#### NEIGHBORING NEWS.

Items Culled From the Leading Local Papers.

**BROWNWOOD.**  
Eugene Day, son of Capt. J. F. Day of Blanket, is a marine on the battleship Minnesota of Admiral Bob Evans' fleet that is now rounding Cape Horn on its famous trip to the Pacific.  
Sheriff Emison has been sued again by some of the parties who were with Mrs. Hughett at the time the sheriff took possession of certain premises that were being held by her and the others.  
The directors of the Walker-Smith wholesale grocery company had their regular annual meeting Tuesday night and among other matters of importance attended to, increased the capital stock of the company from \$200,000 to \$400,000.

Fire at the town of Winchell Monday night destroyed the stores and stocks of goods of E. E. Kilgore and J. D. Blacklock. Both of the buildings were of stone and were 60x100 feet or more in size. The fire was of unknown origin, starting in the rear of Kilgore's store between 11 and 12 o'clock at night, at which time it was discovered by a boy who was passing. The loss on stores and stocks will probably amount to as much as \$30,000. The insurance carried was something less than \$20,000.—News.

**COMANCHE**  
The recent two or three cases of small pox at DeLeon cost the county nearly \$600.

Dr. E. M. Bell and Miss Kate Ross, daughter of T. D. Ross, were married at the Methodist church at Sidney Sunday.

Despite the dull times the postmaster tells us the postal receipts at the Comanche office have been larger since Jan. 1 than for the same time last year. To Saturday night 10,984 bales

of cotton had been shipped out of Comanche this season. To same date last year there had been 24,481 bales shipped out.

Monday night Chief of Police Standifer and Deputy Vol Jackson arrested Zee Gammage on a federal warrant on a charge of deserting the army at Norfolk, Va.

Miss Bessie Burks has resigned as principal of the school at Newburg, on account of ill health and Abner Jeter, who has been assisting her, has been appointed as principal.

Never before was a greater acreage of oats planted in Comanche county as is now being planted. If the crop is good, and the present prospects are very encouraging, it will bring considerable money into the county in the summer.—Exponent.

**HAMILTON.**  
Mrs. Mattie Kreuger, wife of Charlie Kreuger, died Monday evening, after several weeks illness.

Treasurer A. J. Porter this week took up the last outstanding jail bond of \$2000 which puts Hamilton county clear of debt with over \$50,000 in her treasury.

Carlton has organized a Commercial club, with Dr. N. B. Bowie, president of the Farmers and Merchants Bank of that place, as president.

John L. Spurlin went to Fort Worth this week and returned Tuesday with Mrs. Spurlin, who has been in a sanitarium there under treatment for some time. We are glad to report her almost recovered to health.

The collection of 1907 taxes up to February 1 of this year is a fine index to the general financial condition of the people in Hamilton county, and shows an increase over the previous year of a little over \$8,000. Assistant Collector Roy Rice kindly furnished us a list of the collections

for each year as follows: For four months up to February 1, 1907, \$48,321.33; to February 1, 1908, \$54,369.05.—Herald.

**LAMPASAS.**  
The ladies of the cemetery association have about completed their arrangement to employ a regular sexton for cemetery work, and to keep him at work throughout the year in keeping the grass down in the walks and all the graves clean and free from rubbish.

Sheriff and Collector Jackson reports that the tax collections for the year 1907 are not so good as the year 1906. State taxes to the amount of \$18,501.20 were assessed for the year 1907, and of this amount \$17,982.48 has been collected. County taxes were assessed at \$30,086.65, and of this amount the sum of \$29,369.99 has been collected.—Leader.

**SAN SABA.**  
S. S. Campbell of Ratler was visiting at W. D. Moon's last week.

Mrs. Enoch Chandler died Monday night, February 3rd, at her home in the western part of town and was buried at the China Creek cemetery.

H. H. Doran was down Monday feeling good over the recent rains. He has fall oats and wheat growing and was getting seed to sow spring oats.

Sheriff Miller returned Monday with Ivy Rowan, who is now safely locked in the county jail. Rowan is charged with the theft of a horse and saddle from the Court House yard here in last December. He was arrested at Uvalde, Texas.

It is ordered that another wooden span be added to the approach to the Red Bluff bridge on the San Saba county side to be twenty feet in length and that the grade of the approach be raised nine feet. The contract for this work has been let to J. V. Carr.—News.

#### Time of the Resurrection.

One of the most interesting addresses delivered before the Baptist Bible school last week was that of Dr. O. L. Hailey of Comanche, one of the most learned divines of the denomination in Texas. His subject was the Resurrection, and he injected some new ideas into this lecture that put the audience to thinking. He assembled some splendid arguments to prove that the crucifixion took place on Wednesday instead of on Friday, as has been generally accepted, and that Christ arose on Saturday, having been in the ground three nights instead of two, as is commonly asserted. His treatment of the question was very scholarly and withal was so conclusive that it is calculated to create a stir in theological circles when it gains circulation in religious print, as it is sure to do.—Brownwood News.

ONE OF THE S. C. C.  
**Commissioners Court.**

Commissioners court was in  
session all of last week and a part  
of this week, having adjourned  
Wednesday afternoon,  
Reports of officers were exam-  
ined and approved and accounts  
were allowed for current ex-  
penses.

W. H. Olesby was appointed  
constable of precinct No. 4.  
Application of J. W. Gresham  
for Confederate pension was ap-  
proved.

The treasurer was instructed  
to set aside \$700 out of the court  
house fund for a sinking fund to  
redeem outstanding court  
house bonds and \$395.60 out of  
road and bridge fund for re-  
demption of road and bridge  
bonds, and \$285.60 to pay interest  
thereon. He was also ordered  
to redeem court house bonds Nos.  
7, 8, 9, 10 of the denomination of  
\$1000 and to pay interest on the  
three outstanding court house  
bonds, which are held by the  
school fund.

Road overseers were appointed  
and their names will be published  
next week.

Five stores were burglarized in Denison in one night last week.

The high winds last Friday unroofed a part of the Comanche public school building.

Darby & Key have purchased the stock of the Oliver wholesale grocery company at Lampasas.

The work on the \$60,000 dormitory at the college of industrial arts at Denton has been completed.

Influenza is claiming thousands of victims in London. The disease is similar to what is known here as lagrippe.

Col. Dick Wynn of Fort Worth has announced his candidacy for the Democratic nomination for attorney general.

The Santa Fe has posted notices in Temple and Cleburne round houses reducing the working hours at both places.

A proposition has been reported favorably to the San Angelo city council to pay the volunteer firemen of that city \$2 for each fire they attend.

The strike of the students of the A. & M. college terminated last Friday and school was resumed Monday. The board of directors sustained President Harrison in every matter.

Robbers looted the cashier of the Granite Falls, N. C., in the vault Saturday afternoon and then robbed the bank of all the money in sight. The cashier was not released until the following day.

Near Hattiesburg, Miss., last Saturday J. F. Wider, a wealthy lumber dealer, shot and killed W. I. Booth, a real estate dealer of Dallas. It is claimed the killing was the result of a quarrel over the settlement of an account.

Baron Takahira, Japanese ambassador to the United States, arrived Sunday. When asked the prospect of war between Japan and this country said that such a war was unthinkable and would be the most inhuman event in the history of the world.

That those in authority expect trouble between this country and Japan at no great distant day is shown in many ways, one of which is the detaching of army officers to Japan to study the language of that nation. One officer was ordered from San Antonio to Tokyo this week for that purpose.

The City Council of Hubbard City has appropriated \$500 for the purpose of converting the public square at this place into a public park and to erect thereon an auditorium for public meetings of all kinds. It is planned to raise by private subscription at least \$1,000 additional for the purpose.

If a man wants to get acquainted with human nature let him edit a newspaper a while. Until he has served in that capacity he knows nothing of the ups and downs in life. He may be a preacher, a banker, a merchant, a horse trader or a farmer, or he may have practiced law, sawed wood, been a road overseer or a member of the school board, but he needs a brief experience as editor to complete his knowledge of the eccentricities of human nature.—Fort Worth Star.

## Mills County Road Law

(Continued from last week.)

Sec. 4. It shall be the duty of the county commissioner, when acting as road commissioner, to inform himself of the condition of the public roads of his district, and shall determine what character of work shall be done upon said roads, and shall direct the manner of grading, draining or otherwise improving the same, which direction shall be observed and obeyed by all road overseers in said district.

Sec. 5. Each road overseer shall, during each year, call out all hands subject to road duty to work five days, and he shall see that each hand when called out shall perform a good day's work, and if any hand, when so called out, shall fail or refuse to perform a good day's work, or to work in the manner that the overseer shall direct, he shall be liable to the same penalty as if he had failed to appear in obedience to the summons, and any road overseer, when he shall deem expedient, and at the time of notifying any hand to work upon the road, may also summon such hands as may be the owner of a team suitable for work to bring such team with him to be used in working upon the road during such time as hand may be notified to work upon the road, and after such notice given if any such hand shall fail or refuse to bring his team with him, as notified to do, he shall be liable to the same penalty as if he had failed to appear in obedience to the summons; provided, that any hand for so doing shall be credited with and allowed two and one-half days upon the time for which he is liable for road duty for each day he may work in connection with and while furnishing such team, and one and one-half days for his team without such hand.

Sec. 6. A "good day's work," under this act, shall consist of eight hours' labor for road hands, and ten hours labor for hired hands.

Sec. 7. Each county commissioner, when acting as road commissioner, shall require each road overseer in his district to call out the hands assigned to his work at such times and in such numbers as may be necessary to perform the work required on any road, but no road hand shall be required to work exceeding five days in any one year, or two days with himself and team, unless the term of service prescribed by the general law require a longer time; provided, that all road hands in any precinct shall, as far as practicable, be worked on uniform time; the commissioners court shall allow to any overseer who shall be engaged in the charge of the duties of his office for more than five days during any one year a commission or compensation of \$1.50 per day for the time so served; provided, that such service shall be done under the written order of the road commissioner of his precinct, and said order shall accompany the overseer's account for such services.

Sec. 8. At the regular February term of the commissioners court in each year said court shall appoint and commission all road overseers for the ensuing year, and said appointments shall not be made at the suggestions of the hands of the road, but the commissioners court shall select persons known to be of good moral character who are qualified and able to discharge the duties of road overseer.

Sec. 9. Any road overseer who shall negligently or intentionally fail or refuse to perform any of the duties required by the law or by the commissioners court, or by the road commissioner of his precinct, or who shall fail or refuse to serve as overseer, when appointed by commissioners court, without a lawful excuse, shall be fined in any sum not exceeding \$25.

Sec. 10. If any person, liable to work on the public roads in Mills county, after being legally summoned, shall wilfully or intentionally fail or refuse to attend either in person or by able and competent substitute, or fail or refuse to furnish his team or tools at the time and place designated by the person summoning him, or to pay to his road overseer the sum of \$1 for each day he may have been notified to work on said road, or to pay to the overseer the sum of \$1.50 for each day he may have been notified to furnish his team for road work, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction shall be fined in any sum not exceeding \$10.

Sec. 11. At the first regular term of the commissioners in each year all road overseers shall make their re-

ports under oath upon the forms furnished them by said court, and all accounts for services or labor performed for overwork by said overseer during the past year, and of all money received by them shall be audited and credited.

Sec. 12. Every person liable to work on the public roads in Mills county who shall, on or before the day appointed to work his road, pay to his overseer the sum of \$1 for each day he is summoned to work and \$1.50 for each day he is summoned to furnish his team for road work, shall be exempt from working or furnishing his team for each day paid for, and shall also be exempt from any penalty for failure to work or furnish such team for the time for which he has so paid. All sums of money received by any overseer under the provision of this section shall be by him paid to the county treasurer of Mills county within twenty days from the day he received the same, and the county treasurer shall execute his receipt therefor, and place the same to the credit of the road and bridge fund of the commissioners precinct in which such overseer resides, and shall be applied as provided in Section 14 hereof.

Sec. 13. Any citizen of Mills county subject to road duty who shall, on or before the first day of February of any year, pay to the county commissioner of the precinct in which he resides, or the county treasurer of said county, the sum of \$3, shall be exempt from road duty for such year, beginning on the first day of February. The county commissioner shall receive and receipt for all moneys so paid, and shall at the first regular term of the commissioners court thereafter pay over all sums so received to the county treasurer, taking his receipt therefor, and such commissioner shall furnish to the county treasurer a statement under oath showing the amount so collected by him, and by whom paid. Any commissioner who shall fail to comply with or neglect any provision of this section shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction shall not be fined less than \$10 nor more than \$100.

Sec. 14. The county treasurer shall receive and receipt for all moneys so paid him, and shall place the same to the credit of the road and bridge fund of the commissioner's precinct in which it was collected, and the same shall be used for the benefit of the roads and bridges in said precinct. The county treasurer shall, on the second Monday in February of each year, furnish the commissioners court a list of all persons who have paid said sums provided for in this section, stating in what commissioner's precinct said persons reside, and the county clerk shall make out and attach to each road overseer's commission a list of the names of all persons in his precinct who shall have paid said \$3.

Sec. 15. The tax collector of Mills county shall, on or before the thirty-first day of March of each year, furnish to the commissioners court of said county a full and complete list of all persons who have failed to pay their poll tax for the preceding year, and any such delinquent shall be subject to road duty for a period of three days during the ensuing year, and they shall be summoned as in other cases to work on the road in the precinct in which said person resides, and the performance of the road service provided for in this section shall not exonerate such persons from any other road duty to which they may be subject, but this provision shall be taken as cumulative. Any person summoned to work the roads of Mills county under the provisions of this section who shall fail or refuse to obey such summons and do good and efficient labor, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor thereof, and shall be fined in any sum not exceeding \$25. But any person summoned to work the roads under the provisions of this section may be relieved from such duty by paying the amount of the poll tax due, together with costs and penalties and exhibiting his poll tax receipt assigned by the tax collector of Mills county.

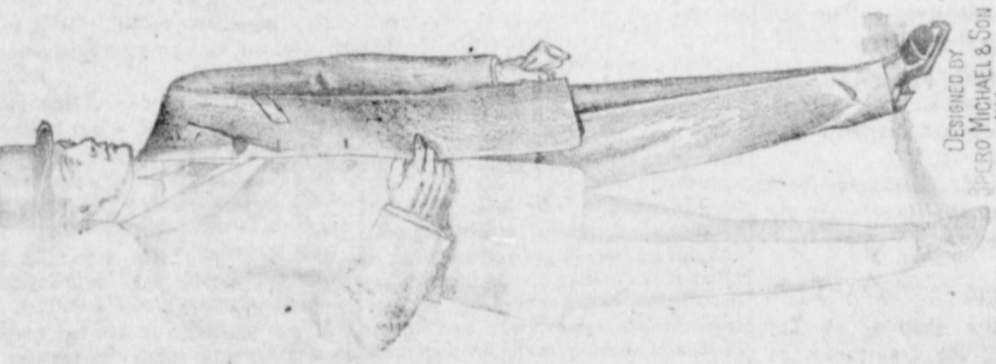

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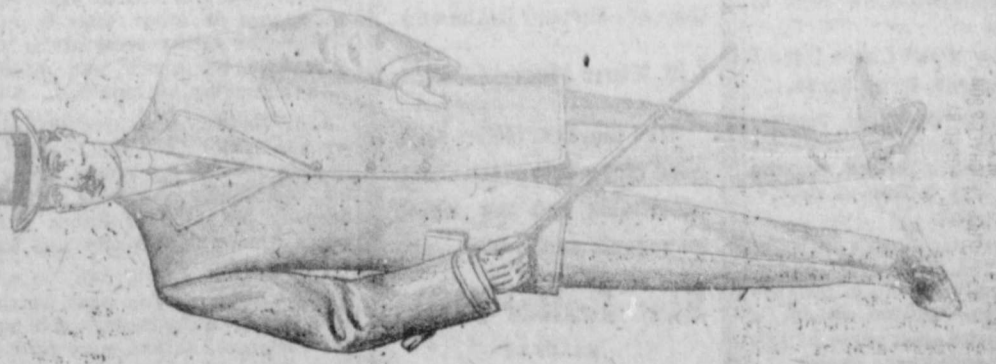

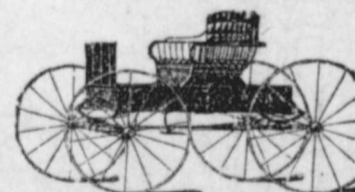
