NEW BRITISH NAVAL MONSTER

The Neptune the Largest of Modern Vessels of Dreadnought Type of Construction.

The Neptune is the eighth British Dreadnought battleship built for the admiralty. She is 530 feet long, 84 feet beam, with displacement of 20,250 tons (a thousand tons heavier and 30 feet longer than the St. Vincent, the battleship of the same type launched from the same slip about a year ago). Her engines, which are to be on the turbine principle, will be of 25,000 indicated horsepower, which will give a speed of 26 knots. The Neptune is to be armed with ten 12-inch guns, like the previous Dreadnoughts, but they will be differently disposed. The fore barbettes will be in the same position on the forecastle, but the side barbettes will be an eschelon, one being a little more forward than that on the other side, while the superstructure will be so constructed as to enable guns to fire on either side. The broadside fire will therefore be ten guns to the Dreadnought's eight. The other two barbettes will be on the center line astern, but one will be on a higher level than the other so as to enable its guns to fire over the other; four seven-inch guns are to be placed in the superstructure as the anti-torpedo armament. The armor protection will be similar to that of previous ships of the class, and so will all the internal arrangements, and the new ship will also have four propellers and twin rudders.

Fire destroyed the Johnson Hotel at Ballinger last Saturday. Loss \$4,000 Insurance \$1750.

The town of Tolar was almost entirely destroyed by fire last Friday night, not a whole business house remains.

Four fine residences were burned at Greenville Monday causing a loss of \$20,000, one lady losing \$2,000 in currency.

The three-story school building and dormitory owned by Carlton college, at Bonham, was destroyed by fire last Saturday night. Loss about \$15,000.

The 4-year-old daughter of E. S. Schill, near Dalhart, was scalded to death Monday night by overturning a pot of boiling lard upon herself.

The Governor offered Monday a reward of \$200 for the arrest and conviction of the negro that shot and killed W. V. Bailey at Dallas on the 22nd ult.

Adjutant General Newton of Austin issued an order last Monday suggesting a school of instruction for officers of the infantry and cavalry to be held at Camp Mabry in Austin, June 6 to 11.

The state department of education at Austin apportioned Monday \$602,500 from the available school fund to pay salaries of teachers in Texas schools in the counties and independent school districts of Texas for the month of February.

Eleven gifts to churches and philanthropy reaching a total of \$728,000 were announced from New York pulpits last Sunday. Among the large gifts was one of \$113,000 from Mrs. E. H. Harriman to pay off the mortgage on a downtown club for boys.

In an official report of the Illinois State Food Commission made public last Sunday at Chicago, State Inspector Hoey declared that horses were being slaughtered by the wholesale in Chicago and the meat sold and distributed for human consumption.

A reference to the possibility of the impeachment of Governor Haskell and other State officers was made in a resolution introduced in the lower house of the legislature at Guthrie, Okla., by Representative Humphrey Monday concerning the failure of the Columbia Bank & Trust Co. last fall.

Six hundred representative manufacturers, mostly men of wealth, ate a dinner Saturday at the Machinery club in New York of nothing but vegetables and fruit. There were no speeches, but an informal discussion of the advanced cost of living indicated that the universal protest of the nation has the support of the business men as well as laboring men.

A deplorable accident happened at Estherwood, Louisiana, last Saturday when Mr. Tosam Leger, about 70 years old, was accidentally shot by his little grandson 6 years old, with whom he had gone hunting. The child in some way got hold of the gun and caused it to go off, discharging the whole load in Mr. Leger's back and at the same time striking the boy in the face, almost knocking out one eye.

So They Say.

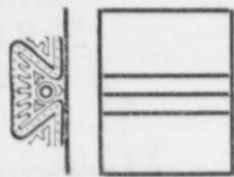

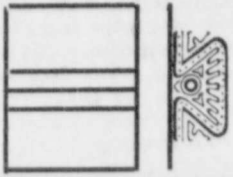
