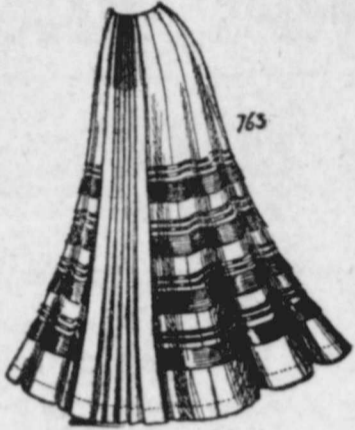

BROWNWOOD.

Dr. McCarver, county physician, was called to Blanket yesterday where there are 15 well developed cases of smallpox. In addition to these Blanket cases, there are four cases of smallpox in Brownwood, but all, including those at Blanket, are mild cases and but little alarm has been occasioned by them.

While out riding in an automobile near Burkett, Coleman county, last Friday afternoon, J. W. Remington, a traveling salesman who is well known in this part of the state, was thrown from the vehicle and sustained a broken leg. The steering gear on the auto became out of order somehow and the machine began to cut all kinds of didos, throwing Mr. Remington out.—News.

It appears that Mr. Evans had gone out to fish in a tank four miles south of town and was not missed for a day or two when a friend went to the tank and found his lifeless body floating on the water.—Chief.

HAMILTON.

The election in Hamilton county last Saturday resulted in the defeat of prohibition by a majority of 45.

An excursion train was run into Hamilton over the S. N. & S. S. Ry. last Friday evening, and about 300 excursionists from points along the line spent a few hours in our town.

We regret to chronicle the death last Monday morning at McClain's Sanitarium in Waco of Fritz Schrank one of the foremost citizens of Hamilton county. The remains were taken to Friddy Thursday and laid to rest by the side of his father and mother.

At a meeting of the Hamilton business men's club Wednesday morning the matter of securing a cotton seed oil mill was taken up and it was determined that something be done in that direction at once.

SAN SABA.

A suit has been filed in the District Court by S. T. Taylor against San Saba Water Co. for damages in the sum of \$1,000 for abridgement of his rights as a plumber and also injunction proceedings.

The approach on the Lampasas side of the Red Bluff bridge is reported in bad condition. Some of the braces gave way and the dirt fell in. The attention of Lampasas commissioners' has been called to it and it will be remedied very soon.

The penitentiary agent came after McCoy Sunday and carried him back to Huntsville to finish out his time. He will be returned here during district court to answer charges of burglary and arson in connection with the Richland Springs burning.—Star.

From New Mexico.

Monument, N. M., March 13.

Dear Old Bird:

I will drop you a few seeds for the first time in my life.

I have been living in New Mexico for six years and four months. I found this country to be like all other countries, if a man hustles he can live. It is a free grass country and plenty of good water from 20 to 60 feet, but not much wood. We use roots and prairie coal here. We have good schools. Some people think Mexico is a rough place to live, but you can find some good people here in this country.

This country is pretty dry, but we raise enough feed stuff here to feed our stock if we will work our land. I will advise the people not to cough out here unless they have some money to improve their place with, for work is hard to get since the country has begun to settle up.

Monument is at the foot of the plains on the west side, fifteen miles west of the east line of New Mexico. About 70 per cent of the land is level and the balance is rolling. We can raise fruit, vegetables, corn, cotton, oats, wheat, millet, etc.

We have three churches at Monument and preaching nearly every Sunday.

There is one negro or Mexican school and we have no school district four public schools. The people here are all from Texas, Oklahoma or Missouri.

Miss Ethel Stephens is quite sick with typhoid fever.

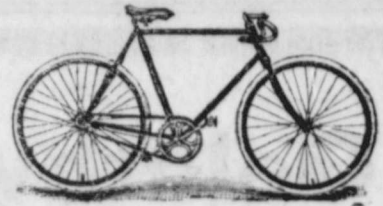
Mr. Dickson of Iredell is in the city visiting his daughter, Mrs. C. L. Stephens.

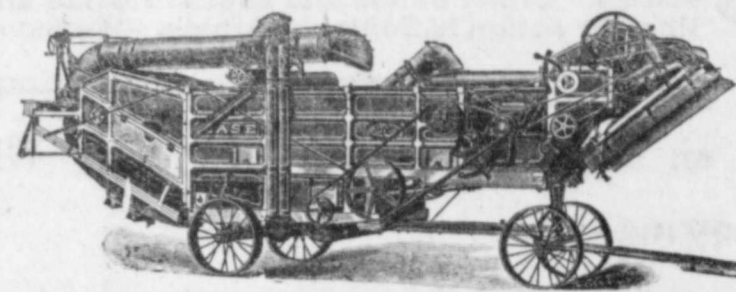

MANY BEAUTIFUL HATS.

A. J. GATLIN

Will Enforce the Law.

March 18, 1908.

Editor Eagle:

I notice in your last issue that my name is again placed on the ticket for City Attorney; and I will state that I have, since it was placed there, agreed with those who placed it there, to allow it to remain upon the distinct understanding that I will hereafter proceed to enforce every ordinance of Goldthwaite, and will not, as heretofore, allowed them habitually disobeyed and ignored. And I will make absolutely no exceptions whatever.

I drew an ordinance for the council some time ago, which was adopted abolishing the office of marshal, and creating a police office; and I inserted a provision that failure on the part of the officer to report all violations of ordinances would subject the \$1000.00 of that officer to forfeiture. And if I serve as attorney any longer, I shall take advantage of that ordinance, and shall file complaint for every violation that is brought to my notice. And I will prosecute them, too, if it keeps me in court every day of the week;—until I get tired, and then I will resign.

The ordinances, as I remember them, are as follows:

1. Allowing any goods, or other articles to remain on the sidewalk, except for three feet next the wall. Poultry not being allowed on the walk at all.

2. Leaving any team hitched, unand not in the care of some competent person.

3. Throwing any animal or vegetable substance on a street or alley; or obstructing the running of water in any ditch or gutter.

4. All stables and lots, etc., to be kept in an entirely sanitary condition.

5. No green hide to be kept in the city more than twenty-four hours without the consent of the mayor or committee.

6. Riding of bicycle, etc., on the sidewalk.

7. Saddling or riding any wild animal on the street or square.

8. Discharging any firecracker or roman candle in certain limits.

9. Going within eight feet of a passenger train at the station without having lawful business calling the person there.

10. Keeping a hog pen within certain limits, (of which the marshal will inform any person interested.)

11. The "canning" of any animal, so as to frighten it and make it run.

12. The slaughtering of any animal, except hogs under certain restrictions.

13. The fencing of any lot with barb wire, or any substance calculated to cause injury.

14. The erection of a wooden building within certain limits, without a permit.

15. The tying of any animal on or near a street or alley to graze, or tie to the fence another.

16. The turning out of any stock, (including calves.)

17. Allowing minors in a pool room.

18. Tying any animal to an awning post.

19. Feeding any animal along or near a sidewalk.

20. Burning any substance on a street or alley at any time except between 8:00 and 9:00 a. m., and then only when the fire is in the continuous care of some person over 13 years of age.

21. Certain restrictions concerning stallions, etc.

22. Driving an automobile or other motor vehicle at a rate of more than 8 miles per hour.

23. All other offenses of which the Justice of the Peace has jurisdiction; any of which may be presented in the Recorder's Court.

There may be a few other ordinances which I have over looked, and violations of which I will prosecute without further notice, if I serve another term, as I will prosecute violation of any other ordinance here after adopted.

I did not wish to be troubled with the office, and took it at the earnest solicitation of many citizens who wished me to put the tax matters of the city in a condition where taxes could be collected by suit if necessary; and so that streets could be opened by condemnation proceedings. I have done this, virtually without cost of the city and am willing to continue for another term only upon the conditions mentioned.

The Eagle will not have to drop many names from its list when the first of the coming month arrives and the new postal regulations become effective, but there will be a few, we fear, who will have to be dropped from the list. This is very much regretted by the Eagle, for most of the subscribers are our personal friends and some of them can not understand that the national government can have anything to do with the Eagle's subscription accounts and they probably think the publisher is in some way to blame for the new condition of affairs. The same law governs every publication in the United States and hereafter a paper can not be sent through the postoffice to a subscriber who is more than one year in arrears for subscription. The Eagle editor certainly hopes that every subscriber will continue to read the paper to the end of time, but those who are more than one year in arrears for subscription can not expect us to violate the postal law in order to continue the paper to them, however much we would like to retain their names on the list, and we do not believe there is a subscriber on the list who would want us to swear falsely or violate the law. April 1 is the time the new regulations become effective.

City Council.

The city council met in regular session Monday night.

The mayor was instructed to secure election blanks at a cost of \$4.

Jas. Rahl was allowed \$10 for holding the late incorporation election.

The street committee made a partial report on opening the new streets and asked for more time, which was granted.

The street committee was instructed to examine the county road grader and if found to be in good condition the secretary was instructed to draw a warrant for \$100 in favor of the county for the purchase of the grader to be used for street work.

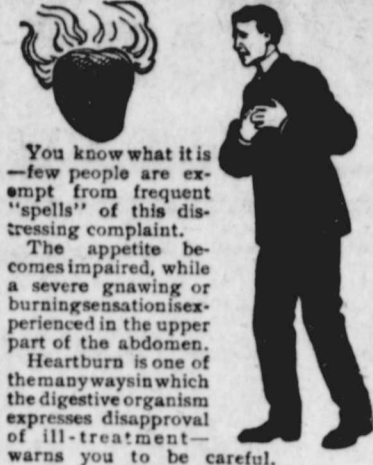
