#### City Council.

The city council met in regular session Monday night, with all members present.

The report of the committee appointed to ascertain the necessity for a street to be opened in the western part of town was received. Two members of the committee favored the street as outlined by the first petition, while one member favored a change. Another petition was presented asking that a change be made in the street and the committee was continued.

The treasurers report was received and showed \$420.72 in the general fund and \$152.88 in the street fund.

Following accounts were allowed; Ashley Bros., feed for city team, \$6.75; B. A. Harris, feed for city team, \$22.10; Higginbotham Lumber Co., lumber, \$11.35; Light company, street lights, \$8.00

Mr. Pinkie Mitchell was gored to death by a vicious cow at her home in Rockdale.

The Southern Cotton Association Convention will meet at Dallas February 19 and 20.

A panther appeared in the city of Waco a few nights ago and killed some chickens and turkeys near Baylor college.

The Spanish War Veterans of San Antonio have voted to prohibit conspicuous liquors from the smokers and other social gatherings.

San Angelo is to have a \$50,000 cotton compress. The West Texas Compress Company with 1000 capital, will construct, and it is likely it will be managed by W. G. Churnill of Brownwood.

Thomas D. Garrett, was taken from a refrigerator car of Irish potatoes in Lawton, after having been locked in for nine days and nights, with nothing to live on but potatoes. He had entered the car at Ault, Colorado, to stop over night and when he awoke, the car was sealed and in motion. He was almost a physical wreck when released.

### Office Must Be Continued.

There has been some talk here of petitioning the commissioners court to reduce the commissions allowed the county treasurer to a very low point on account of the law making the county depository the custodian of the funds. This plan would save money for the county and might work satisfactorily to have the book-keeper or some other person in the depository to act as nominal treasurer at a very small salary, but the attorney general says the office can not be destroyed by reducing the salary to an unworkable amount. Here follows a letter to Mr. Priddy regarding the matter:

Austin, Texas, Jan. 7, 1908.

Hon. A. T. Priddy, County Attorney, Goldthwaite, Texas.

Dear Sir: In reply to your letter of the 3rd inst., I wish to advise that it is within the power of the Commissioners Court to reduce the compensation received by county treasurers if they leave such compensation within the bounds of reason. K. S. 2457 reads in part as follows:

"The County Treasurer shall receive commissions on the moneys received and paid out by him, said commissions to be fixed by order of the commissioners court as follows:

"For receiving all moneys, other than school funds, for the county, not exceeding 2 1/2 per cent, and not exceeding 2 1/2 per cent, for paying out the same."

In other words, the Commissioners Court can place the commissions lower than this amount, if they see proper. Of course, they could not destroy the office of county treasurer by fixing his compensation at a nominal one.

George Carney, a Santa Fe brakeman, had the lower part of his body and limbs ground to a pulp in trying to board his train near Cameron.

Aaron Kelley broke jail at Brady by cutting a bar from one of the windows. There was another prisoner in the jail, but he made no effort to escape.

Joe Ferguson, a conductor on the International and Great Northern railroad, committed suicide on the street at Mart, by shooting himself. It is thought a love affair was the cause.

Ira Hart and Alva Skinner, two farmers living near Gainesville, fought a duel with knives over an old grudge on January 4, Hart was fatally wounded and Skinner is in a precarious condition.

Two negroes attacked Alex Jayne, night watchman at the oil mill in Mart. One held him while the other cut him five times about the head and neck. He finally broke away from them, shooting one fatally but the other escaped.

The noted Indian chief, Wa Ho Tsa Ah Lo, the largest man in the Osage tribe, died at Tulsa, Oklahoma, after a festival on January 5, after a night at an Osage dance. He was one of the few surviving warriors who took part in the bloody war between the Osage and Kansas Indians fifty years ago.

Congressman Shepperd of Texas, in a speech in the national congress, shamed President Roosevelt for having "In God we trust" left off the government coin. The report says the speech breathed the fervor of a camp meeting sermon and the eloquent flow of language held the house spell bound.

The commissioner of public works in Dallas has announced that hereafter the policy in the public work of that city will be "America for Americans." He says the resident American citizens of that city will be given the preference in the street building where \$100,000 will be expended within the next few months.

A freight train on the Somerville branch of the Santa Fe rounded a sharp curve between Bobbin and Plantersville and came upon two men said to have been asleep on the track. One man was knocked into the air turned over a few times and landed in a mud hole unhurt, while the other had his right hand mostly out away, and many other bruises about the head and body.

Representative Stephens introduced a bill in congress authorizing the federal government to purchase the Goodnight ranch and herds of buffalo together with 200,000 acres of land in Armstrong and Randall counties, including the head waters of Red River, to be known as the Palo Duro Canyon national forest reserve. The secretary of agriculture is to take charge of the buffaloes and the reserve, the whole to cost over half a million dollars.

Editor Eagle:

It is now 2 1/2 years since we left Goldthwaite, and almost every month that has passed since then I have promised myself that I would write to my many friends there through the Eagle. After this long lapse of time I am resolved at once to redeem my promise. As I sit in my room writing I look out across the broad Columbia, and as its water rolls by on its way to the great Pacific, I think: "How aptly it illustrates the drifting of ones life!"

One year ago today I found my father in the north eastern part of Oregon, in the Blue Mountains, sawing off the butt of a large pine. He had on a pair of gum boots, a heavy overcoat and a fur cap. He looked as woolly and as fat as a bear. I slipped up on him and in a jiffy after he had seen me he had his arms around me with the grip of a bear. After we had wept and laughed for awhile he led me up the canyon to a log house that was backed up under a large hill, as if to protect itself from the ravages of wild beasts, and the drifting snow storms, and looking over the bench into the Salmon River, Here I greeted my sister's family and was welcomed to the side of a roaring log fire in an old fashioned fire-place, and served a cup of boiling tea made from the roots of a native plant, some of which I have forgotten the name. This is a necessary as deemed appropriate as an acclimation to the Blue Mountain zone. I was soon convinced of the wisdom of building the house under the hill; for before night fall, which comes on between 3 and 4 o'clock in the afternoon, the snow began falling and continued until the ground was covered with a white carpet about 18 to 24 inches thick. I did not see the ground any more until some time in March.

Being enchanted by the wild free life amongst the firs and hamracks, the clear blue streams and the snow covered hills. I remained there about two weeks alternating my time between my two sisters, whose husbands had homesteaded in this new country. Very soon I was booted, cloaked, gloved and capped for the snow, and with a double barreled shot gun in hand, went out for a hunt. My game on this hunt was a grouse and a magpie. I saw a bird of wonderful beauty in the top of a tall tree. I was so attracted by it that I determined at once to stuff it, and send it to Texas to my wife. This rare bird, however, was not of my opinion. It seemed to prefer to die alone, and when I had shot it, securely fastened its claws to a limb and gave up the ghost and was buried in the top of a majestic hamrack. There I left it in its peaceful slumber.

The chief means of livelihood in this section are stock raising, hay and wheat growing, and timbering. The land is wonderfully productive, the chief drawback being that it is so far from market and the country over which its produce must be hauled so exceedingly rough. To obviate this difficulty the wheat and hay are fed to stock, which are driven alive to market.

As I have begun in the middle of my story I will have to work my way out in both directions. But as this article is already long enough, I shall defer the "working out" to a later time; contenting myself for the present by saying that we are happy and prosperous in our new home in Astoria, having just been remembered in a very substantial way by our "flock" through the kindness of Santa Claus.

D. 1907, there was begun and holden at the court house of Mills County, State of Texas, in the town of Goldthwaite, in said county, a Special Session of the Honorable Commissioners Court of said Mills County, for the purpose of opening the polls and counting the votes cast at a Special Election, heretofore holden in and throughout said Mills County, on the aforesaid 16th day of December, A. D. 1907, for the purpose of enabling the legally qualified voters residing in said Mills County, to determine whether or not the sale of intoxicating liquors shall be prohibited within the limits of said Mills County, as provided by Title LXIX, of the Revised Civil Statutes of Texas, and the several amendments thereto, with the following officers of said court present and participating in the proceedings of said court, to wit:

L. E. Patterson, County Judge, presiding; M. O. Humphries, County Commissioner, Precinct No. One; J. F. Jones, County Commissioner, Precinct No. Two; J. A. Fletcher, County Commissioner, Precinct No. Three, and S. L. Cooke, County Commissioner, Precinct No. Four, and E. G. Crawford, Clerk of the County Court, and Ex Officio Clerk of the Commissioners Court of said Mills County, and H. C. Essell, Sheriff of Mills County, Texas, when the following proceedings were had, to wit:

In Re. Local Option Election in and for Mills County, Texas:

On this the 27th day of December, A. D. 1907, the Honorable Commissioners Court of Mills County, Texas, met and was in Special session, at the court house of Mills County, Texas, in the town of Goldthwaite, in said county, for the purpose of opening the polls and counting the votes cast at the special election heretofore holden in and throughout the limits of said Mills County, on the said 16th day of December, A. D. 1907, for the purpose of enabling the legally qualified voters of, and residing in said Mills County, to determine whether or not the sale of intoxicating liquors shall be prohibited within the limits of said Mills County, Texas, as provided by Title LXIX, of the Revised Civil Statutes of Texas, and the several amendments thereto, and thereupon, it appearing to the court in open session, that E. G. Crawford, the Clerk of this court, in compliance with law, and in obedience to an order of this court, made and entered on the minute of this court, on the 22nd day of November, A. D. 1907, ordering an election to be holden in and throughout the limits of said Mills County, on the 16th day of December, A. D. 1907, for the purposes aforesaid, has posted, and caused to be posted, five several copies of said order ordering said election, at five different public places within said county, to wit: One at Mullin; one at Center City; one at Priddy; one at Ebony, and one at the court house door of said county, in the town of Goldthwaite, in said county, for more than twelve (12) days next preceding the said day of election; and it further appearing to the court that the said election has been held in all respects in conformity with the laws governing such elections and the returns thereof made by the proper officer of each voting precinct in and throughout said county; thereupon, the court in open session, opened the polls, and counted the votes cast at said election, as the same were returned by the proper officer of each voting precinct in and throughout said Mills County, as required by law; and therefrom it appearing to the court that the total number of votes cast at said election was eleven hundred and sixty-seven (1167) and that seven hundred and twenty-one (721) of said votes were cast for prohibition; and that four hundred and forty-six (446) of said voters were cast against prohibition, and it appearing to the court therefrom that a majority of two hundred and seventy-five (275) of said votes were cast for prohibition, the result of said election is therefore here now so declared in favor of Prohibition.

It is therefore, on this the 27th day of December, A. D. 1907, ordered, adjudged and decreed by this, the Commissioners Court in and for Mills county, State of Texas, that the sale of intoxicating liquors be and the same is hereby absolutely prohibited within the limits of this the said county of Mills, State of Texas, as provided by Title LXIX of the Revised Civil Statutes of Texas, and

the several amendments thereto, excepted for the purposes and under the regulations specified in said Title of said statute, and the several amendments thereto, until such time as the qualified voters of said county may, at another legal election, held for that purpose, by a majority vote decide otherwise.

It is further ordered by the court that this order declaring the result of election be published for four successive weeks in some newspaper published in said Mills county, to be hereafter selected by the county judge in and for said county for that purpose, and that the fact of said publication be entered by the said county judge on the minutes of this court, and that thereupon, and therefrom, said law shall become operative.

It is further ordered by the court that the Record of Election Returns, vol. 1, page 78, be and the same are hereby made a part of these minutes.

Done, and entered in open court, on this the 27th day of December, A. D. 1907. L. E. PATTERSON, County Judge, in and for Mills County, Texas.

It is that subscriptions are to be paid in advance, but he allows a year for the collection of the account, which enables the publisher to furnish the paper to the subscriber for a reasonable time after the time for which the subscription was paid has expired. Of course, the publisher is not supposed to wait the full twelve months before the collection is made, but in case he does not secure a renewal before the year expires he can not send it longer on credit at the second class rate, which is the only rate a county paper can afford to pay. It has been the practice of most weekly papers to allow subscription accounts to run indefinitely, but the postmaster general says such subscriptions are not considered bona fide and can not be allowed the use of the mails.
