Austin was very lively for a Sunday. The new wagon bridge across the Colorado is very beautiful, is built of cement and steel and will prove very durable. I had not time to visit the Capitol, but it looked grand and beautiful in the distance. One other sight which startled us scribe was the "niggers"—nigs to the right, nigs to the left, nigs everywhere. And what style! "They toil not, neither do they spin; yet Solomon in all his glory was not arrayed like some of these."

The scenery is very beautiful from Lampasas on to San Marcos:

"My country, 'tis of thee,  
Sweet land of liberty,  
Of thee I sing!  
I love thy rocks and rills,  
Thy woods and templed hills,  
My heart with rapture thrills,  
Like that above."

This busy city appears to be growing right along in population and wealth. Some fine steel frame structures are now completed, whilst others are in course of construction. The Dr. Simmons railroad is completed to near the McMullen County line. Others are projected in that direction. Some fine flowing wells have been brought in and the gardens are consequently flourishing. Where water is not used the crops look badly. Very little grass is in any of the pastures, while the brush and cactus have killed out much of it. Stock looks very lean and many will perish if the dry weather continues much longer.

## The Enterprise to Be Owned and Controlled by Mills County People.

Believing that the only way there would ever be an oil mill built in Goldthwaite would be by the people of the county taking hold of the proposition, some of the business men held a meeting in the court house Monday night and appointed a committee to solicit stock for a mill to be erected at once. The committee entered upon its duties Tuesday morning and has so far been able to interest a large number of people in the enterprise. In fact, the money could be easily raised, but the plan is to interest a large number of farmers, gin men, business men and stock dealers in the mill, in order to prevent some strong competitor attempting to "freeze out" the independent mill. This plan appears to be approved by nearly everybody and some farmers have volunteered to circulate the lists in the country soliciting subscriptions for stock in the company.

It is proposed to install what is known as the cold press system, which is said to be a great improvement over the old cooking system and is much cheaper to install and can be operated at a very small expense, at the same time giving much more satisfactory results. The company will be incorporated for \$25,000 and there will be 1000 shares at \$25 each. Every man who is interested in the enterprise is invited to take one or more shares, as he sees fit. It is not the large stockholder that is needed, but the large number of stockholders that will give the best results.

It has been talked for the last few days that the company that made a proposition some time ago to install a mill here would build now, but this will likely make no difference to the stockholders of the new enterprise, for it the other people did not install the mill they or some other mill would put buyers here, which would be the same competition for the mill and would guarantee the farmers the full market price for their seed.

Another feature about the new mill is that it is proposed to do the work with white labor, whereas, most mills employ negroes, and the "coon" feature would be very objectionable to the people here, if they can get a mill without that feature.

Those who desire to subscribe for stock would do well to attend to the matter at once, before the lists are turned in and the books closed.

Lightning struck a gang of negro section men at Brenham Monday afternoon and stunned 16 of them.

A negro stabbed and seriously wounded Grover Stephens at Moody Monday. In the excitement over the matter Stephens' mother-in-law fell dead.

A meeting of the state Democratic executive committee has been called to convene in Dallas to determine where the state convention will be held.

The spreading of the rails caused the wreck of a Frisco passenger train near Rogers, Ark., Monday and a large number of passengers were injured, but none were killed.

The state comptroller's department announces the belief that the valuation of Texas property as rendered for taxation this year will be in excess of \$3,000,000,000. The valuations last year amounted to \$2,309,803,626.

The family of late Wm. Cameron have donated 80 acres of ground in the central part of Waco, together with \$5000 for its improvement as a park if the city will name it Wm. Cameron park.

The revolution in Nicaragua is apparently nearing an end. The government troops have the insurgents surrounded in a manner that makes escape very unlikely. The insurgents have been losing ground for some time and their ultimate failure has been certain.

Dallas is to have a \$1,000,000 hotel as soon as arrangements can be perfected for the building, which will be 20-stories. It will probably be built on the site of the city hall, opposite the Oriental hotel and Adolphus Busch, the millionaire brewer, will be head of the company. He is also principal owner of the Oriental hotel.

The treasury department at Washington has a plan to laundry all treasury notes that have been in use, thereby cleaning them and destroying disease germs contained in the notes. Heretofore it has been the system to burn all old notes reaching the treasury department and replace them with new bills and this laundry plan will prove a great saving to the government if it is successful.

The situation in the gubernatorial campaign is such that the outcome is hard to determine at this distance from the primary. While prohibition is alleged to be the main issue in the campaign, it is doubtful if any considerable number of voters will be influenced alone by the candidate's views on that subject. The truth is, the Bailey question is the one that influences the great majority of the voters, if not all of them. Find a supporter of Johnson or Davidson and you are mighty likely to see an anti-Bailey man, while the advocates of Poindexter and Colquitt can be placed with equal certainty as adherents of Mr. Bailey and the result of the primary election will more nearly indicate the attitude of the voters in the Bailey matter than on statutory prohibition or any other subject.

northwestern New Mexico Sunday.

An appropriation bill providing for the building of two large battleships was passed by the senate this week.

The Texas Press association will hold its annual convention at Stamford June 8-11 and President Johnson says he expects a large attendance.

The rain and hail in the southwestern part of the state have caused heavy loss to the goat raisers in that section. Many of the goats were frozen and others were drowned.

A bridge crossing the Brazos river near Marlin fell in Sunday night. The bridge cost Falls county \$30,000 and is said to be almost a total loss. The river was not more than half bank full, but the bridge has been yielding to the swift current for some time.

Governor Campbell is being urged to call a special session of the legislature to repeal the present insurance law, which has greatly increased the insurance rate in some cities. The law provides for a uniform insurance rate and forbid the cutting of rates.

A Washington special says the department of justice is investigating the price of lumber in the United States with a view to determining whether or not the so-called lumber trust may be reached by the Sherman anti-trust law on the ground that it is a combination in restraint of trade.

Hon. Wm. J. Bryan has gone to Scotland as a delegate to the international missionary conference. Before sailing from New York he stated in an interview that he was confident of Democratic success in the next presidential campaign, basing his estimate on the large Democratic gains in the last campaign, when 6,500,000 votes were cast for the Democratic nominees.

The committee on military affairs in the United States senate has reported favorable a resolution providing for the return to the state of Louisiana and to the city of New Orleans certain bonds captured by the federal force during the civil war and since kept in the national treasury. A part of the bonds were returned soon after the war and the remainder will very likely be returned, although they now have no financial value.

It is said that three of the stingiest men in the state were in town yesterday. One of them will not drink as much water as he wants unless it is from another man's well. The second forbids any of his family from writing anything but a "small hand" as it is a waste of ink to make large letters. The third stops his clock at night in order to save wear and tear on the machinery.
