NEIGHBORING NEWS.

Items Culled From the Leading Local Papers.

BROWNWOOD.
Rev. Gaines B. Hall and his bride, formerly Miss Kirkpatrick of Comanche, passed through the city this morning en route to Ballinger for a few days visit to Mr. Hall's parents. Rev. Hall is pastor of the First Presbyterian church at Comanche.

Brownwood friends are in receipt of invitations announcing the approaching marriage of Miss Ila Ruth Hassard to Mr. Francis Marshall Sansom, to occur at the Hotel Baltimore, Kansas City, Mo., on the evening of Tuesday, Nov. 26.

Postmaster Marshall Smith, who returned Friday from a trip over the east, says he thinks that the financial flurry will be entirely passed by the close of this week and that it will almost be forgotten within the next ten days.

For several days the local bankers have been working on some feasible plan by which they might handle cotton and have about completed their arrangements by the organization of an association to be known as the Brownwood Clearing house, of which Henry Ford, T. C. Yantis, Brooke Smith, B. E. Hurlbut and A. L. Self are directors. The plan is for the clearing house association to issue certificates to the amount of \$10,000 to each bank to be used in the purchase of cotton only redeemable in New York exchange on or before thirty days.—Bulletin.

COMANCHE
A. B. Dowdy of Newburg died at Mineral Wells last Sunday morning where he had gone for his health.
Tellie Shipman of Indian Gap, passed through Comanche Fri-

day on his way to Stanton, where he has located.

Webb Christain of Big Springs stopped off at Comanche on his way back home from Brownwood Saturday.

B. S. Holmaley was recently appointed administrator on the estate of B. J. Holmaley, deceased, for the purpose of collecting some claims against the government for Indian depredations.

Last Friday night at twelve o'clock the fire alarm was again sounded and Brodie's studio across the street from the Carter hotel was partially consumed before the fire was under control.

Mrs. O. L. Halley brought the news to Comanche this week that Mr. and Mrs. S. J. Thomas would move to Cleburne today, Mr. Thomas has been city editor for the Fort Worth Record since his European trip last spring, but now has an interest in one of Cleburne's good papers.

Tuesday afternoon about 3 o'clock, Finis Kemp, the 11-year-old son of Wm. Kemp, who lived in the first house south of the new bridge on the East Main street, either shot himself or was shot by his 14-year-old brother who was with him hunting in R. W. Neal's woodland east of G. A. Bruton's farm at the time of the tragedy.

Judge Lindsey had new juries summoned to meet Monday to try the 19 cases against R. M. Clift for forgery. Clift plead guilty during Monday to five of the indictments and the juries gave him two years in the penitentiary in each case. Tuesday three more cases were called and as many pleas of guilty entered. The Judge sentenced him to serve 15 years in the eight cases and threw out the remaining eleven cases.—Chief.

HAMILTON.

The honorable commissioners court is in session this week.

The temporary bridge across the Leon river will be completed this week, by the new railroad, and construction trains will be permitted to cross over with material to be used in the work of completing the road to Hamilton.—Rustler.

The Christain Ladies Aid met last week at the home of Mrs. Bauerfind and a course of study for the ensuing year was decided upon.

E. Phelan died at his home in the town of Lometa Sunday and the body was brought here and buried in the city cemetery Monday morning.

A telegram received here Saturday from Los Angeles, Cal., bore the sad news of Mr. Arthur Newton's death. The message stated only that the young man had been killed and asked for information concerning the body. Mr. Newton is a son of Mr. and Mrs. W. A. Newton of this place, and has been for some time with the navy in California.—Leader.

SAN SABA.

Dr. G. P. Holman sold his herd of registered Hereford cattle to F. F. Edwards last week.

Miss Amanda Storey Cunningham died at the home of her father, Mr. J. C. Cunningham, in San Saba at 11 o'clock a. m. Saturday, Nov. 9.

Tuesday evening W. A. Smith filed, with the Commissioner's Court, his resignation as County

Judge, and as we go to press the Court is in dead-lock on the election of his successor.

We have been informed that the acreage in onions, potatoes and other truck, among the irrigators will be doubled in this county for next year.

The beautiful ceremony which united in marriage Mr. Frank Baker and Miss Honor Hart was performed at the Methodist church Monday afternoon at 2 o'clock, Rev. F. A. White officiating, and Miss Mattie Armour Rector playing the wedding march.

Wm. B. Drake, Vice-President and Gen. manager of the Texas division of the Frisco, Ry. system, W. C. Preston, general freight agent Texas division, and Chas. E. Wynn, commercial agent of the same railroad system, were in San Saba last week. We understand they were merely looking over the situation in general and making inquiries and getting in information on the irrigation question.

In the case of N. J. Hall vs. San Saba county, judgment was rendered in favor of the county. This is a case in which the commissioners court undertook to tax the vendor's lien notes which Hall took to secure the deferred payment on the various sales of his large ranch near Richland Springs. Hall claimed that the notes were not property taxable in Texas, he being a citizen of Kansas City, Mo. The tax on these notes amount to the neat sum of \$1000 09.—News.

Believing as we do that the open saloon is harmful to society and that its influence is against the best interest of the country we would be unworthy of the confidence of our friends and the respect of those who oppose the measure were we to vote otherwise. The people are all agreed that strong drink is the cause of more crime, sorrow and misery than all other agencies combined and the only issue is the best method of controlling the traffic. Prohibitionists believe that the open saloon fosters social drinking and makes drunkards. The Eagle editor believes this and will always be found on the side of those who oppose the traffic in every form.

This paper is not the organ of either side to the controversy and will not be conducted as such. Its editor has a right to his opinions and has no hesitancy in expressing them, but some of his best friends are on the other side and he has no desire to force them to see as he sees, even if he had the power to do so. They have a right to their views and he respects them when they stand by their convictions. The Eagle simply desires to be plain with the people and let them know exactly where it stands in regard to prohibition.

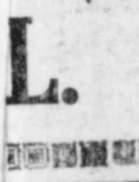

Division of Road Fund.

The commissioners court has decided to apportion the road and bridge tax money to the precincts according to the amount paid in by each precinct. The total valuation of property in the county being \$4,655,010 the divisions according to precincts would be approximately as follows. Precinct No. 1, \$1,785,910; No. 2, \$685,855; No. 3, \$1,571,595; No. 4, \$613,650. With a 15 cent road and bridge tax the revenue from this source will be about \$6950 and the division will be about as follows: Precinct No. 1, \$2655; No. 2, \$1028; No. 3, \$2357; No. 4, \$920. This money can not all be paid out for roads and bridges, however, for the sinking fund for the bridge bonds as well as the commissions for collecting and handling the funds will have to come out of the total before it is divided. The total available for road and bridge work will be approximately \$6000 and it will be divided to the precincts on the basis indicated.

Mandamus Writ Issued.

In the district court Tuesday the suit of mandamus by Matt Casbeer and others was decided in favor of the plaintiffs, the court deciding that writ of mandamus should issue compelling the commissioners court to order a prohibition election in this county. The commissioners met Thursday, in obedience to the order of the district court and issued an order for the prohibition election to be held in this county Monday, Dec. 16.

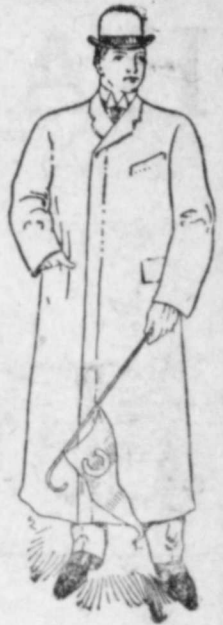

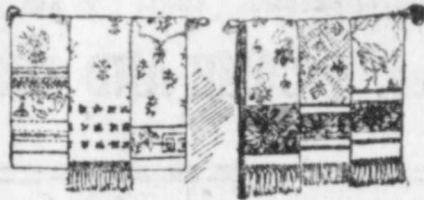
