BROWNWOOD.

The twentieth annual commencement exercises of Howard Payne college were held at the college chapel Thursday morning.

Jury Not Wanted.

Mills County Methodism.

On Friday night before the fifth Sunday in May the Workers' Conference of the Methodist churches of Mills county convened with the North Brown church on the Mullin charge to begin and carry out a previously arranged and published program.

Bro. N. G. Ozment failing to get there Friday night to preach the opening sermon, Rev. F. M. Jackson of Goldthwaite discharged that duty to the satisfaction and edification of those present.

On Saturday morning by 9:30 o'clock the people began to assemble, and in a little while the president, Rev. W. B. Moon, in a very business-like way announced the purpose of the meeting.

The first topic was "The importance of business methods in church finance," which was discussed in a way that we believe will bear fruit.

The second topic was—"Why is it best for the stewards to manage all the finance of the church, including the conference collections?" A number took part in the discussion which finally concluded, we think, by all agreeing that the officers of the church should be a unit in untieing the hands of their preachers on the finance question, giving them more time for study and pastoral work.

The third topic was "Reasons why the pastor's salary should be paid monthly." This subject was ably aired and we feel sure, if the suggestions made are carried out, the jingle of the dollar will be heard in the preacher's pocket monthly instead of quarterly or annually, as the manner of some is.

Those who discussed "An idea steward" were about unanimous in their decision that he was such a scarce article they hardly could conceive just how one would look. The poor fellow certainly got his just deserts and went away wondering: "To whom shall I look, and will it ever be said of me—'his works do follow him'?"

The sermon on missions by Rev. F. M. Jackson at 11 o'clock will retain a place in the memory of those who heard it as a message from God to the heart and conscience of all who claim the Christ as a personal Savior and who regard His commission—"Go ye into all the world and preach the gospel." The conclusion of this discourse brought us to the noon hour, when, as is the custom of the good people of North Brown, we were informed that the physical man had been amply provided for, and—how we did feast upon the good things set before us!

The afternoon was well occupied in the discussion of Methodist polity and policy, missionary policy in the Sunday school, and the Laymen's Missionary Movement. The interest grew to the close.

At 8:30 Rev. N. G. Ozment filled the pulpit to the edification of all, his theme being "Evangelistic Service."

By 9:30 Sunday morning the people had gathered from different points and we entered heartily with the North Brown Sunday school into the study of the lesson, and while we talked of the feeding of the multitudes by our Divine Lord our hearts burned within us and we placed no discount on the Sunday school as a means of grace to the hungry soul, May the Lord wonderfully bless, keep and comfort their young superintendent and help him to prepare for every good word and work.

An old-fashioned Methodist love feast, led by Rev. W. B. Moon, filled in the next thirty minutes between the Sunday school and preaching, and the glad testimonies were convincing evidences of an ever indwelling Christ.

The sermon at 11 o'clock by

Rev. F. M. Jackson on the Baptism of Christ was listened to with profound attention and the clinching arguments, earnestly yet lovingly presented, were convincing and showed clearly to all that he had his subject well in hand.

This brought us once more to the noon hour, when we had another opportunity of enjoying the hospitality and friendship (second to none) of the North Brown people.

The closing hour of this much enjoyed and, we believe, very profitable conference was a sermon on "Methodism as a Revival Force," by Rev. N. G. Ozment. The minds of the older people were carried back to the busn-breaking, river-swimming, mountain-climbing days of Methodism, as her faithful ministers went forth under the fire of strong opposition and suffering to carry the glad tidings of salvation to those who, in their onward march, were opening the way for our present, peaceful civilization. The bloodstains of their sacrificed lives, as recorded in history, do not fail to reveal the fact that in their cabins and under the spreading trees the Methodist circuit rider was there to break to them the bread of life, that not only made Methodism one of the greatest leading forces in the evangelization of the world, but put every other evangelical denomination under everlasting obligations to her for converts who went from these meetings to swell the number of communicants in their churches. When our doctrines are understood, our wonderful growth known and the good we have done is shown by actual facts, figures and results, we command the attention, respect and love of every intelligent, unbiased, unselfish Christian denomination under the sun. Our preachers have been too remiss in preaching our doctrine.

As this duty was voted on your scribe you must allow him to prolong this article to tell what awaited us Sunday night in the way of a desert to the feast of which we have spoken. Rev. Josephus-Lee of the Northwest Texas conference gave us a sermon on "Infant Baptism." He convincingly, good-humoredly and clinchingly put the baby in the church all through the Old Testament, into the New, and down to the present now. Brother Lee obtained these telling arguments as a minister in the Baptist church for 31 years, as he was studying to defeat instead of defend infant baptism. If you want a man to give you "Thus saith the Word" and clinch every nail he drives, you needn't pass by Brother Lee to find him. Really we have been growing in grace at Mullin on the doctrines of Methodism, for our own little Moon has not been remiss in dealing out no uncertain sound along these lines, which has shown thought, close study and a Christian spirit, as he dished them out on large platters to his own people and others who would come and hear. We are on the great ocean of time with sails unfurled and our banner of peace, love and Christian fellowship ready to give the salute to all who love our Lord and His coming.

The next meeting will be at Big Valley on July 29, 30 and 31. Pray for and expect a great and glorious time. H. C. COBB.

Rural Telephone Service.

Since there is quite a little agitation of late in some parts of this county of the rural telephone service and especially does there exist quite a little misinformation about our service as a result of some incorrect statements that have been made by those who did not understand what they were talking about. I desire to call attention to (not only the rural people but of others who may be concerned in us enough to represent or discuss the rural service) our prices and terms of service. Our dues for those who own shares and their own phones in the corporate limits of Goldthwaite are 75c a month for residence phones and \$1 per month for business phones. To those who are not share holders or phone owners and who rent their phones we have arranged to lease phones for \$1.25 per month for residence and \$1.75 per month for business phones. This entitles all alike to the entire rural service. To those who come into the exchange over party lines, where four or more build and maintain their own line to our office, we make a rate of 25c a piece per month for direct connection with the Goldthwaite office. The rural exchanges in the country who have their central office and own their lines from said office to the central office at Goldthwaite have connection with the system through Goldthwaite office, where they take the service by the month, at 10c per month; where they do not care to take the service by the month they pay 3c per message. This list of charges obtains to all the exchanges connected with our board in Mills county. Any proposition to build rural lines connecting with the central office at Goldthwaite and any other office or town, such as Lometa, Star or Mullin, are not built by assessments upon rural exchanges or members, as has been reported, but are built by voluntary contributions. Whether you contribute to the building of said lines or not, if you have a rural phone in our connection you get all the service we have. So far as I have been able to learn, our entire system is satisfied with the rural service. I have had a number of expressions from individual phone users, some from every exchange and line in our system, that they are more than pleased with the service, and in most every instance claim to get more satisfactory service than they ever had before getting into the Rural system. We will not under any circumstance misrepresent or deceive any telephone company, or any one, to obtain their connection with our system. We do not believe in that kind of methods. We have grown beyond our expectations. It is true our expenses have been somewhat greater than we expected also, but for information of some who have had no financial interest in our system, and yet have been very much distressed seemingly about our financial obligation, I want to say, that our bills are all paid promptly, and our paper is worth one hundred cents on the dollar, and the system is not owned or controlled by any one or two individuals. Every share holder has as much voice in electing directors to superintend the management of the system as any other stock holder, notwithstanding the fact that one shareholder may own two or more shares. We hope that our friends will note carefully the data contained in this article concerning prices, etc, and not be influenced or persuaded to judge the rural system by erroneous statements that may be made, whether intentionally or otherwise to reflect upon our system. We shall continue and try to give the very best telephone service as we started out in the beginning, we shall do so at cost to every share holder and phone owner in the connection. Those who rent phones of course pay a little larger per cent than is usually considered for the amount that they would have invested if they were to buy a share and buy their phones they have the privilege at the end of any month to buy their share and pay for their phone and take the cheaper rate.

I hope there will not be any more misrepresentations of our system and that we shall in future, have pleasant relations, not only among ourselves, but with other telephone people, whether they be in sympathy with the rural telephone system or not. We have never changed one representation made by our management except that we did not meet plans at the beginning of operation. Yours for the best possible telephone service, at the cheapest possible price.

Rural Telephone Service.

Since there is quite a little agitation of late in some parts of this county of the rural telephone service and especially does there exist quite a little misinformation about our service as a result of some incorrect statements that have been made by those who did not understand what they were talking about. I desire to call attention to (not only the rural people but of others who may be concerned in us enough to represent or discuss the rural service) our prices and terms of service. Our dues for those who own shares and their own phones in the corporate limits of Goldthwaite are 75c a month for residence phones and \$1 per month for business phones. To those who are not share holders or phone owners and who rent their phones we have arranged to lease phones for \$1.25 per month for residence and \$1.75 per month for business phones. This entitles all alike to the entire rural service. To those who come into the exchange over party lines, where four or more build and maintain their own line to our office, we make a rate of 25c a piece per month for direct connection with the Goldthwaite office. The rural exchanges in the country who have their central office and own their lines from said office to the central office at Goldthwaite have connection with the system through Goldthwaite office, where they take the service by the month, at 10c per month; where they do not care to take the service by the month they pay 3c per message. This list of charges obtains to all the exchanges connected with our board in Mills county. Any proposition to build rural lines connecting with the central office at Goldthwaite and any other office or town, such as Lometa, Star or Mullin, are not built by assessments upon rural exchanges or members, as has been reported, but are built by voluntary contributions. Whether you contribute to the building of said lines or not, if you have a rural phone in our connection you get all the service we have. So far as I have been able to learn, our entire system is satisfied with the rural service. I have had a number of expressions from individual phone users, some from every exchange and line in our system, that they are more than pleased with the service, and in most every instance claim to get more satisfactory service than they ever had before getting into the Rural system. We will not under any circumstance misrepresent or deceive any telephone company, or any one, to obtain their connection with our system. We do not believe in that kind of methods. We have grown beyond our expectations. It is true our expenses have been somewhat greater than we expected also, but for information of some who have had no financial interest in our system, and yet have been very much distressed seemingly about our financial obligation, I want to say, that our bills are all paid promptly, and our paper is worth one hundred cents on the dollar, and the system is not owned or controlled by any one or two individuals. Every share holder has as much voice in electing directors to superintend the management of the system as any other stock holder, notwithstanding the fact that one shareholder may own two or more shares. We hope that our friends will note carefully the data contained in this article concerning prices, etc. and not be influenced or persuaded to judge the rural system by erroneous statements that may be made, whether intentionally or otherwise to reflect upon our system. We shall continue and try to give the very best telephone service as we started out in the beginning, we shall do so at cost to every share holder and phone owner in the connection. Those who rent phones of course pay a little larger per cent than is usually considered for the amount that they would have invested if they were to buy a share and buy their phones they have the privilege at the end of any month to buy their share and pay for their phone and take the cheaper rate. I hope there will not be any more misrepresentations of our system and that we shall in future, have pleasant relations, not only among ourselves, but with other telephone people, whether they be in sympathy with the rural telephone system or not. We have never changed one representation made by our management except that we did not meet plans at the beginning of operation. 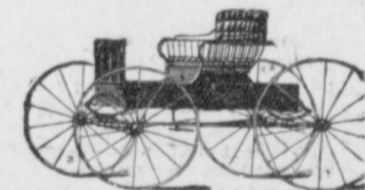

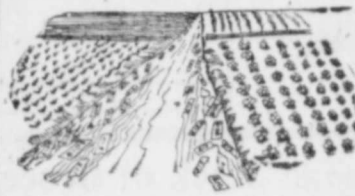

Wealth Creators.

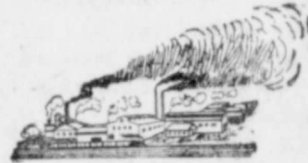
In building a house we must use material that is stable and durable, and in building a community we must use lines of industry that are constructive and active. The former promotes and the latter perpetuates prosperity. Among the classes of property that constitute building material for empires are public highways, railroads, factories, mines, irrigating canals, etc. These industries create and thrust values upon adjoining property, and the amount of unearned wealth they distribute depends upon their native characteristics and upon their surroundings, but it is more than likely that the irrigating canal makes the largest gift of permanent values to contiguous property. The land owner may let his farm lie idle and it will increase in fertility and value, but the manufacturer must run his factory as fast as the wheels will turn or his property decays and declines in value.



Industrial Activity.

What we have said of the factory is also true of all lines of constructive industry. The irrigating canal builds farms, the factory makes cities, and transportation facilities build both farms and cities, and any sort of property that has inherent characteristics of generosity and activity should be encouraged. Improved public highways constitute a most convincing invitation to industry, as the farm, the factory, the railroad, the mine and all the people are vitally interested in public highways, says the Texas Commercial Secretaries' Association.

A character study of property and an analysis of the requirements of a community are essential to the intelligent development of a locality. A commercial club is the architect of empires, and every citizen should join the local club and study property and its ability to develop the community.
