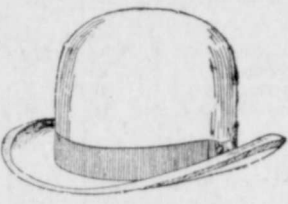

The Cotton Belt will in course

**COLQUITT SPEAKS.**

**A Large Audience Heard His Ideas of Government—Submission the Main Theme.**

Hon. O. B. Colquitt addressed a large audience in the court house here yesterday afternoon in the interest of his candidacy for governor. His voice was not in good condition and showed hard work. He was introduced to the audience by Mr. R. L. H. Williams and after a very few introductory remarks took up the subject of his candidacy for Democratic nomination for governor. Like Mr. Johnson, who spoke here a few days ago, the main theme was prohibition and submission, although he announced his views and ideas about other subjects connected with the government. However, his views on the subject differ widely from those of Mr. Johnson. He stated that he was opposed to the doctrine of prohibition and was also opposed to the submission of the prohibition amendment to the people. He made a strong argument for his views and occasionally told an anecdote and kept his audience in a good humor.

Mr. Colquitt is a man of pleasing personality and is possessed of some ability and there is no denying the fact that he is one of the strongest candidates in the race. He is now filling the office of railroad commissioner, and has filled other positions of trust in this state.

The court house was crowded to standing room to hear him and no doubt a great many were turned away because of the lack of room in the house.

Dr. Everitt will leave tonight for Baltimore, Md., to attend the Southern Baptist convention. He will be gone several weeks. G. W. Jackson will conduct services in the church Sunday morning after Sunday school. S. H. Allen will conduct the services a week from Sunday and Joe H. Frizell will have charge of the service that night.

S. G. Walker received a message yesterday announcing the serious illness of his father at his home in Big Valley. It is hoped by the friends of the family that the old gentleman's condition is not as serious as was reported.

W. E. Miller of the Goldthwaite National Bank will attend the State Bankers convention at El Paso next week.

**Obituary.**

Mrs. Olive Hildebrand was born Nov. 12, 1848, and graduated from a Catholic school in Bethlehem, Ky., in 1866. Soon after her graduation she was converted and joined the Presbyterian church. She was married to H. G. Hildebrand in 1868. She and her husband moved to this country when there were no settlements, only an occasional ranch house, and the nearest railroad town was Lampasas. While she was sick many people who came to see her recalled the times when they were sick and there was no one to wait on them but her.

After the Methodist church was organized at the old Rochelle school house, which her husband helped to build, she joined it with him and lived a faithful and consistent member until the end came. It has been my privilege to know Sister Hildebrand, she was a noble character. She bore her sufferings with great patience. She died April 23, 1910, at Rochelle, Texas, and was laid to rest by the side of her husband, who died fourteen years ago. She was in the home of her sister, Mrs. Sue Moseley, when she died. She leaves four children and other relatives to mourn her loss, but not as those who have no hope. The life she has lived tells them where they can find her. She is not dead, but alive for evermore. May God's choice blessings rest upon all the bereaved ones and may they make an unbroken family in the better world is our earnest prayer.

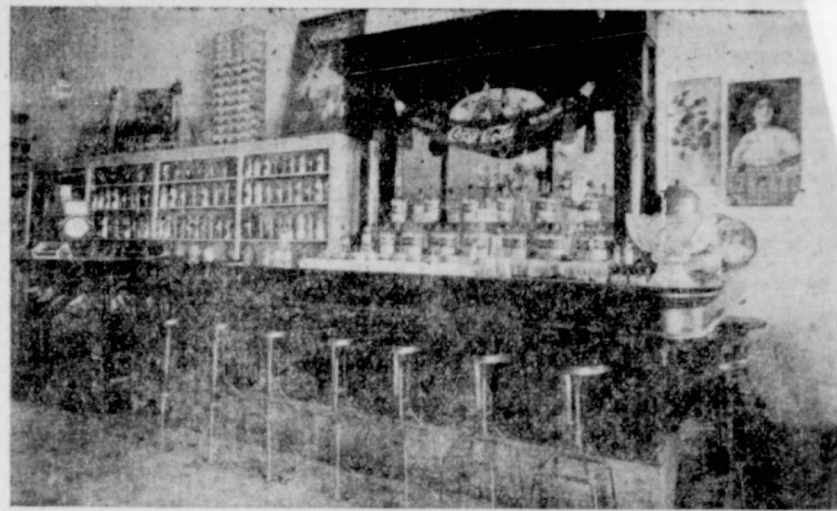

**Jno. J. Cox in a New Role.**

Among the visiting attorneys (if we could call him a visitor) in attendance on the district court during the week is Hon. Jno. J. Cox of Temple. Mr. Cox has, for the last fifteen years, been attorney for the Santa Fe railway in Mills county and during the last six years he has also had the local attorneyship for the same company in Bell and Lampasas counties. During the fall of last year he tendered his resignation to take effect Jan. 1 of this year. Since the latter date he has been doing a general practice, the firm being Cox & Cox, the junior member of the firm being Shelby S. Cox, son of the senior member. The present term of the district court is the first term since Mr. Cox severed his connection with the railway company, and while this gentleman has, ever since his removal to Temple some six years ago, enjoyed a lucrative practice in the courts of this county and it seems strange and odd to his many friends to have him appear as attorney for various plaintiffs in damage suits against the railroad. However, he still maintains his well known reputation for making amicable settlements in this character of litigation, which reputation he gained during his long service as attorney for the road, and the Santa Fe must surely appreciate this fact, as the docket of the district court shows that he made settlements in six suits out of seven brought against the Santa Fe at the present term. Mr. Cox has a number of other cases, however, and has remained during the week and will probably be here next week.

W. Grille of Indian Gap country had two of his fine sheep on display in this city Thursday. One was a Lincolnshire ram, which he bought in Missouri. The animal was one of the finest of its kind and its wool was perhaps 10 inches long. The other was a lamb of the Shropshire breed and was indeed a beauty. The sixteenth quadrennial session of the general conference of the Methodist Episcopal church, South, commenced in Asheville, N. C., Wednesday and is largely attended. The session is to continue three weeks.

A report from islands in the south seas inhabited by savages says that a Presbyterian mission in which were about fifty converts was attacked by natives and all in the building were taken prisoners and two of the preachers were eaten by the cannibals.

Dr. G. C. Rankin issued a statement which was published in the daily papers Sunday morning endorsing the candidacy of Hon. Cone Johnson for governor. This is believed by Mr. Johnson's friends to be of great advantage to him, as Dr. Rankin has strong influence with the prohibition advocates in this state.

Hempstead has again been the scene of a dark tragedy in which two men were killed and several others wounded. Aaron Shannon was shot and killed by his brother-in-law, a young man named Poole, who was in turn killed. The shooting took place at the depot as a passenger train drew up to the station and Shannon was preparing to board the train. Family trouble was the cause.

A quarterly report filed with the comptroller at Austin discloses the fact that H. Clay Pierce is associated with S. W. Fordyce in the oil business in this state, the firm name being Pierce-Fordyce Co., successors to Waters-Pierce Co. It would not have been a great surprise for the report to have shown that Mr. Pierce was the sole owner of the business.

A report from Galveston says: President Ripley of the Atchafalaya, Topeka and Santa Fe Railway recommends a 6 per cent increase in salaries and wages of unorganized employes on the Gulf, Colorado and Santa Fe lines, extending through Texas, Oklahoma and Louisiana. There are 11,500 employes and the greatest percentage are unorganized, for the Santa Fe system has contracts with only trainmen and yardmen's union. The Santa Fe mechanics are not union, so the mechanics as well as all station and office agents and clerks will get the increase, which ranges from \$3 to \$15 a month. It swells the payroll about \$400,000 annually.

That this country will be obliged, probably in the near future, to import from Canada and other countries a constantly increasing supply of wood pulp and paper and to pay the greater price which is imposed by the tariff, is indicated by the statistics prepared by the Commissioner of Corporations at the request of the American Newspaper Publishers' Association. The opinion has been expressed in various quarters that as a result of this showing the American Newspaper Publishers' Association will renew its fight and demand a revision of the paper schedule of the tariff bill. The statistics show that the demand exceeds of the production.

**Incorporation Election.**

A petition has been circulated in this city this week asking that an election be ordered to determine whether or not the city incorporation shall be continued.  
 The Eagle is heartily in favor of the incorporation, for without it marauding stock would again depredate upon the property of the citizens, both in the residence part of town and on the public square where farmers leave their wagons and other vehicles containing produce of different kinds as well as articles of merchandise. The city streets would be in darkness at night and, in fact, it is doubtful if the electric light works would receive sufficient patronage to sustain them without the city patronage. The square and streets could and would be used to display vehicles and implements, as well as for the storage of chicken coops and other things. We would not have our streets worked, except those termed public roads, and the sanitation of the town would be left largely to the consciences of the citizens. Many other reasons could be assigned in favor of the incorporation, while the only objection to it that we have heard is the tax of 25 cents on the \$100 valuation as a regular levy, with a special levy of 15 cents on the \$100 for street purposes.  
 The Eagle trusts that a sufficiently large majority will vote in favor of the incorporation to put at rest the idea that any appreciable number of citizens desire the backward movement of abolishing the city incorporation.
