Commercial Club.

The club met in regular weekly session Monday night, with a small attendance.

Report of the receipts from the carnival showed to be \$125 90, the total commission received by the club. The electric lights furnished the carnival cost \$53, and other expenses were \$2 30, exclusive of the license.

The chairman was instructed to appoint a committee to confer with the county officials and ascertain if the license for the carnival could be remitted, on account of the benefit feature, 10 per cent of the receipts having been paid the club by the carnival. W. C. Dew and R. M. Thompson were appointed as such committee.

The chairman was authorized to appoint a committee to investigate the cost of a tract of land for a fair ground, near the city, and also to report on the feasibility of such an enterprise. J. A. Allen, W. E. Miller and L. R. Conro were named for the committee.

A committee composed of B. F. Geeslie, W. C. Dew, E.

M. Boon, W. E. Miller and R. M. Thompson was named to confer with the Farmers Institute to be organized here Monday and offer the co-operation of the Commercial club.

Committee to judge live stock Trades day—J. W. Allen, P. H. Clements and J. O. Grundy.

Committee to judge races and contests—W. L. Burks, Charles Rudd and J. V. Cockrum.

The time of meeting for the club was fixed at 8 o'clock p. m.

Notice was given that an amendment to the by-laws would be presented at the next meeting changing the meeting nights to twice a month and providing for dues of 25 cents per month for members who attend at least one meeting per month and 50c per month for members who do not attend a meeting.

#### First Bale.

The Eagle has been authorized to say that the person who brings in the first bale this year will be expected to have an average bale of cotton, and no premium need be expected for a part of a bale. If the bale is not brought in before Monday night, and it will not likely arrive before that time, the Commercial club will be asked to signify the weight the bale must be to receive a premium. Goldthwaite is very liberal with premiums, but will require that a bale of cotton be brought and not merely a sackful, for it is not fair to the farmer who is endeavoring to get a full bale when the premium is paid for a part of a bale.

#### Fair Association.

The people who have learned of the intention of the Commercial club to organize a fair association are enthusiastic in the matter and numerous pledges have been announced before the grounds have even been selected or a plan formulated for the organization. It is recognized by all citizens interested in the advancement of the town and county that a county fair would be very beneficial, and by forming a stock company the investment need not be heavy for any one and it can be made profitable financially as well as in the way of encouraging the raising of good stock and improved farm products.

#### Showers.

There have been several showers here this week and they have extended to almost every part of the county, but some were mighty light and did very little good. However, some of the showers were heavy enough to do considerable good and if they continue until the ground is thoroughly seasoned there will probably be a fair cotton crop. Some neighborhoods have not received enough rain to do much if any good.

The treasury department is at work on a plan to have all treasury notes of the same denomination identical and thereby assist in avoiding mistakes in handling paper money. It is also probable that the size of the paper will be considerably reduced.

The county attorney of Bell county has filed suits at Belton against the Santa Fe and Katy railroads for penalties aggregating \$216,000 for failure to keep the depot premises at Belton properly lighted and the neglect of other requirements of the law.

The oppressive heat in New York the first of the week was especially disastrous to babies. There were 40 dead infants in the Bellvue morgue at one time Tuesday and it was announced that the excessive heat caused the death of all of them.

## Commissioners Court

Commissioners court has been in regular quarterly session this week and has had considerable business to transact.

The returns of an election held in school district No. 42, on June 12, to authorize the issuance of \$1500 in bonds to build a school house were examined and the result found to be 18 in favor of the proposition and 5 against it. The court, therefore, ordered the issuance of the bonds of the denomination of \$100 to run 20 years and bear 5 per cent interest.

Returns of election in school district 31, on June 17, showed 23 in favor of a special tax of 15c on the \$100 valuation and 3 against it. The court ordered that the levy of the special tax be made.

Returns of election held June 19, in school district No. 46, for a special tax for school purposes of 20c on \$100 valuation, showed 9 in favor of the tax and 2 against it. The court ordered the levy of the special tax.

Petition of L. B. Burnham for Shaw Bend Telephone Co. for the right to construct and maintain telephone lines along the public roads in the southern part of the county was granted.

Petition of H. Barker et al. for a new road in precinct No. 3, was rejected.

Petition of E. I. Oxley et al. for a second class road in precinct No. 3, was granted and E. I. Oxley, P. D. Duren, J. W. Smith, Geo. Blackman and T. L. Cater were appointed a jury of view.

Petition of T. N. Berry et al. for change in Center City and Lometa road granted.

A. Lorenz, for the Priddy Telephone Co. was granted the right to construct and maintain a telephone line along the public roads in the Priddy community and along the Goldthwaite and Newberg road to Goldthwaite.

Petition of J. W. Tippen et al. for new road granted and J. W. Tippen, S. N. Kelly, A. P. Meek and F. M. Sawyer were appointed a jury of view.

The county tax rate was fixed as follows, for the year 1909: General purposes 7 1/2c on \$100 valuation, court house fund 5c on \$100, road and bridge 15c on \$100. This is an increase of 2 1/2c in the road and bridge tax.

The court went to Center City yesterday with a contractor to ascertain the cost of a bridge across Bennett creek at that place.

The court also inspected a change of road petitioned for by J. P. Booker et al. and granted the change.

There were three contractors here yesterday figuring with the court on the bridge at Center City.

A military band is being organized at Hillsboro.

The state land commissioner reports the sale of about 400,000 acres of school land during the month of July.

King Edward of England has cleared up \$1,000,000 by his speculation in United States Steel corporation stock

A cat awakened a family in Waco Monday morning when their house was on fire and they had only time to escape from the building.

There were 1136 bales of cotton ginned in Texas during the month of July. Last year more than 3000 were ginned for the same period.

A negro at Beaumont fatally shot Will Bacus, a machinist, who accused him of stealing lumber. The negro escaped into the swamp.

The attorney general has filed suit for 929 acres of land in Nueces county that is claimed by the heirs of "Big Foot" Wallace, who say it was a special grant to him.

The governor has notified the sheriff of Galveston that the law against gambling must be observed and the Sunday law enforced in the Island city or there will be a vacancy in the sheriff's office.

At Childress a man and his wife own separate ranches and a few days ago they quarreled over a land line fence, when the woman was struck several times with a board and the man was stabbed four times with a butcher knife in the hands of his wife.

Information is claimed to be authentic that census supervisors will be from the ranks of the Republicans in the solidly Republican states, and in the doubtful states, while in the solidly Democratic states half of the positions will go to the Democrats.

Limestone county was carried by the pros in the election Saturday by a large majority. The victory is largely due to the work of the women, who paraded the streets, argued for prohibition, served free sandwiches and lemonade and took "snapshots" of men attempting to vote negroes.

The Eagle acknowledges with thanks to the Dallas Chamber of Commerce the receipt of a pass for the Army tournament to be held in Dallas Aug. 22 to 29. There will be 2200 soldiers of the regular army participating in the tournament and the war department has appropriated \$23,000 for the expenses.

A special from Kansas City to the daily paper a few days since said: "Joe Carr and Edward Burns, Texas cowboys from the Panhandle, are enroute home after six years adventure in South Africa, Australia and the Fiji Islands. They were shipwrecked on an island and were rescued by the natives as gods. Carr was made king of the island and Burns a prince. Only the belief that the Texans were gods prevented them from being eaten, as they were cast among cannibals. They kept signals flying two years before a ship came to their rescue. They exhibit oddly tat-toed faces and South Sea weapons as proof.

The school board having in charge the rebuilding of the Zephyr school house are considering a proposition to enlarge the building over the original plan by adding two rooms. It is estimated the cost would be about \$2,000 additional.

County Judge Brumfield has received a letter from the superintendent of the Terrell insane asylum stating that Mrs. J. H. Davis, the patient sent there from Brown county, died on July 29, three days after entering the asylum.—News.

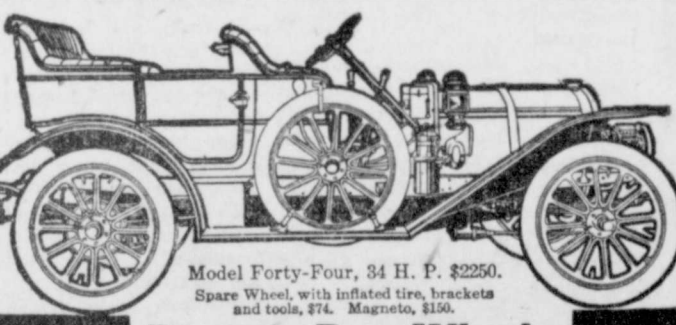

**Favors Road Bonds.**

Editor Eagle:-

I noticed in a late issue of the Eagle an article on good roads for Mills county, which was timely and to the point. If there ever has been or ever will be occasion for Mills county to issue bonds to build good roads, now is the time. With almost a total failure in all crops, there will be a great number of our citizens out of employment and a great many in needy circumstances, to whom it would be a God-send to get employment on the public roads, and to make such roads as are needed there would be work for all.

I have been giving the matter some study and have come to the conclusion that it will take not less than \$50,000 to even start to build such roads as are needed. In the first place, as the width of the roads has been much reduced by lawmakers recently, i. e. from 60 to 40 feet for first class roads and from 40 to 30, I believe it is, for second class, there is no space left after cutting ditches for the road bed. Therefore, it will take considerable money to pay land owners to set their fences in and give more right-of-way. The old-time width of 60 feet should certainly be restored for all important roads, otherwise it will be impossible to make much improvement, as there is no foundation to work upon. I believe that most of our land holders are public spirited enough to agree to set their fences back at a nominal cost to the county, therefore, the expense for that item would probably be small comparatively, leaving the bulk for actual work.

Now, I suggest that some interested person or persons get to work at once and circulate a petition asking our honorable commissioners court to order an election for the purpose above mentioned, and if there is opposition let us get the matter properly before the people for discussion.
