The defendant pleaded guilty to the charge made against him by the grand jury and was given a term of six years in the penitentiary. Bumgarner pleaded guilty in county court to burning the cotton and killing the cow, belonging to his father-in-law and was fined \$500 by Judge Reiger for these offenses. The grand jury returned a bill against him for the attempted poisoning, and he pleaded guilty as stated. His wife obtained a divorce from him the same day that he was sentenced to the penitentiary.—Chief.

Henry Stallings & Co. have shipped one hundred thousand pounds of pecans already this season, getting from 8c to 12 1/2c per pound.

Rev. T. N. Barton from Kerrville station will be the Methodist pastor here for the ensuing year, while Bro. Allen takes up the work of Conference Missionary Secretary.

Baylor Lewis was a Dallas fair visitor last week. He witnessed the accident of the flying motorcyclist in which both rider and machine were permanently put out of business.

The public term of the Lometa high school opened Monday with an enrollment of 276, and after adding the fifth teacher, it is evident that another teacher will be needed at once.

Oscar Nance is moving his family out on his father's farm this week where he will farm another year. He has retired temporarily from the blacksmith trade on account of his health.—Reporter.

BROWNWOOD.

Wednesday morning at 1:40, Mrs. Joe M. Stillwell died at her home in Coggin addition. She had lately partially recovered from an attack of the grip and had resumed her position as clerk in a down-town store.

Messrs. Terry and Jones of Rising Star spent Friday afternoon in the city conferring with the railroad committee and citizens in regard to the matter of a railroad to Rising Star.

Vice President and General Manager W. B. Drake of the Fort Worth & Rio Grande railway, was in Brownwood this morning on a tour of inspection and in a discussion of the proposed plans of the Frisco company said the contract had been let for the first seventeen miles out of Brady to C. E. Sharp company and that he was informed that work would start on the proposed extension within ten days.

Architect Bratton on Tuesday made a plat of the lower story of the Crown hotel building with a view of submitting plans for converting the ground floor of the building into business houses. This proposed plan was announced some weeks ago, but at that time it was not fully determined that the work would be done. It has been practically agreed upon now, however, that the first floor will be converted into store rooms and bids will be asked for as soon as the plans have been completed.—Bulletin.

The Northwest Texas Methodist conference is in session at Stamford.

The Baptist general convention is in session in Dallas and the attendance is reported to be larger than for a number of years.

The price of cotton dropped away down the first of the week and there was little selling, but after a day or two there was a reaction and the market has since been 14 cents and better.

The sale of town lots in Lometa last Saturday was quite a success, 47 lots having been disposed of by the auctioneer. Frank Kirby bought the first lot, paying therefor \$165.

Burglars robbed the postoffice and a store at Riesel, McLennan county, Tuesday night, securing \$850, Wednesday night the bank at Ben Arnold was robbed of \$3000, the safe having been blown open. In both cases the robbers escaped.

Prof. R. B. Cousins, state superintendent of public instruction, has resigned his office to accept the presidency of the new state normal school to be located at Canyon City. His resignation takes effect Jan. 1, and F. M. Brasley, principal of the blind institute, has been appointed by the governor to succeed Mr. Cousins.

A negro driver of a moving wagon in Waco had both of his legs shattered by the explosion of a bottle of nitro-glycerin. He found the bottle and thinking it was oil carried it with him when he went to move some furniture from a house, placing the bottle on the step. As he passed out of the house the bottle exploded and he was horribly mangled, but it is thought he will live.

One of the most interesting speeches made in the Southern Medical convention, now in session in New-Orleans, was one by Dr. J. W. Kerr of Corsicans, who was a surgeon at the Andersonville Confederate prison during the Civil War, in which between 13,000 and 14,000 Federal prisoners died. Dr. Kerr declared that in the light of recent scientific research he was now convinced that this terrible mortality at Andersonville was caused from pellagra and the hookworm.

The farmer who owns a farm is the particular person who is fixed. Banks may fail and factories close, workmen strike and mines suspend, merchants fail and towns burn, times may be panicky, and even crops may be short—but the farmer who owns his acres will get along. He will live in comfort and quiet, with plenty to eat, drink and wear. He is the most independent man on earth. Yet there are lots of them who do not appreciate their situation.—Poolville Chronicle.

The late Senator Carmack, of Tennessee, for whose murder the Coopers were recently convicted, paid the following tribute to woman: "It is not the throned and sceptered king; it is not the dark statesman with his midnight lamp; it is not the warrior grimed with smoke and stained with blood—it is the queen of the home, who under God rules the destinies of this world. There is the center from which radiates the light that never fails. For I say to you the sweetest wisdom of this world is a woman's counsel, and the purgest altar from which human prayer ever went to heaven is a mother's knee."

Shot His Mother.

A special from Coleman gives the following account of a deplorable occurrence: Mrs. A. J. Ticer, whose home is two miles from Voss, in this county, was shot with probably fatal results, by her son, Lafayette Ticer. Young Ticer lives at Santa Anna and on Saturday met his father, A. J. Ticer, in Coleman. They procured whiskey, it is said, during the day and the young Ticer accompanied his father to his home near Voss Saturday night, both being reported intoxicated. On nearing the Ticer home the father and son, it is alleged, became involved in a quarrel. The mother, hearing the dispute, met them a few hundred feet away from the house and tried to quiet them. The son, according to reports, drew a 45-caliber six-shooter and shot his mother through the abdomen. The ball passed through above the hip and hit the ground. Young Ticer was arrested Saturday night by the Voss officers and on Sunday was brought to Coleman and lodged in jail to await the action of the grand jury. He claims that he thought his mother was some one trying to hold up and rob him, as he had \$100 on his person. A telephone message from Voss today says Mrs. Ticer is still alive, but there is no hopes for her recovery.

A wealthy New York banker has made a will directing that his remains be cremated and the ashes be used on flowers.

Lightning set fire to oil tanks in Beaumont Monday afternoon. The loss was nearly \$1,000,000 and the Texas company sustained most of the loss.

Hon. Cone Johnson, one of the leading candidates for governor of Texas and one of foremost lawyers of the state, declares that statutory prohibition would be constitutional.

Officials of the Big Four railroad now believed the shortage in the account of the treasurer of the company at Cincinnati may reach \$2,000,000. The treasurer states that he lost money in speculation and was blackmailed out of a large portion of it.

The hookworm disease is attracting a great deal of attention from the press and medical fraternity just now. The fact that Mr. Rockefeller gave a million dollars to assist in eradicating the worms gives increased interest in the discussion. It is claimed the worms are the size of a hair and the length of a pin and fasten themselves on the interior of the intestines.

Plans have been filed for four model six-story tenement houses which are to be built for the accommodations of sufferers from tuberculosis in New York at an outlay of \$650,000, not including cost of sites. by William K. Vanderbilt. Roof gardens, open-air balconies and other features designed to combat the white plague will make the tenements distinctive, and only moderate rentals will be charged.

H. Bascom Thomas of Hopkins county, who was expelled from the Texas senate at its last session and was promptly re-elected by the people of his district, announces that he will be a candidate for lieutenant governor in the next campaign and says that he will "discuss a question that will arouse the people as they have seldom been aroused before."

The conduct of the rangers at Amarillo has aroused the people of the state to the necessity of disbanding the outlaws who have paraded in official livery for a long time and the indications are that the next legislature will be called on to repeal the law authorizing the ranger service. The conduct of the rangers at Amarillo was most outrageous to be sure, but it differs but little from the conduct of similar bands at other places. A community in which rangers are located can easily understand the conditions in Russia, where the soldiers seem to know little or no restraint in the persecution of citizens who incur their ill-will. It is almost beyond belief that in Texas a mob of drunken men were allowed to break into a house occupied by refined ladies and force them to get out of bed and dress while the ruffians stood by, or that ladies were accosted with insulting remarks. But this is the testimony of officers of Potter county and other good citizens.
