### NEIGHBORING NEWS.

Items Culled From the Leading Local Papers.

#### HAMILTON.

Judge J. A. Edson died at his home in this city Tuesday morning, February 18, at about 3:00 o'clock.

Will Tinsley returned last Friday from Garland, Texas, where on Saturday, February 8, he attended the funeral of his father, W. A. Tinsley, who had just died at his home in that city.

The Rustler is reliably informed that the officials of the S. N. & S. T. railroad now have under advisement the matter of extending their line north from Stephenville a distance of some thirty miles, to a connection with the Texas & Pacific railroad, probably at Thurber or Strawn.

The barn of Pete Durham, situated on north Reagan Avenue, was totally consumed by fire last Sunday night about 9 o'clock. The contents, consisting of about 100 bushels of ear corn, some baled hay, sheaf oats, etc., were also totally consumed. The fire originated in the upper story from some unknown cause.—Rustler.

#### BROWNWOOD.

W. St. John Wolsey left this morning for Fort Worth where he expects to make his home in the future.

Sheriff Emison received the mandates from the higher court affirming the decision of the lower courts in the conviction of John Byrd and Milt Dupree, in the contempt cases here. The two defendants paid \$100 each to the sheriff, the amount of the fines imposed by Judge Goodwin.

The attorney for the Anti-Unionist of the Presbyterian church in this city today received copies of the opinion handed down last week by Chancellor Bullock of the court of appeals of Tennessee, in which the Chancellor sustained the contention of the Anti-Unionists to their right to the church property. The case is said to be similar to the Brownwood case.

County Attorney McLaugh, special council I. J. Rice and Sheriff Emison yesterday concluded negotiations with the parties who have at various times been indicted in this city and county for violations of the local option laws, and by the terms of the agreement entered into, the sixteen parties signing their names are to leave Brown-

wood and are not to come back for a period of ten years, except for a visit not to exceed five days.—Bulletin.

## Mills County Road Law.

(Continued from last week.)  
 Sec. 16. Each county commissioner, when acting as road commissioner shall be entitled to \$2.50 per day for services actually performed; provided, that he shall not receive more than \$80 per quarter. Said per diem shall be paid out of the road and bridge fund of his precinct after the account thereof shall have been approved by the commissioners court; provided, that the said court shall not approve said account unless the commissioner presenting it shall make oath that the account is just, due and unpaid. Said account shall specify the number of days actually performed, and that it was necessary to be done, and if he worked only a part of a day the number of hours worked shall be stated, and no commissioner shall be entitled to pay as road commissioner while he is performing the duties of county commissioner, nor shall he receive any other pay than that provided for in this section for the inspection or supervision of the roads in his precinct, or for any other road service.  
 Sec. 17. The commissioners court of Mills county shall have the power, and it shall be the duty of said court, whenever, in its opinion, the convenience of the public demands it, to order the laying out and establishing of new roads, including the appointment of a jury of view to assess damages as provided for by the general law, or the widening, changing or discontinuance of old public roads, and said court may act upon its own motion or upon the application of freeholders as hereinafter directed. All expenses of laying out and establishing new roads, changing or straightening existing ones shall be paid out of the funds of the commissioner's precinct where such new road is laid out and established, or where such change or straightening is made; provided, that where the establishment of new roads or changes of old ones are made in more than one commissioner's precinct, then the expenses shall be paid according to the length of the new road, or change in each precinct.  
 Sec. 18. All applications for a new road and all applications to change or discontinue an existing one shall be by petition to the commissioners court, signed by at least eight freeholders of the precinct in which such road is desired to be made or discontinued or changed, specifying in such petition the beginning and termination of such road proposed to be opened, changed or discontinued, but the commissioner's court shall not grant such application for the establishment of a new road or the change or discontinuance of an existing one, unless the persons making application therefor, or some one of them, shall have given at least twenty days' notice by written advertisement of their intended application by posting up at the court house door of Mills


county, and at two other public places in the vicinity of the route of the proposed new road, or road proposed to be discontinued; provided, that such notice shall not be necessary when the new road proposed to be established or change proposed to be made shall be described in the application designating lines, etc., and the right of way therefor granted to the county for use as a public road, and said proposed change to be made without expense to Mills county.  
 Sec. 19. When one or more persons have lands within an inclosure, either or all of them may petition the commissioners court for a third class road to their nearest trading point, mill, gin, postoffice, school and church house, or county seat, and the court may open such road whenever it is deemed of sufficient importance in the same manner as other public roads are opened, but shall not require or cause the road to be worked.  
 Sec. 20. The commissioners court of Mills county may, upon its own motion, or upon the presentation of a petition signed by 100 qualified property taxpaying voters, order an election to be held in Mills county by the qualified property taxpaying voters of said county to determine whether or not additional annual ad valorem tax, not to exceed 15 cents on the \$100 valuation, shall be levied upon all the property in said county subject to taxation, for road and bridge purposes in addition to the amount now authorized to be levied by general law. Said election shall be held and conducted, and the returns thereof, so far as practicable, in the same manner as is required by the general election law; at said election each ballot shall have written on it the following: "For the Tax," or "Against the Tax," as the case may be. At said election no person shall be permitted to vote unless he be a qualified property taxpaying voter of Mills county. The commissioners court of said county shall convene in special or regular session within ten days after said election, and receive the returns and declare the result of said election, and if a majority of the votes cast in said county shall be in favor of said additional tax, the said court shall enter an order upon its minutes duly declaring the result of said election, and thereafter as soon as practicable it shall levy an additional annual ad valorem tax for road and bridge purposes, not to exceed 15 cents on the \$100 valuation upon the property in said county subject to taxation. And annually thereafter said tax shall be levied and collected as other taxes until such time as the qualified property taxpaying voters of said county at an election for that purpose shall otherwise determine, on which account an election shall be ordered by the commissioners court upon a petition of at least 100 qualified taxpaying voters of the county; provided that said court may at any

time, within its discretion, order such election of its own intention without such petition. All elections provided for in this section may be ordered either at a regular or special session of the commissioners court, within its own discretion. In case a tax is levied, all funds arising therefrom shall be expended among the several commissioners precincts, according to the assessed value in each precinct.  
 Sec. 21. This act shall be taken by all courts in the manner as the general law of this State, and it shall be construed to be cumulative of the general laws of the State on the subject of roads and bridges when not in conflict therewith, but, in case of conflict, this act shall control as to Mills County.  
 Sec. 22. The fact that there is no sufficient general road law in force in this State, creates an emergency and an imperative public necessity that the constitutional rule requiring bills to be read on three several days be suspended, and that this act take effect and be in force from and after its passage, and it is so enacted.  
 Approved April 3, 1907.  
 Became a law April 3, 1907.

### Poll Tax Payments.

By reference to the road law of Mills county it will be seen that those who fail to pay their poll tax are subject to three days work on the public roads, regardless of whether or not they are over the road working age. The law makes it the collector's duty to deliver a list of the delinquent poll tax payers to the commissioners on or before March 31 of each year, in order that such delinquents may be summoned to work on the public roads. If they do not care to do this work they will have to pay the poll tax together with costs. Those who have paid their poll tax are requested to pay before the close of March, in order that I may not be forced to place their names on the list of delinquents.

The young folks enjoyed a nice social at Mr. Stewart's Saturday night, also one Friday night week at Tom Brooks'.

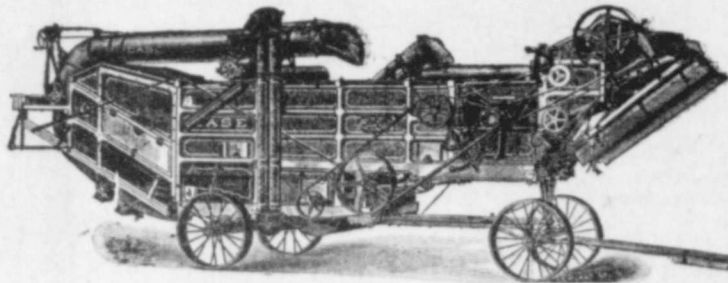
