W. P. Irvine of the Long Cove community was among the pleasant callers at this office. He states that the cotton crop in his immediate section is the poorest he has ever seen here in a period of 31 years. He also reports that practically no corn was raised.

Thursday between one and two o'clock the residence of Mrs. H. W. Yates was completely destroyed by fire, only a part of the house furnishings being saved. By heroic work other residences which were near were saved. Loss about \$3000. Insurance \$800. Practically nothing saved.—Leader.

**BROWNWOOD.**  
H. C. Dyer of San Antonio and Miss Bess Roseborough of this city were married on Tuesday of this week at Hot Springs, Arkansas, where Mr. Dyer has been for several weeks for his health.

Miss Bertha Churchill of this city and Miss Meers of San Angelo returned last night from a very pleasant months stay at Potland, Oregon, and a trip through California.

The Frisco has changed the schedule of the outgoing night train. Instead of leaving at 11 o'clock this train will in the future leave at 11:45 and will make the regular connection at Fort Worth.

The commissioners court in session this morning opened the bids of the different banks of the city for the county depository and the contract was awarded to the Citizens National Bank on a bid of two and three eight per cent.

The local officials of the Santa Fe railroad have received instructions to the effect that the freight building and offices will be moved from its present location to a point between the side tracks of the Brownwood Mill & Elevator Co. and the main line.

Engineer Davis in his report to the connoil says that at present rate of consumption Brownwood has not more than twenty days supply of water in the city reservoir. Mr. Davis' record shows that almost a million gallons of water have been consumed each day during August and that the supply is all but exhausted.—Bulletin.

The Standard Milling company's building in Houston and a large number of smaller buildings were destroyed by fire Monday night. The loss will reach \$200,000 or more.

Judge Alton Parker announces that he does not desire to hold office of any kind. This statement was made in denial of a statement that he desired the Democratic nomination for president.

Reports from a number of cities in Texas where saloons are in operation say that the new liquor law is not being obeyed as well as the old law was observed. The new law was drawn by the attorney for the liquor men and the result was to be expected.

Two passenger trains on the Galveston division of the G. H. & S. A. railroad collided at Strang, a small station near Houston, Monday night.

A great many people were injured and some perhaps fatally. The collision was caused by the wrong order being given to one of the train's crew.

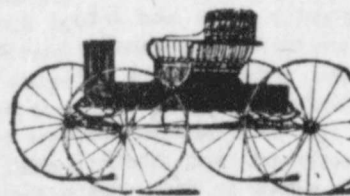

### Fifteenth Year.

With this issue the Eagle begins the fifteenth year of its existence and the outlook is encouraging. For fourteen years the paper has made its weekly visits to the homes of the people of this section and each year its circulation has grown until now few indeed are the citizens of this county who do not have their names enrolled upon the Eagle's subscription list. The paper was established under very unfavorable circumstances and for some time the indications were against the success of the enterprise, but the management has labored on, believing that the outcome would be satisfactory, and the result has proved the idea correct. Today the Eagle stands abreast with the best county papers in the state and it will compare favorably with papers published in towns much larger than Goldthwaite.

Fourteen years ago the publication of the paper was begun with a small outfit in a rented room. Today the Eagle has up-to-date material and machinery in every department and few towns of this size have a printing plant equal to that of the Eagle. The management has expended more than \$1100 in the interest of the paper in the last twelve months and other improvements are in contemplation.

Persons have come here from time to time with printing outfits and announced with much ado that they had come to stay, but the fact that one good paper was better than two half-way publications has always been recognized by the business men, who in every case have been expected to divide their patronage with the new venture, and these business men have been far-sighted enough to realize that the double expense in advertising in order to reach the same people was unnecessary and burdensome, and to a large extent they have withheld their patronage from those who wanted to so firmly establish themselves here as to make this double taxation necessary. In refusing to be thus led on to double their expenses the business men have displayed that same good judgment that has always characterized the town and has made Goldthwaite to be recognized as the best town of its size in Texas and a place where business failures are unknown.

It has been shown by analysis that a young person weighing 154 pounds is composed of 98 pounds of water, 3 pounds of the white of eggs, a little less than 1 pound of glue, 3 1/4 pounds of fat, 8 1/2 pounds of phosphate of lime, 3 ounces of sugar and starch, 7 ounces of chloride of calcium, 6 ounces of phosphate of magnesium and a little ordinary table salt.—Exchange.

The problem of what this country is to do when the rapidly decreasing supply of timber for telegraph and telephone poles is exhausted may be solved by a German architect, who has been granted patents in the United States and in European countries on poles made of glass. The consular agent at Cassel reports that a stock company has been organized and a factory for the manufacturing of glass poles has been built at Grossalmerode, a town near Berlin. The glass mass of which the poles are made is strengthened by interlacing and intertwining with strong wire threads. The selling price of the poles has not been fixed, but the company is willing to accept \$2 for a pole of the length of twenty-three feet.

"The mills of South Carolina consume the entire cotton crop of the state and go outside for additional supplies. The Texas cotton crop, save about one percent, goes to New England and across the two oceans. Is that good business," says the Waco Times-Herald, and there can be but one answer to the question. South Carolina will get rich, and will soon be loaning money to the other state, and her example is one that should inspire Texas to get busy in building cotton mills. One bale in one hundred is made into the finished product, New England and Europe making all the clear money out of the magnificent crop, which comes near being one-fourth of that produced by the whole world. It is time for Texas to wake up.—Exchange.

Yet he was so hard up for money that he offered a half interest in his invention to Don Cameron for \$10,000. Cameron thought Bell was a dreamer and refused to put up a dollar. That half interest today is worth \$20,000,000.—New Orleans Item.
