### Citizens Of Goldthwaite, Take Notice.

Your name may appear in the list of names published below. If it does, this item will be of interest to you. The persons whose names appear below owe taxes to the City of Goldthwaite for the years 1908 or 1909, or both 1908 and 1909. The City is publishing this notice for your benefit, with the request that you pay up and save yourself and the city further expense and trouble in the matter.

The law provides two methods by which delinquent taxes may be collected:

1st.—By seizure and sale of personal property, belonging to the delinquent taxpayer, of sufficient value to pay all taxes due upon property owned in the city, whether such property be real or personal property.

2nd.—The foreclosure upon and sale for taxes of all lands within the city upon which taxes have not been paid for any year or years.

This notice is published with a view of saving expense and trouble to those who wish to pay their taxes. Against those who do not promptly pay to Mack Brinson, the city collector, such taxes as are due by them to the city, it will become my duty to institute legal proceedings for the collection of the same. Now, I submit to your candid consideration as citizens that it is cheaper to pay your taxes than it is to have your property seized and sold to pay them for you, together with the added expense of the cost of such a procedure. Please call on Mack Brinson and settle accounts and we will both be spared the annoyance of litigation.

### Incorporation Legal.

The court of appeals has sustained Judge Goodwin's decision in refusing to grant an injunction against the city of Goldthwaite to prevent the extension of Parker street. This case was styled D. H. Trent et al.; and sought to prevent the condemning of certain property for street purposes, and the contention was made that the city government as it now exists is illegal, because the council changed the form from village incorporation to city incorporation. The decision of the higher court is by Judge Jenkins, who holds that the council had a right to change the form of government without submitting the question to a vote of the citizens. Judge Jenkins says that it might be a better way to submit the question of changing the form of city government to a vote of the people, but the legislature did not provide for the change to be made in that way and the city incorporation is therefore legal.
