His screams attracted the parents, who quickly extinguished the flames, but not before they had blistered one side of the little body to the arm pit.

T. D. Hardin of Lone Oak was in San Saba two weeks ago. He came after the little boy, Fannin, who has been living at the home of Capt. S. W. Yoe for over three years. After his mother's death he was placed in the Orphanage at Waco by his step-father without the knowledge of his people and was lost from them for about 10 years. He is a very bright boy of splendid energy and belongs to a prominent family in Hunt county and is also a descendant of the illustrious Clay family of Kentucky.—Star.

### Education.

Aristotle said that education is an ornament in prosperity and a refuge in adversity. The M. K. & T. coal chutes were burned at Denison Tuesday, entailing a loss of about \$10,000.

Roadmaster Scanlon of the Southwestern railroad was killed by a wreck of his auto car near El Paso Tuesday.

J. W. Owsley, a jeweler late of Willis point, suicided at Falfurias Tuesday. Business reverses are supposed to have caused him to end his life.

On last Tuesday Elmer Wheeler, a ranchman, shot and killed Amos Burnham, a stockman, near Endee, N. M. and then killed himself.

A lady at Seguin received a scratch from a nail a few days ago and some blueing got into the wound when she was engaged in washing and blood poisoning developed, causing her death.

The people of Wolfe City have declared war on the automobilists and a few days ago refused to allow a party of them to pass through the town with their machines.

A wagon driver was killed by the elevator in the Oriental hotel in Dallas Tuesday. He had leaned over the elevator shaft to see where the car was located, when the car descended and crushed his skull.

The failure of the Farmers and Bankers Building company at Houston last week has developed an ugly state of affairs in the management of the business of the company and the president, Dave Shapira, has been indicted on several counts for forgery.

Lorraine Sadler, a ten-year-old girl, fell into a cistern and was drowned at Willis Point. Seven children were playing hide-and-seek in the back of a store when the covering of the cistern broke and the child fell into the water and drowned before help could reach her.

G. D. Terrell, a merchant at Roston, Texas had his face badly mangled by the explosion of a stove in his store in which had been placed some trash swept from the floor, containing, supposedly, a piece of dynamite. Two men sitting near the stove were also injured.

The penitentiary board has pending a proposition for the purpose of purchasing two of the largest sugar plantations in the Southwest, and the largest in the State for account of the State of Texas. This will give the State a wide acreage on which to give outdoor work for a considerable number of convicts.

#### Incorporation Election.

A petition bearing 80 names was filed with the county judge yesterday asking for an election to determine whether or not the city incorporation should be continued. Under the law governing the form of incorporation first adopted in the city 25 names were required to demand an election, but the form of incorporation has been so changed by the city council that it will probably be necessary to have 100 signers to the petition before the election can be ordered. Judge Patterson was investigating the law on the subject yesterday afternoon and had reached no decision at the time the Eagle was put to press.

The Eagle hopes that the gentlemen favoring the abolition of the incorporation will reconsider their determination, for such a move would certainly be a backward step for the community. The city has not been incorporated long enough for the full benefits to be demonstrated and we are sure that if the incorporation is continued for five years longer there would be few who would not recognize its benefits and favor its continuance. Up to this time there has been very little money with which to make improvements and the city government can now be more beneficial than ever before. To throw off the incorporation now would be to lose a great per cent of the money that has been expended in preparing for the city's business. There are many arguments that can be made in favor of incorporation and we all know that a town seldom accomplishes much in the way of street improvements and the securing of public enterprises without being incorporated.

Those who favor abolishing the incorporation should think well before they act.

Nine persons were poisoned near Thorndale last Friday at their noon meal. Arsenic was found in the biscuit and also in the flour gravy.

Eugene Carothers, son of President Carothers of First National bank of Georgetown, was accidentally shot while hunting Saturday. The wound is a serious one.

After having been entombed forty-six days in the Alpha shaft of the Circoux mine, three miners were rescued January 19. Water and food had been given through a steam pipe.

The "teachers famine" has so crippled the school work of Chicago, that 14 year old privileged pupils have been installed rather than dismiss the children and have them spend the days on the streets.

The Ladies of the local chapters of the Daughters of the Republic and Daughters of the Confederacy of La Grange, Texas, will erect a monument to the Mier prisoners and Dawson men. L. Amateis, a sculptor of Washington, D. C., will design and construct the monument, which will probably cost \$25,000.

Charles Deakell, a shoe cutter in St. Louis, aged 18, killed himself by slashing his throat with a razor last Sunday. His mother found his body and a note written with a pencil on blood spattered paper saying: "I killed a man with a bean shooter and I will pay the penalty."

The largest funeral in point of attendance in the history of Galveston was that of Jim Guoy, the Chinese Freemason and globe-trotter Sunday. It required five policemen to keep order, a \$5 dollar gold piece had been placed in the mouth of the corpse to "pay the fee into the land of Jose" Resat pig and other viands were placed in the coffin.

The happiest man in the land today is the successful farmer. He sits, under his own vine and fig tree; undisturbed by the maddening noise of the great city. Banks fail, railroads go into the hands of receivers, booming towns collapse, all business stagnates. But the wise farmer can snap his finger at these things. He is the monarch of all he surveys on his broad acres. The farmer is to be envied, and if he is not contented with his lot, he is lacking in wisdom.—Mt. Pleasant Times Review.

From Dr. Taylor.

Farewell, Texas, Jan. 16.

Editor Eagle:

In as much as I promised to write to so many of my friends I will contribute a few lines through the Eagle, as all the people who want a good paper and the news take the Eagle and will see what I have to say.

I am at the above place, just across the line from Texico. Farewell is the Texas town and Texico is the New Mexico town, only the line separating the two towns. We are to soon have a fine depot on the Texas side, passenger and freight, only few hundred yards from Texico depot. As Texico freight rates are so high the Texas railroad commission has ordered the depot put in on Texas side.

Texico is the largest freight point on the plains. Have excellent passenger service, four trains daily. We are on the main line from Kansas City to Pacific coast country. We expect a great border city soon. It is no longer an experiment as to this being a great farming county, I have seen enough to satisfy me that this is fast coming the farming country of Texas. The soil is productive and the climate is adapted to all crops. As to corn, I see as fine corn every day as I ever saw grow in the black land belt of Texas. Corn is plentiful here, sells for 45 to 50 cents per bushel. This is the home for maize and kaffir corn. Can raise more than you can use or take care of.

As to wheat, we have the best wheat country in the United States, this is saying a whole lot (you will say) come and see for yourself is all I ask you. Potatoes, sweet and Irish do fine. Pea nuts! Old Georgia must take a back seat. I will not attempt to tell you how big turnips grow here, you would not believe it. And watermelons are a natural growth in this soil. Not uncommon to see one tipping the scales at 90 to 100 pounds.

No use to tell you the variety that grows in this country. They all grow. But you will say I left cotton out. Portales has a cotton gin and ginned several hundred bales of cotton. Some raised as much as a half bale per acre.

Stock of all kinds, do fine in this climate. Hog raising is the coming industry in this country, and chickens thrive and do well and chicken raising is a paying business. Eggs sell from 25 to 50 cents per dozen. Don't forget the old hen for a money crop in any country.

Most of the improvements close to here are in Mexico, as the land was given to the people and they have taken it and are making homes on it. Some will sell, only home taken to speculate on. Claims close in sell for \$2500 to \$3000 and more. This land is all good, no grubs, no rocks. The people from the north and east are fast coming to this country and express themselves as being surprised to find such a country as the plains unsettled.

As to the climate, I can find no serious objections, as the sun shines nine-tenths of the days. Snow don't come any more or often than the farmers like to see. Rains come in the winter. Spring rains are little late, but the season in the ground brings crops up and carries them till spring rains come, then it rains all through the summer. No hot winds. Crops stay green and grow until frost. The railroad will soon build out from Coleman,

then you good people will come out and look and see where you were to late to get a good thing, but come then. Better late than not at all. I see Mills county people every day who are well pleased.

I will try to answer questions any one may wish to ask about the country and am not a land agent.

As to myself and family we are well and pleased. Am doing a nice practice for these western people. Dr. H. H. Taylor and Dr. O. P. Sutherland are pleased with their new home at Hereford and doing nicely.

For fear I am writing too much for publication I will close, wishing much success to the Eagle and its many readers.

D. 1907, for the purpose of enabling the legally qualified voters residing in said Mills County, to determine whether or not the sale of intoxicating liquors shall be prohibited within the limits of said Mills County, as provided by Title LXIX, of the Revised Civil Statutes of Texas, and the several amendments thereto, with the following officers of said court present and participating in the proceedings of said court, to wit:

L. E. Patterson, County Judge, presiding; M. C. Humphries, County Commissioner, Precinct No. One; J. F. Jones, County Commissioner, Precinct No. Two; J. A. Fletcher, County Commissioner, Precinct No. Three and S. L. Cooke, County Commissioner, Precinct No. Four, and E. G. Crawford, Clerk of the County Court, and Ex Officio Clerk of the Commissioners Court of said Mills County, and H. C. Ezell, Sheriff of Mills County, Texas, when the following proceedings were had, to wit:

In Re. Local Option Election in and for Mills County, Texas:

On this the 27th day of December, A. D. 1907, the Honorable Commissioners Court of Mills County, Texas, met and was in Special session, at the court house of Mills County, Texas, in the town of Goldthwaite, in said county, for the purpose of opening the polls and counting the votes cast at the special election heretofore holden in and throughout the limits of said Mills County, on the said 16th day of December, A. D. 1907, for the purpose of enabling the legally qualified voters of, and residing in said Mills County, to determine whether or not the sale of intoxicating liquors shall be prohibited within the limits of said Mills County, Texas, as provided by Title LXIX, of the Revised Civil Statutes of Texas, and the several amendments thereto, and thereupon, it appearing to the court in open session, that E. G. Crawford, the Clerk of this court, in compliance with law, and in obedience to an order of this court, made and entered on the minute of this court on the 22nd day of November, A. D. 1907, ordering an election to be holden in and throughout the limits of said Mills County, on the 16th day of December, A. D. 1907, for the purposes aforesaid, has posted, and caused to be posted, five several copies of said order ordering said election, at five different public places within said county, to wit: One at Mullin; one at Center City; one at Priddy; one at Ebony, and one at the court house door of said county, in the town of Goldthwaite, in said county, for more than twelve (12) days next preceding the said day of election; and it further appearing to the court that the said election has been held in all respects in conformity with the laws governing such elections and the returns thereof made by the proper officer of each voting precinct in and throughout said county; thereupon, the court in open session, opened the polls, and counted the votes cast at said election, as the same were returned by the proper officer of each voting precinct in and throughout said Mills County, as required by law; and therefrom it appearing to the court that the total number of votes cast at said election was eleven hundred and sixty-seven (1167) and that seven hundred and twenty-one (721) of said votes were cast for prohibition, and that four hundred and forty-six (446) of said voters were cast against prohibition, and it appearing to the court therefrom that a majority of two hundred and seventy-five (275) of said votes were cast for prohibition, the result of said election is therefore here now so declared in favor of Prohibition.

It is therefore, on this the 27th day of December, A. D. 1907, ordered, adjudged and decreed by this, the Commissioners Court in and for Mills County, State of Texas, that the sale of intoxicating liquors be and the same is hereby absolutely prohibited within the limits of this the said county of Mills, State of Texas, as provided by Title LXIX of the Revised Civil Statutes of Texas; and

the several amendments thereto, excepted for the purposes and under the regulations specified in said Title of said statute, and the several amendments thereto, until such time as the qualified voters of said county may, at another legal election, held for that purpose, by a majority vote decide otherwise.

It is further ordered by the court that this order declaring the result of election be published for four successive weeks in some newspaper published in said Mills county, to be hereafter selected by the county judge in and for said county for that purpose, and that the fact of said publication be entered by the said county judge on the minutes of this court, and that thereupon, and therefrom, said law shall become operative.

It is further ordered by the court that the Record of Election Returns, vol. 1, page 78, be and the same are hereby made a part of these minutes. Done, and entered in open court, on this the 27th day of December, A. D. 1907. L. E. PATTERSON, County Judge, in and for Mills County, Texas.

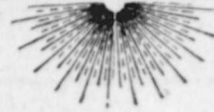

## The Foxes and the Geese.

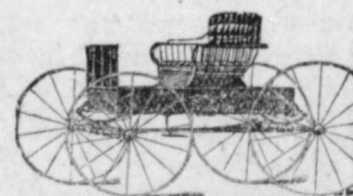
