohibition in effect, however.

In this connection it is but justice to the attorneys representing those charged with violation of the law in this school district to say that they have contended all the time that an election in a school district was invalid for the identical reason set out by the higher court.

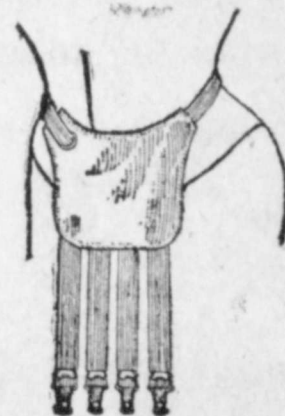
