The six weeks session of the Brownwood Summer Normal was opened at the high school building this morning with large attendance, and there is every promise of the normal being the biggest ever held here.

W. B. Coppio, who formerly

lived in Brownwood and who is the father of W. F. Coppio at Thrifty and Walter Coppio at Blanket, was killed at his home in Bastrop county this week by a Jersey bull. He was driving his cattle to water when the animal, which had been considered a pet, attacked him.

Five young boys, ranging in age from 16 to 20 years, have recently invested \$112.50 in a few pounds of honey, and after paying that high price, were given one minute each in jail to further impress them that it is unlawful

to take honey without the permission of the owner. The boys live up in Byrd's Store community and one night last week decided to raid the gums belonging to a man by the name of Mills.—Bulletin.

COMANCHE

The new combination chemical engine and a hose cart of the city arrived last week and was set up at once in the fire department quarters in the city hall.

Uncle George Chancellor died at the home of his son, Robert N. Chancellor, in Archer county, Sunday morning at 5 o'clock and the remains arrived here Tuesday morning and were taken to Newburg where interment took place.

District court adjourned Wednesday for the term. The grand jury reconvened during the week and added to the long list of true bills returned, ten more, all misdemeanors. The total number of bills found by them during the term was 148, of which 26 were felonies and 117 misdemeanors.—Chief.

Prof. Proctor and Wallace, who have been with the Lampasas schools in the past, will each be employed in new fields the coming year. Prof. Proctor having accepted a position with the city schools at Temple, and Prof. Wallace has a position with the public schools at Brady.

Judge White reports that as far as the scholastic census of the county has been brought in by the census trustees, there is shown a falling off in the numerical strength of those within the scholastic age in the county, and we regret to say that this falling off is also noticeable in the independent district of the city of Lampasas.

Official weather observer W. H. Webber has kindly furnished The Leader with the record of the rainfall for the first five months of this and last year as follows: January, February, March, April and May, 1909, showed a precipitation of 7.11 inches, while the same months of 1910 show a precipitation of 12.13 inches, or a fraction over 5 inches more rainfall this year than last covering the same length of time.—Leader.

The state department of agriculture reports an estimated increase of 6 per cent in the acreage of cotton over last year in this state, and the condition of the crop is given as approximately the same as at the same season last year. There is a large increase in the acreage of corn, wheat and oats and the condition of these crops is much better than at the same time last year.

A report from Vera Cruz says that the most serious uprising with which the Mexican government has had to deal for a long time has occurred in the state of Yucatan and troops are being rushed to the disturbed area. In the meantime, reports which have come to hand indicate that there has been much bloodshed and that the insurgents are preparing for a battle with the government forces which is sure to come soon.

It is thought by some that he has an eye on the Georgia governor's chair, but so far he has not announced his candidacy for any office.

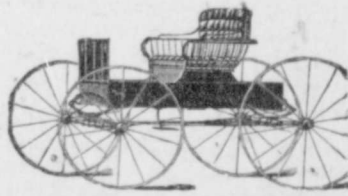

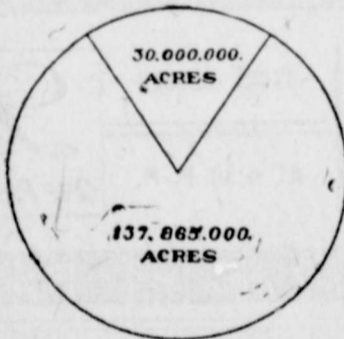

Idle Lands.

The prosperity of a community depends upon the activity of its property and the people. Improved public highways afford facilities for marketing production, stimulate commercial activity and otherwise encourages agricultural development. To increase agricultural production we must bring under cultivation idle land and increase the yield per acre.

We have in Texas 167,865,000 acres of land. Of this area there are 2,118,000 acres of water surface. All our land is susceptible to a high degree of cultivation except the city area and a small portion of our land which is mountainous. We now have less than 30,000,000 acres of land under cultivation, leaving 137,000,000 acres of land that has never been plowed. Idle land is of course no value to a community, and to increase our prosperity we must put activity into our vacant lands. The following cut illustrates the relative proportions of our cultivated and uncultivated areas:



Texas Land Comparison.

There are 199 counties that have less than 10 per cent of their land under cultivation. There are 43 counties that have a larger uncultivated area than the total area of the State of Rhode Island. The uncultivated area of Texas, says the Commercial Secretaries' Association, exceeds the total area of the thirteen original colonies, excepting Georgia and North Carolina. We need 3,000,000 farmers to develop our agricultural resources, and no country on the globe affords the opportunities to the homeseeker that Texas now offers. The land agent is an important factor in the development of agriculture. There are 199 people moving to Texas daily, and remain here permanently and of this number probably half of them go on the farm.



People Coming to Texas.

At the present rate of agricultural immigration it will take 400 years to secure a sufficient number of farmers to bring under cultivation our idle lands. We must get farmers from other States and countries more rapidly, and the improvement of our public highways will influence the homeseeker by making farm life attractive.

Our Citizens.

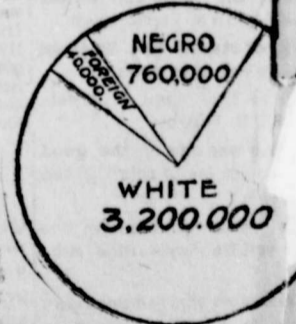
The density of population and the activity of the citizenship has largely to do with the prosperity of a community. We must look to the stork and the immigration agent to increase our population. Texas has the largest families of any State in the Union. The size of the average Texas family is 5.25, and the size of the average family in the United States is 4.75. We have in Texas 122,000 births annually, which is a birth every four minutes.



Texas Stork.

We have 43,734 deaths, which is a death every twelve minutes. We have a net gain in population of nine per hour, or 78,266 per annum. Our birth rate is 33 per 1,000 population per annum, and the death rate 11 per 1,000 population per annum, making a natural gain of 22 per 1,000 population per year. We find that 30 per cent of the people born in Texas go to other States, which leaves us a net population of 16 per 1,000 population per annum, or a total of 56,000 per year. It would take the stork five years to double the population of a community, says the Texas Commercial Secretaries' Association. The stork is a splendid bird, but slow for Commercial Club work.

Ninety-eight per cent of population of Texas speaks English. We have 107,110 more males than females. Seventy-one per cent of our population is native born white; 19 per cent is negro, and 10 per cent is foreign born.

There are 325,000 unmarried in Texas of marriageable age. If any one desiring a wife fails to investigate our opportunities and advantages along our public lines. We have 869,864 of our population of school age. In 1900 Texas had a sixth in population in the United States. We had twelve per cent of the population in 1900. We show a population of less than the people in 1900. The annual increase in white population is relatively cent greater than the colored population.

The chairman announced the appointment of members of the executive committee in their respective precincts as presiding officers of election for the primary and they were instructed to employ none but Democrats to assist in holding the election, under penalty of law.

Goldthwaite, Mullin, Center City, Caradan and Priddy will each be allowed a double set of officers for the primary, which will be eight men, and each man will be allowed \$2 for his work in holding the election and \$2 will be allowed for making returns of the boxes from each voting place.

All voting boxes except those enumerated will be allowed only four men to hold the election and they will be allowed \$2 each for their services. An allowance of \$2 will also be made for making return of the boxes from each precinct.

The presiding officers of election were warned that the law forbids employing any but Democrats in holding the primary and that the polls must be opened at 8 a. m. and closed at 7 p. m.

The committee decided that only one primary election should be held in the county by the party and that candidates should be nominated by plurality vote.

The chairman appointed J. W. Roberts, W. J. Jones, E. L. Martin, J. F. Brockenbrough and M. V. Nowell as a primary committee, whose duty it will be to meet in Goldthwaite July 11, and assist the chairman in apportioning and preparing election supplies.

The chairman was authorized to place assessment on all candidates sufficient to pay their share of the expense of holding the primary election and in the event there shall be an overplus of funds he is to return it to those who pay in proportion to their assessments.

Some members of the committee were not present and other places have been made vacant by resignation and other causes, making appointment by the chairman necessary in some cases. The following gentlemen now constitute the committee:
