As a Santa Fe train was leaving Galveston Sunday night a rock was hurled through one of the windows, striking a young lady on the forehead, cutting a gash that required several stitches to close.

A boy of 9 years of age shot and killed a lady at Edgfield, a suburb of Waco, a few days ago. The boy acknowledges the killing, but says he did not expect to kill the lady, only wanted to hurt her. He has been released on bond.

A citizen of Amarillo, who was arrested in that city for exceeding the speed limit with his auto, requested that he be given the maximum fine, saying he believed a heavy fine would be a lesson to him. He was given limit.

A bale of cotton was shipped to Houston from Hidalgo county last Saturday. On the same day a bale of new cotton was shipped to Houston from Falfurrias. The first bale was wrapped in cloth and tied with wire, as the ginner had no bagging and ties when the cotton was brought in.

The Glorious Fourth will not hereafter be celebrated by noisy fireworks in Texas, as the last legislature placed a \$500 tax on dealers in cannon crackers and toy pistols used for exploding the crackers. It is, therefore, not likely the necessary combustibles for a noisy "fourth" can be purchased in the state.

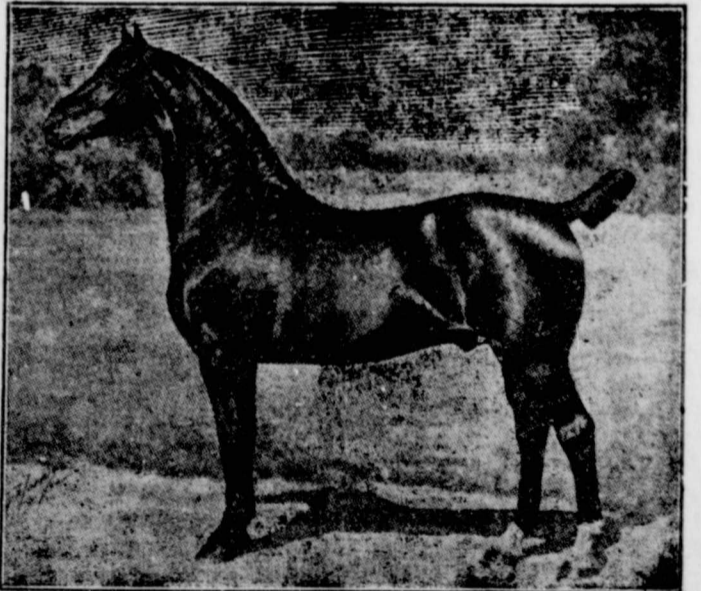

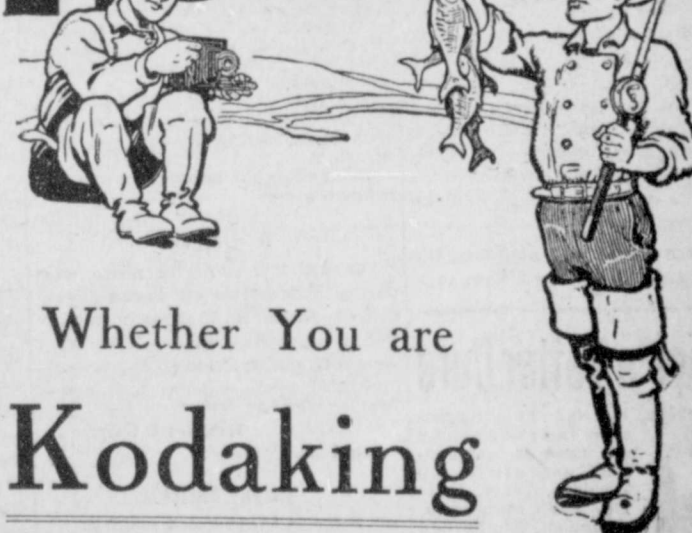

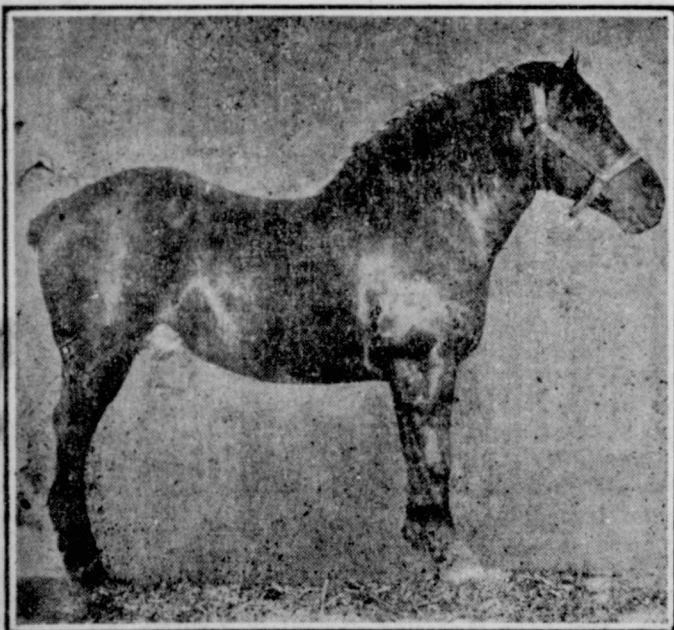

During our various visits to Constantinople we have spent much time in the study of her dogs. In fact, in all of our travels in various lands dogs and children have afforded us great amusement and pastime, especially in regions where we were not acquainted with the language of the people, for all dogs growl and bark in English and children all laugh and cry in English. We were once traveling in the interior of Africa and was very much surprised to pick up the following eulogy in which there is a touch of nature which has carried the name of George G. Vest around the world and into many languages:

This eulogy was made in the course of the trial of a man who had wantonly shot a dog belonging to a neighbor. Vest represented the plaintiff who demanded \$200 damages. When Vest finished speaking the jury, after two minutes' deliberation, awarded the plaintiff \$500. The full text of the speech follows: Gentlemen of the jury—The best friend a man has in this world may turn against him and become his enemy. His son or daughter that he has reared with loving care may prove ungrateful. Those who are nearest and dearest to us, those whom we trust with our happiness and our good name may become traitors to their faith. The money that a man has he may lose. It flies away from him, perhaps when he needs it most. A man's reputation may be sacrificed in a moment of ill-considered action. The people who are prone to fall on their knees to do us honor when success is with us may be the first to throw the stone of malice when failure settles its cloud upon our heads. The one absolutely unselfish friend that man can have in this selfish world, the one that never deserts him, the one that never proves ungrateful or treacherous is his dog. Gentlemen of the jury a man's dog stands by him in prosperity and poverty, in health and sickness. He will sleep on the cold ground where the wintry winds blow and the snow drives fiercely, if only he may be near his master's side. He will kiss the hand that has no food to offer, he will lick the wounds and sores that come in encounter with the roughness of the world. He guards the sleep of his pauper master as if he were a prince. When all other friends desert he remains. When riches take wings and reputation falls to pieces he is as constant in his love as the sun in its journey through the heavens. If fortune drives the master forth an outcast in the world, friendless and hopeless, the faithful dog asks no higher privilege than that of accompanying him to guard against danger, to fight against his enemies, and when the last scene of all comes, and death takes the master in its embrace and his body is laid away in the cold ground, no matter if all other friends pursue their way, there by his graveside will the noble dog be found, his head between his paws, his eyes sad but alert watchfulness, faithful and true even to death.—Rev.
