HAMILTON.

Chas. Warner, the deposed treasurer of the Big Four railroad who is accused of embezzling nearly a million dollars from that company, is still in jail in Cincinnati, having failed to make bond. One of the women supposed to have received a part of the stolen money was also arrested.

The Belton Democrat tells of a man and his wife and three children having been given refuge in the jail at that place one cold night this week and the next day money was contributed by sympathetic people to send the unfortunate family to relatives. The man was at one time a prosperous physician in a central Texas town, but became addicted to the opiate habit.

Traveling Passenger Agent Kendig of the Santa Fe gave out the information at San Angelo this week that a change in the schedule for this road would be effective on or before the dawning of the new year. He said the train that now leaves San Angelo at 2:30 in the afternoon would leave there about 6 p. m. and it will pass through Goldthwaite about 11 o'clock. Mr. Kendig also stated that a third train was being contemplated for the San Angelo division. It will be a fast train with but few stops. It will not likely be in operation for several months.

H. Clay Pierce, the head of the Waters-Pierce Oil Co., does not approve of the manner in which Texas handles the property of those convicted of belonging to a trust. In an interview in New York a few days ago he said some rather uncomplimentary things about this state's laws and the treatment his company had received. He will have another kick about the treatment of people who make false affidavits in this state when the district attorney and those who assist him get through with a case to be called in the district court in Austin next week.

The report of the penitentiary investigation committee is being formulated at Austin and will be made public in a few days. There is no doubt the committee will recommend some reforms and changes in the mode of government and discipline in the penal institutions and on the farms, for it is a fact that some of the testimony shows unnecessary cruelty to the convicts, but it is not likely that those in authority will so amend the rules of management that a term in the "pen" can be considered a picnic occasion, as some newspaper writers appear to want. They realize that they are dealing, in the main, with hardened and brutal criminals who must be governed by harsh means or not governed at all,

Stamford.

Editor Eagle:

After some time I come again to let your readers hear from this part of the great State of Texas. To begin with, we have had plenty of rain the last month. Some time back we had a good rain for this time of the year and yesterday morning (the 13th) we had a good shower, which is beneficial to what little wheat is sown. Some wheat is up and it looks well. There has been no frost as yet, and it is clearing off warm.

Crops are short out this way—very little feedstuff made. There have been weighed at the cotton yard up to date 2500 bales, mostly ginned here at Stamford. The best estimate I can get is that the crop is about two-thirds gathered.

The Methodist conference was in session here last week, and the chickens are still roosting high. There were about 500 preachers present but Stamford was equal to the occasion. They were taken care of in fine style.

Our school is moving along all O. K. under the management of Prof. Linsey, assisted by Prof. Conner. There are about 600 pupils in attendance. The Methodist college located here has about 300 students in attendance. So much for the schools.

The Wichita Valley Railroad has built a seven-stall roundhouse here for the Stamford N. W. Railroad which is complete to Spur City, Dickens county. Regular trains are running daily.

The Baptist church, costing \$40,000, is finished. The Methodist people are now building a church to cost \$50,000. There are two Presbyterian churches, two Christian churches, and will be two Methodist churches; so you see there is no excuse for not attending church, but still there are a great many that do not attend.

The City Dads are having some paving done. The street from the Union depot will soon be finished to the Square, three sides of the Square are already paved, with several miles of cement sidewalks also finished.

The contract for the Carnegie Library will soon be let.

There is not much building going on just now. A great many of the carpenters have gone to Spur City for a while, as that seems to be the coming town. You know the last is the best, or, as the old saying is, "the good place is just over the hill." I have found through life that you cannot get all the coons up one tree.

Well, Mr. Editor, can't we get up some plan to get the old Mills county residents who have moved away to write the Eagle? I for one am always glad to hear from any old-timer who has left the old, free county of Mills.

What has become of the country correspondents? Let's hear from them. Those that are left should sign their names so that we may know who is writing.
