NEIGHBORING NEWS.

Items Culled From the Leading Local Papers.

HAMILTON.

The election to-day to determine as to the issuance of \$15,000 waterworks bonds resulted in a vote of 131 for and 43 against the proposition.

Mrs. Johnson Walker left Tuesday for Sweetwater on learning of the tragic death at that place of her brother, Tom Pope, who was an engineer on the Orient, in the district court this week

J. C. Huchingson was given judgment against the Texas Central Railroad company for \$4000. In the Grubbs suit against the same company a compromise was effected, the road paying the plaintiff \$1500.

The trustees awarded the contract for the erection of the new college building on College Hill to F. N. Heflin, of Comanche, for \$16,565, exclusive of the heating, plumbing, lighting and sewerage. As completed, with the most modern ideas in heating and sanitary arrangement, the building will cost over \$18,000.—Herald.

LOMETA.

Z. S. Lee from the Payne country was among the Lometa visitors Tuesday.

M. F. Miller and family have moved to Lometa from their home at Atherton for the purpose of entering their children in our splendid school.

A corps of Santa Fe surveyors began a survey from here toward San Saba Monday morning. They left the track about a mile north of town, which will probably be the route taken for the construction of the road in case it is built from this point.—Reporter.

COMANCHE.

Miss Stella Fletcher, one of the teachers in our public schools came in yesterday from her home in Goldthwaite.

Geo. W. Hill has traded a farm eight miles north of Comanche to J. A. Stanley, of Abilene for a farm east of that place.

Joe Hussey was arrested in this city last week on a complaint from Indian Gap charging him with obtaining goods under false pretenses.

What came near being a serious conflagration occurred last

Thursday afternoon in the rear of the postoffice. Some waste paper became ignited and when discovered the flames were running up the window facing and were in a dangerous proximity to a fifty gallon tank of gasoline.

News reached town yesterday of a cutting affray occurring on the Leon near Hasse. Barney Pinson of Proctor and Walter Rhodes of Hasse became involved in a difficulty while attending church, and Rhodes stabbed Pinson, the knife penetrating the left lung.—Exponent.

John Mackey, county attorney, tendered his resignation to the commissioners' court Monday, which was accepted and A. McFarland elected by the commissioners to fill out the unexpired term.—Leader.

SAN SABA.

Newel S. Oliver died at the family residence Wednesday morning.

W. G. Messenburg and his corps of engineers are coming toward San Saba from the west county line at a rapid rate.

Frances Lienneweber and family of Mullin visited at the home of his brother-in-law, R. J. Edwards, below town last week. He has a fine irrigated farm in the Mullin section and raises fine horses and mules.

C. H. Reed, of the Ratler section, was in town Thursday and reports that he has sold his farm in Mills county to a Mr. Fulford of Comanche county, and that he will likely locate nearer San Saba town in the near future.

E. B. Ward died at the home of Mr. and Mrs. M. Brazl in San Saba Thursday night of last week, after a very short illness. Mr. Ward lived in the Bend community and came to town on business Friday and was taken suddenly with a congestive chill while here.—News.

BROWNWOOD.

The United States Express company will succeed the Wells Fargo service on the Frisco to Brownwood on January 1st.

Station Agent Bass says that prospects are the Santa Fe will begin building their new \$35,000 passenger depot in Brownwood some time this month.

George P. Walters has broken ground for his new brick building on East Broadway between Haynie's grocery store and the new building just completed by E. Franke.

The banking house of Brooke Smith & Co. of Brownwood were the successful bidders for the Brownwood road bonds. The issue is \$100,000 5 percent bonds. The bank takes them all at par.

The Jackson hotel, a three story concrete block building on Fisk street, was totally destroyed by fire Wednesday morning about 4 o'clock. The total loss on building and furniture will amount to \$15,000. Insurance \$8,000.

The fact that Mrs. McDermott is having her eating house south of the Santa Fe station rebuilt has induced the suspicion that the railroad company had put off the work on the new station to some future time or had changed their plans as to putting in a Harvey house in connection with the new depot.—News.

The Rural Telephone.

The Rural Telephone central at Goldthwaite now has seven rural exchanges operating through the Goldthwaite office, and others are coming in. We had arranged through the Big Valley exchange to connect with the Martin system at San Saba, and in that way had all the long distance connections we needed and both the Big Valley exchange president and myself had a very clear understanding over the phone with Mr. Martin himself assuring us of all the long distance service we wanted and he said to me that he was glad to have the connection, but in about two days it seems that the West Texas Co. said to Mr. Martin that unless he cut out the Big Valley and Goldthwaite exchanges his line would be cut out of the Brownwood office. So Mr. Martin very promptly told them they could use him and he used the knife. In the next talk I had with Mr. Martin over the phone was a tale of woe that they had forced him to cut loose from Goldthwaite thinking they would be able to kill the rural phone central idea, but it won't work. We are receiving bids to construct a line to Lometa and will be able to connect with the rural lines there, giving us all the connections we want that way. At present we will give you the best possible service in Mill county. We have paid Mr. Conger three months charges for a phone to be put in our office so we can call anybody who don't connect with our office to one of our phones and in that way will give you the best accommodation we can in your connection with Goldthwaite. If the rural lines will pull together they will be able in the near future to have in Mill county one of the best systems to be found, and while we do not reach out of the county much at present it won't be long until the Rural Telephone idea will take the country—from county to county.

COMMERCIAL CLUB.

A Special Meeting In the Interest of the City Incorporation.

A special meeting of the Commercial Club was held in the court house Thursday night to take action in regard to the proposed incorporation election. There was a larger attendance at this meeting than has been in one of the meetings of the Club since its organization and great interest was manifested by all present.

Several short talks were made by members of the Club, the trend of which was that the corporation was advantageous to the business men and citizens generally and those who had signed the petition asking for the election without intending to vote for the abolition of the incorporation were urged to remove their names from the petition. The matter was freely expressed that there could not be found 100 men who would pledge to vote against the incorporation and an election, therefore, would only entail an expense on the city, and it was the expense that was objected to most seriously, as there was no idea that there was any danger of abolishing the incorporation.

The following resolution was unanimously adopted and ordered published:

Whereas, it is known that a petition is being circulated in the city of Goldthwaite asking for an election the purpose of which is to abolish the incorporation of the city, this Club enters a protest against the circulating of said petition and requests all citizens interested in the advancement of the town to refuse to sign it. While we do not fear the result of the election should it be ordered, we realize that the interests of the town will suffer in the estimation of the outside world and will cause dissension and division among the citizens of the town at a time when we need united efforts and a progressive spirit to enable us to secure the San Saba branch of the railroad, if it can be secured, and to secure the issuance of bonds to build good roads, as well as provide employment for a large number of our citizens at a time when they need the money such employment will bring.

Be it resolved that the Commercial Club of Goldthwaite requests the signers of said petition to withdraw their signatures and the circulators of it are requested to desist from such circulation and join hands with us for the betterment of Goldthwaite and Mills county.

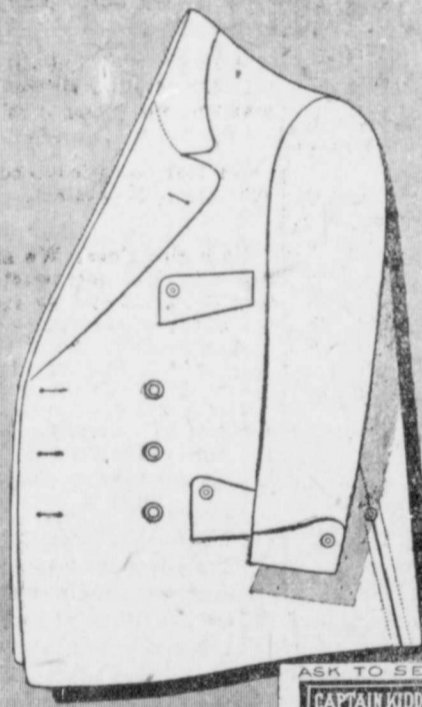

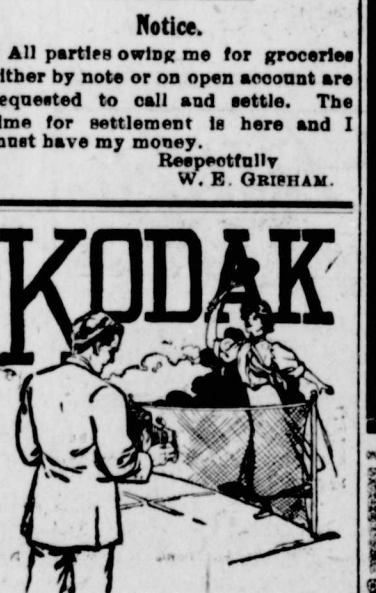

President Tait started on his southern and western trip Tuesday.

While assisting in raiding a negro gambling house in Newton county Saturday night County Attorney Nicks was shot and killed by one of the negroes.

Appeals for aid for flood-sufferers in Mexico are still being sent out and the people in the flooded district are in great and urgent need.

Judge R. S. Leggett, formerly of San Jacinto county, Texas, was elected by the directors of the Union Pacific railroad to succeed E. H. Harriman in the management of the railroad business.

An order has been issued by the postoffice department raising the registration fee to 10 cents after Nov. 1 and increasing the indemnity allowed for the loss of a registered package or letter to \$50.

John W. Castles, president of the Union Trust Co. of New York, suicided Monday by cutting his throat with a razor, because of ill health. He was formerly of Texas and was well known throughout the South.

Gen. Reyes denies that he is a candidate for vice president of Mexico. In a communication to some of his followers he says his candidacy would bring trouble in the republic, for he is not in accord with President Diaz's policies.

Three negro prisoners in the Brazoria county jail overpowered the jailor Monday and locking him in their cell took a revolver and Winchester and escaped. A ranchman of Chenango attempted to arrest the negroes and was shot and mortally wounded.

E. H. Harriman, who died in New York last week, was the wonder of the age as an organizer of railroad property. He had been actively engaged in railroad management less than ten years, yet he controlled five hundred million dollars in railroad property, although he owned less than one-tenth of that amount. He was 61 years of age and commenced his business career as an office boy.

Hon. Wm. J. Bryan made several speeches in Texas this week. In his speech at Dallas he was emphatic in his declaration that a representative of the Democratic party who refuses to be governed by the party platform should remain at home. Mr. Bryan said he hoped he would never again be a candidate for office.

According to the Jewish calendar the year 5670 commenced Wednesday of this week. Those who have studied the methods of computing time in the early days of the world's history say that the first years in the primitive calendars were composed of "moons" and were, therefore, but thirty days in length. Later, it is claimed the years were divided by the seasons. Assuming that these theories are correct, they figure that Adam was 75 years and 6 months of age and Methuselah's age was 74 years and 9 months, according to the present method of computing time.

To Pike's Peak.

Editor Eagle:

The fame of Pike's Peak is world wide. Major Zebulon Pike first said that no human being could ascend to that summit, yet later in the year 1806 he with a small party of men, undertook it. After many hardships on account of the chilling blasts of an early winter they finally reached the summit of what is now known as Cheyenne mountain. The outlook from this point was so discouraging that Mr. Pike refused to risk his men any further. This was the first known attempt to scale the lofty heights of the celebrated mountain, upon which Mr. Pike never set foot, even at its base, yet it took his name. While there are other mountains as high as Pike's Peak, yet it holds an advantage over all the other accessible mountains on the earth, in that it stands out in bold relief and offers at one sweeping glance a panorama of majestic mountains and infinite plains, while all others of equal height or approaching its height are surrounded by other mountains in such close proximity as to deprive them of the views that you get from Pike's Peak; hence it may truly be called the monument of the continent.

The writer after a 90 minutes ride covering a distance of 46-895 feet, the average elevation 844 8 feet to the mile, the maximum grade 25 per cent or 1320 feet to the mile, had the pleasure of standing upon this rock capped summit and taking a view of the surrounding country. Language falls down when we attempt a description. So wonderful that at times the 190 tourists seemed awed into silence as they gazed into the immensity of space and upon snowcapped peaks 150 miles away and the space between there and where we stood resembling the rolling together of innumerable mountains and deep, dark caverns, the architecture of which only a God could devise.

From 2,000 feet or more from the top down is nothing but a mass of loose boulders of different sizes and shapes with no sign of regulation except a little moss on the rocks and now and then in the crevices a sprig of grass.

In 1890 the Cog road was completed, a distance of a little less than 9 miles, making an elevation of 7525 feet and it was over this road in a coach pushed by a climbing engine that we made this trip to a dizzy altitude of 14,147 feet above sea level.

There are many interesting scenes along this wonderful line. The grade began at the very start, but in places much steeper than others, which if we had not seen, the puffing and great labor of the iron mountain climber behind us would have revealed the fact to us, I know it would try Brother Thompson's patience were I to go into details to note the many things of interest that might be mentioned, hence to cut my story short a mere mention must suffice.

I forgot to say that after Mr. Pike gave up trying to scale the heights that the snow of 40 or more winters dashed against the sides of this mountain and lay almost the year round on its rocky crest before any one else undertook it. George R. Ruxton pitched his tent close to its base in the year 1847, who fairly reveled in the thought of making the ascent, but before he matured any plans the Indians drove him away. Early in the fifties the people began a sort of an apology for a trail up the mountain near Manitou, which finally led to within a short distance of the summit, but as it was not clearly established and the distance so far, only a few of the most venturesome travelers availed themselves of its use. In 1871-73-77 respectively shorter and more direct routes were made. In 1879

a carriage road was built that covered a distance of over 16 miles, which was a slow as well as dangerous climb. In 1884 a company organized and started a zigzag railroad, but after building a few miles gave it up. In 1889 the present company built the Cog road, over which multiplied thousands have ridden to the top of Pike's Peak. On account of the high altitude they had a hard time getting men to stand the work, this with the stubborn obstacles that nature had unconsciously put in the way almost brought the managers to their wits end, but on the 20th day of October, 1890, the gold spike was set that completed the highest railroad in the world and which assured the tourists a safe and more rapid transit to the tip top of the most celebrated mountain on the hemisphere. From these heights to the west a thousand mighty mountains separate the horizon's margin of blue, while to the east a seemingly illimitable expanse of undulating plain stretches in receding billows till the eye tires and lags in the effort to grasp the proportions of that mighty ocean. All about are towns and cities like checkerboards on the plains and in the mountain nests. Only the outlines of the streets can be seen with the natural eye.

The subject is broadening and we will again have to promise a halt. The beginning point of this road is at Manitou and the first turn of the wheels starts the climb and amid rushing torrents, bubbling springs, leaping falls, hanging rocks, towering mountains, deep canons, beautiful lakes, magnificent forests of pine, rocks echoing to rocks, Now and then a group of tents or pole cabins, beautiful flowers, dizzy heights, dismal gorges, the little mountain climbers groans and whistles mark some of the features of this most wonderful trip. When we reached the top we could but wonder if the God of the universe was not proud of, as well as startled at the ingenuity and skill of man in his wonderful advancement in the last century. While Zebulon Pike's ideas were "It can never be reached" Other men following said, "It can be done" and to-day we are witnesses to the fact that it has been done.

Oh, young man, young woman never fold your hands and sit down in despair and say, "I can't." Where there is a will there is a way and the great future as it unrolls, will through the persistent, determined will of some boy or girl now living reveal still greater mysteries. God's omnipotence as well as omnipresence holds out the same guiding hand to boy and girl of the 20th century that he has in any other age of the world and from every quarter of His inhabitable empire may be heard the orders of onward and upward; with a guarantee and seal of the Divine that those who are faithful shall enjoy still greater things and ascend to higher altitudes and more extended fields of thought, as they look back over the battlefield and victories of the past. In the swing and realms of thought the writer gets a vision of a real man, a real woman, who after having met the demands of an all wise Father goes with their trophies, laying them down at His feet and hearing the welcome plaudit of well done. And then comes the question. Who will that be? Can it be you? And in the stillness of the night or under a noon days sun, from ocean to ocean and pole to pole every intelligent son and daughter of Adam's race may hear an answer, "Yes, it may be you." Will you do your part? God grant it. May peace, success, and happiness be the lot of all who read these lines. H. C. COBB.
