#### NEIGHBORING NEWS.

Items Culled From the Leading Local Papers.

##### BROWNWOOD.

Dr. Earl Bell returned Monday from a two weeks' trip through portions of Brewster and Jeff Davis counties.

Dr. E. B. Garner, the magnetic healer, returned last week from a trip through the best towns of the west along the Texas Pacific road.

Last Saturday a number of the road overseers of the county met upon invitation of Judge Brumfield in a conference for the discussion of ways and means of improving the highways.

From the sheriff's office it was learned that Claud Robinson, a prisoner, escaped from the convict camp the latter part of last week. He managed to release his feet from the irons during the night.

Col. G. I. Goodwin received an invitation to attend the laying of the corner stone of Goodwin Hall, a fine new \$50,000 dormitory that is being erected at College Station in connection with the A. & M. College, and left this morning to be present at the ceremonies.—News.

##### COMANCHE

The smallpox cases are about a thing of the past.

Dr. P. H. Chilton of Corpus Christi has been here this week. He and his family will move to Gorman, where he will open a sanitarium.

The anti-Bailey men of Comanche met at the court house Monday night and organized a central anti-Bailey club of 250 members.

A county mass meeting of the supporters of Senator Bailey was held at the court house yesterday afternoon at 2 o'clock.

To Saturday night 11,438 bales of cotton had been shipped from Comanche. To same date last year the shipments were 30,198. About 500 bales are still in the warehouse and yards.

The school board has placed ladders at several of the second-

story windows in the west side building, to be used as fire escapes, and the doors at all the buildings have been made to open outward.

Ten weeks ago O. O. Brightman, G. A. Chilton and Frank Wilson bought three leagues of land in Gaines county. This week they sold the land to a Fort Worth party named Bennett for \$90,000, a clear profit of \$30,000 on the deal.—Exponent.

##### HAMILTON.

Uncle Tommy Winters, 74 years of age, died at his home near Evant last Friday and his remains were laid to rest in the cemetery there the following day.

J. T. James received a telegram Thursday morning from Marshfield, Mo., notifying him of the serious illness of his mother and he left on the afternoon train for her home.

The election ordered by the trustees to determine whether or not bonds for \$10,000 should be issued to erect additional school building, resulted in a victory Tuesday in favor of the bond issue by the decisive vote of 103 to 13.

Ebb Jones has finished distributing two bushels of German sugar beet seed sent him by the Frisco people. When the beets are grow they will be tested, and if found rich in sugar, capitalists will be prevailed on to erect factories in this section to manufacture them into sugar.

Col. L. J. Polk, one of the most successful railroad promoters in the south, is now vice president and general manager of the S. N. & S. T. railroad, having taken charge of the office on March 16. Mr. Polk was at one time vice president and general manager of the great Santa Fe system.—Herald.

W. L. Linn and Ralph Owen delivered last week to N. R. Sloan 100 steer yearlings.

F. F. Edwards and W. C. Edwards have purchased 1000 head of sheep from W. L. Bannister and took over a five year lease on the Doffemyer ranch eight miles south of town. Winston will have charge of the ranch.

The local W. C. T. U. of Terrell has established a public drinking fountain in that city.

Robbers blew open the safe in the San Antonio and Aransas Pass depot at Waring, Texas, securing about \$40.

A. Roland, brakeman at Texarkana, fell under an engine in the yards, and his right leg was ground off below the knee, last Thursday.

The trustees of the public school at Comanche have placed large ladders at each of the windows of the second floor of the school building as temporary fire escapes.

President Neill of the Farmers Union says the cotton acreage will be considerably reduced in Texas this year. He says the Union now has 323 warehouses in operation.

While en route to a fire at Denison Saturday night, Don Freels, a fireman fell off of a hose wagon and was run over. His injuries are believed to be serious.

Newton Gunter of San Angelo was struck on the cheek by a base ball at Miles, Friday afternoon, and so severely injured he has not been able to be moved home.

Col. C. P. Vance, an aged citizen of Taylor, was accidentally run down by an ice wagon team Sunday. He was stunned and bruised, though not seriously injured.

A physician from Rogers, Arkansas, is planning to establish a sanitarium for the treatment of tuberculosis at San Angelo. The tent system will be used, situated out three or four miles from the city.

The railroad commission of Texas will probably apply to Judge Meek of the federal court to direct the receiver of the International and Great Northern railroad to devote a part of the revenues of the road to bettering the road bed with equipment, as was ordered by the commission before the receiver was appointed.

A meeting of the Democrats favorable to Senator Bailey was held at Fort Worth last Saturday. The attendance was variously estimated at from 4500 to 10,000 and the gathering was very enthusiastic. 

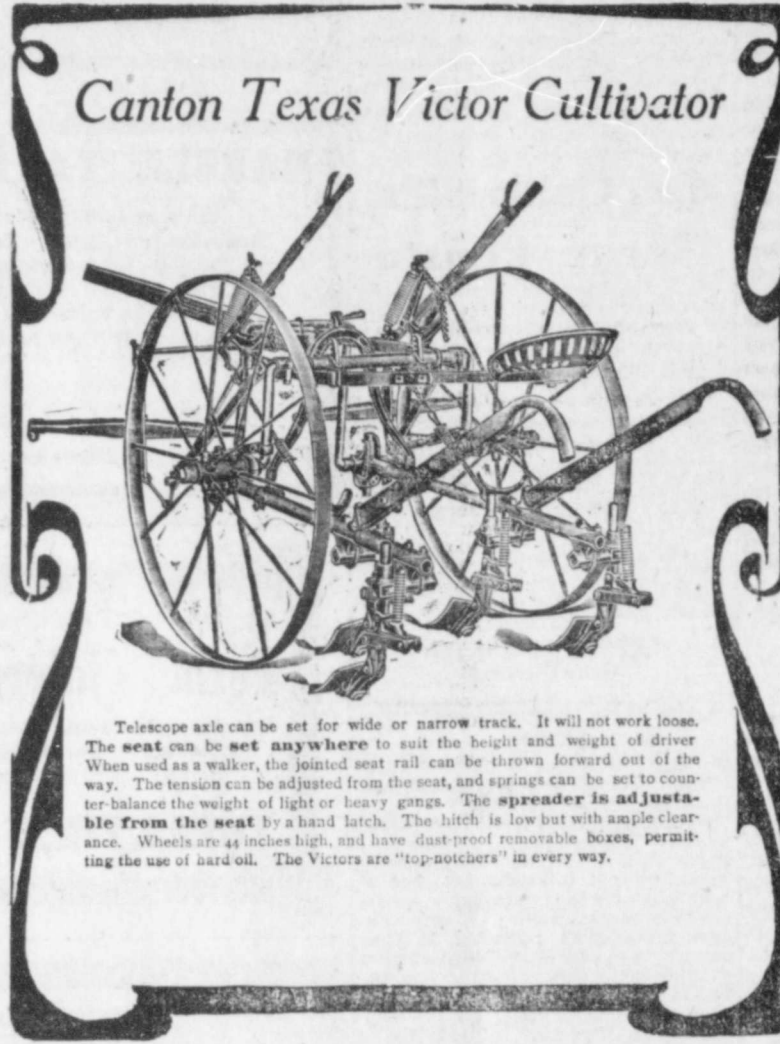
