To take effect May 18, 1908.

Ordinances of Goldthwaite.

CHAPTER XXIX.

An ordinance of the city of Goldthwaite, Mills County, Texas, organizing a Corporation Court in and for such city, under act of the 26th Legislature, page 40, providing all details thereabout; and authorizing the election of a recorder to be the Judge of such Court in place of the Mayor, and providing for the secretary of the city to be the clerk of such court; and adopting a seal for such court; and providing for the taxation of costs in such court, and fixing the compensation of the officers of such court; and providing for the collection of fines and costs imposed in such court by execution or by imprisonment as allowed by law.

Be it ordained by the city council of the city of Goldthwaite, that there is herenow and hereby organized and provided for a Corporation Court in and for the city of Goldthwaite, as the same is created and established by act of the 26th Legislature, page 40; and the Mayor of the city shall no longer be ex officio recorder of such Court, but there shall be elected as provided in that act, a recorder, other than the Mayor, to preside over such Court; and in case of a vacancy in the office of recorder, the same shall be filled by appointment of a recorder by the council in the manner allowed by the law; such recorder to be elected for the term of two years; and if appointed, to be appointed strictly in accordance with law.

Be it further ordained by the city council of the city of Goldthwaite, that the city secretary of Goldthwaite shall be and is here declared to be, ex-officio clerk of such Corporation Court, with full power given the clerk of such Court by act of the 26th Legislature, chapter 33, section 5; and he is authorized to appoint a deputy, as provided in said act; and he shall hold such ex-officio office during his term as city secretary; and shall be entitled to the same fees for issuing all process, and performing any other acts as such clerk, that are allowed the justice of the peace for like services in his Court.

Be it further ordained by the city council of the city of Goldthwaite, that the compensation of the recorder of such Court and his fees therein shall be the same as are allowed justices of the peace for like services in that Court; and the compensation of the city attorney in said Court, and the fees allowed him, shall be the same as are allowed the county attorney for like services in the justice of the peace Courts; and the compensation and fees of the police marshal or other peace officer acting for the city in the matter of criminal cases in the Corporation Court, shall be the same as are allowed sheriffs and constables for like services in the justice of the peace Courts.

Be it further ordained by the city council of the city of Goldthwaite, that all persons convicted in a criminal case in the Corporation Court herein provided for, shall, upon such conviction be committed to the custody of the police marshal of the city, or such other like officer as may be serving the city in the capacity of marshal or chief police; and upon such commitment shall be confined in the County jail of Mills county, Texas, if arrangements then exist by which such imprisonment is provided for; or shall be imprisoned in such other place as may then be provided for such persons; and shall be so imprisoned and kept for the period provided in the ordinance under which such person may be convicted, if convicted under and ordinance or law providing for a period of imprisonment; but if the ordinance or law under which such person is convicted does not provide for a period of imprisonment in case the fine and costs are not paid, then such person shall be committed and held in such imprisonment for a term of ten days, as allowed by law, in case the fine and costs are not paid; and such person may be put to labor on the streets of the city during such term of imprisonment; and when such person shall have discharged such fine and costs, either by payment or by imprisonment, the city shall be liable to the officers of the said Court for their costs as herein provided.

The said Corporation Court shall have a seal, having engraved thereon a star of five points, in the center, and the words, Corporation Court in Goldthwaite, Texas, thereon, the impress of which shall be attached to all proceedings required by law to be so authenticated.

This ordinance shall be in effect immediately after its passage and the publication required by law.

Passed, approved and adopted this May 9, 1908, at a called meeting of the city council of Goldthwaite, by unanimous vote of the council; and the rule requiring ordinances to be read three several times being unanimously suspended. And this original ordinance is ordered to be filed in the office of the secretary and if approved by the Mayor, is to be signed by him, and there kept as chapter 29 of the ordinances of the city; and the same shall thereupon be at once published in the Goldthwaite Eagle as required by law.

Which ordinance, passed as aforesaid, was filed with the secretary, and by me examined and approved, and ordered to be there kept, and published as aforesaid. This May 15, 1908. J. H. RANDOLPH, Mayor of Goldthwaite. Attest: L. E. MILLER, Secretary.

Little Glenn Norman Weatherby.

At 11 o'clock on the 13th day of May, 1908, Little Glenn Norman Weatherby, infant son of Mr. and Mrs. Norman Weatherby, died of heart failure. With the birth of little Glenn on the 19th day of October, 1907, was born a new joy to that already happy couple and every day he stayed with them bound him closer to their hearts. Are you a father or mother? Then you know what that baby meant to that home and to his parents. And have you looked upon the still cold form of your own little one for whom you would gladly have died? Then you know what they feel and only silence is fitting. To those who have not known these relations, words are too weak to tell their meaning, and again only silence is fitting.

With the news of this sweet baby's death the writer remembered afresh a similar report about another six months old baby boy. Over the lifeless form of little Glenn the writer saw again another little body still and pale and dead. Another little grave is keeping company with little Glenn's grave in the thoughts of the writer tonight. Every pang of grief, every feeling of bereavement felt by these parents is familiar to me. Experience teaches her lessons well. Experience alone can enable us to suffer with those bereaved as are this father and mother. But this experience were unavailing did it not enable us to know that beyond the stormy darkness of this grief lies the sunlight of peace and resignation and the happy consciousness that it is best, knowing that when lives like this go out, they go upon triumphant lines to brighter fields amid fairer flowers and sweeter songs, where there is no sorrow, no death but eternal youth, eternal spring, eternal sunshine, for truly your baby is not dead, but lives. "The wages of sin is death," and death is separation from God, but your precious baby knew no sin and by reason of the great common salvation that is his by virtue of the fact that "in Christ are all made alive," he is happy with God and the angels. Why the God of love was willing to give little Glenn the happiness of heaven so soon is not for us to know now, but we shall know why He did not give this little one to know more of life's pleasures, we shall thank Him that He did not inflict on him the sorrows and disappointments of life, but took him early to be with Him in glory.

Let us study again every line of that sweet poem written because of bereavement and as the author said, "With peace in my heart, and not without tears in my eyes."

There is a Reaper whose name is Death And with his sickle keen, He reaps the bearded grain at a breath, And the flowers that grow between. Shall I have naught that is fair? Have naught but the bearded grain? Though the breath of the flowers is sweet to me, I will give them all back again. He gazed at the flowers with tearful eyes, He kissed their drooping leaves; It was for the Lord of Paradise He bound them in his sheaves. My Lord has need of those flowerets gay! The Reaper said and smiled; Dear tokens of the earth are they, Where he was once a child. Commissioners Court.

Commissioners court has been in regular quarterly session this week.

A contract was closed with C. Q. Horton of Austin for rebuilding the Slack crossing bridge for \$1000.

A contract was closed with D. Y. Childers of Mullin for repairing Jackson crossing bridge for \$497.

The jury of view for the road petitioned for by J. W. Driskill and others made a report recommending that the road be established and assessing damages to land owners. The report was approved.

An election was ordered held in North Brown school district June 13, to determine whether or not a special tax of 10 cents on the \$100 valuation should be levied and J. B. F. Wigley was appointed officer of election.

The result of special tax election in Fairview school district was found to be favorable to the tax.

The elections in Trigger mountain and Kelley school districts to determine whether or not the special should be reduced to 10 cents on \$100 valuation resulted in favor of the reduction.

Application of James Shaw Kamplain for a Confederate pension was approved.

The contract for repairing the Colorado river bridge at Lunsford crossing, which was submitted to the San Saba court last week, was cancelled as the San Saba court declined to share the expense of the repairs. The bridge was built by Mills county, but one-half interest was deeded to San Saba county, in order that the bridge might be kept in repair by the two counties, consequently the Mills county court does not care to make the repairs without assistance from San Saba county. The San Saba court notified the court here that it was not thought advisable by that body to pay out any more money on repairing the bridge at its present location, but if a new location could be agreed upon San Saba county would assist in building another bridge. Under these circumstances, it is not likely that the bridge will be repaired for some time to come, if it is ever repaired.

The court will today consider bids for repainting the openings and interior of the court house.

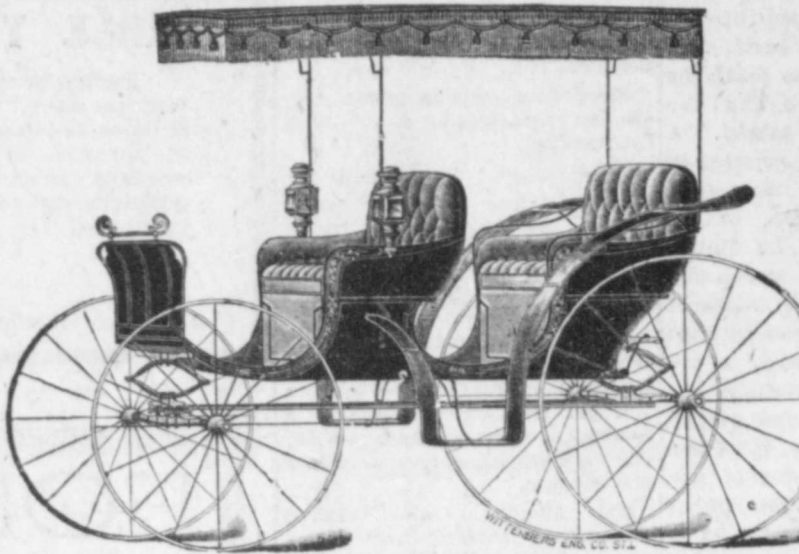

Ordinances of Goldthwaite.

CHAPTER XXVIII.
 An ordinance of the city of Goldthwaite, Mills County, Texas, prohibiting the leaving of horses and suchlike animals or teams hitched on the streets, square or alleys of Goldthwaite unguarded, and repealing Chapter V of the Ordinances of Goldthwaite.
 I
 Be it ordained by the city council of the city of Goldthwaite, that it shall be, and is herenow declared to be unlawful for any person to leave any horse or other animal, or any team or teams of such animals in the charge of such person, hitched to any vehicle on any street, square or alley of Goldthwaite, unless the same is left continuously in the care of some person competent to control same, or unless the same be securely tied to a hitching post or other secure stay to which it is lawful to tie; or unless all tags or traces connecting such animal or animals to the vehicle are unhitched, and the animal, if one is or all of them, if more than one, are, securely tied to the vehicle.
 II
 That chapter V of the Ordinances of Goldthwaite as the same now appears, be, and the same is hereby repealed.
 III
 Be it further ordained by the city council of the city of Goldthwaite, that any person who shall violate article I of this ordinance, shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, and shall upon conviction be punished by a fine of not less than one nor more than ten dollars, and execution against the property of such person may issue, as allowed by law, and in case such fine and costs are not paid, such person may be confined in the county jail, or other place provided for imprisonment of city prisoners, upon commitment, for the term of ten days, and may be put to work on the streets during such imprisonment.
 This ordinance shall be in force immediately upon its passage and after the publication required by law.
 Passed, approved and adopted this May 8, 1908, at a called meeting of the city council, by unanimous vote of the council, and the rule requiring ordinances to be read three several times being unanimously dispensed. And this original ordinance is ordered to be filed in the office of the city secretary, and if approved by the mayor, is to be signed by him, and there kept as Chapter 28 of the Ordinances of the city.
 Which ordinance, passed as aforesaid, was filed with the secretary, and by me examined and approved and signed, and ordered there kept. This May 15, 1908. J. H. RANDOLPH, Mayor of Goldthwaite.

Prairie fires have caused the loss of \$100,000 in Coosby county in the last week.

The school building at Lubbock burned a few nights ago, causing a loss of \$3000.

A lone highwayman robbed a train near Fairfield, Neb., and escaped with the booty.

The postal department has decided to establish free delivery of mail in Brownwood.

The drouth has become so distressing at Victoria that a public meeting was called to pray for rain.

The city of Mart issued \$50,000 water works bonds and the entire issue was taken by the First National bank of that place at \$105.

More bribery and graft has come to light in San Francisco and as a result several arrests have been made in the last few days in that city.

An oil company has been formed at Dublin to develop whatever resources that section may have in that line. Oil was discovered in a shallow well near that town.

Nat Doak of Mount Pleasant, is a candidate for state senator in the second district, against Bascom Thomas, who was recently expelled from the senate. Thomas is greatly encouraged over his prospects for success.

Judge L. J. Storey, chairman of the Texas railroad commission, died at his home in Austin Sunday. He had suffered with grip for a few days, but his condition was not thought to be serious, and his death was unexpected.

B. F. Roberts of Lubbock, an insane man who was placed in the Terrell asylum Saturday, was so badly injured Sunday night that he died the next morning and two of the night watchmen at the institution were arrested charged with having caused his death.

A report was sent out from the steamship on which ex-President Roosevelt and his party took passage for Africa, that an insane man made a murderous assault on Mr. Roosevelt soon after the ship left the American shore. The man was overpowered and put in irons.

The new Confederate pension law does not take effect until 90 days after the adjournment of the legislature. This new law allows pensions to widows of Confederate veterans and \$8 per month to veterans who are disabled. It was thought the new law became effective immediately, but upon investigation some technicality was discovered that prevents it becoming a law at once.

Officers have had a great deal of trouble with negroes and Snake Indians in McIntosh and Okmulgee counties, Okla., the past week and several battles were fought between the officers and the outlaws. Soldiers were ordered to the scene of trouble to assist in quieting the disturbance and arresting the guilty parties. Several officers were killed and quite a few Indians and negroes were reported "missing" before order was restored.

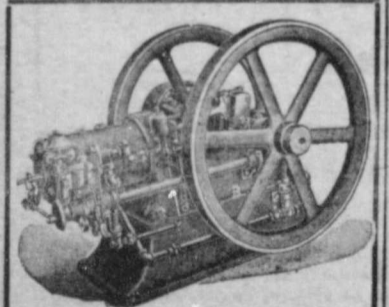

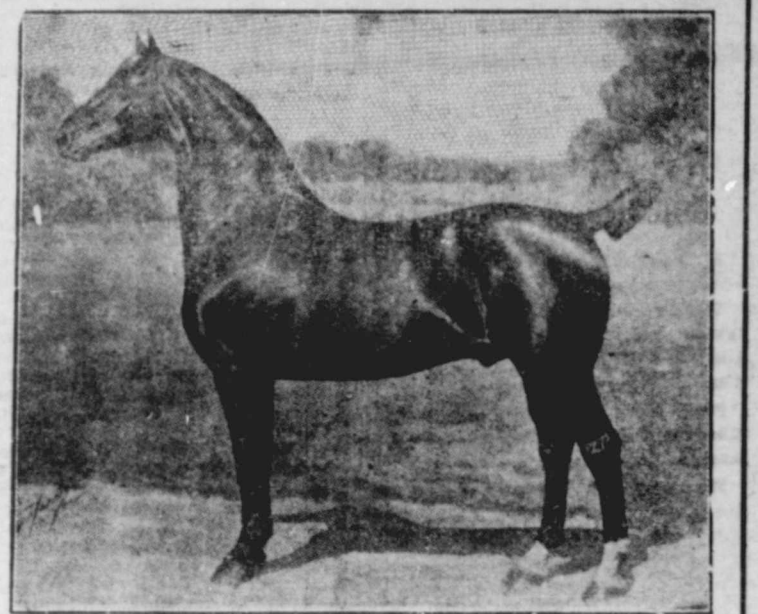
