BROWNWOOD.

The home of Jesse F. Cross, Oleander and Lipscomb streets, was damaged by fire to the extent of \$1000 at 4:30 o'clock Wednesday morning when fire from defective wiring broke out in an upper bedroom.

SAN SABA.

The board of trustees of the Richland Springs High School last Saturday night elected Prof. Jeff D. Livsey superintendent of the school at that place. Prof. Livsey was principal of the San Saba school year before last and is now acting president of the West Texas Normal and Business college at Cherokee.

The way the work is progressing it looks like the Santa Fe might run the first train into San Saba from the west instead of the east as is general supposed. It is reported that every mile of the right-of-way from Richland Springs west to the county, save one, has a force of hands and teams working on it. The record is not so good to the east of town.

The Attorney General has turned down the school bond issue for Richland Springs. It seems that the district was laid out many years ago and that other districts have been cut out around, about and from it and so many changes have been made from time to time in the district lines that the Attorney General holds that the exact boundaries are so vague that the district has in fact lost its identity.—News.

COMANCHE.

The Newburg people state that an inch rain fell just below that place Monday night and that a good scope of country was benefited by it.

Prof. M. K. Witt came in a trip Thursday night and at 11:30 was married to Miss Opal Cathey, no one but those directly interested knowing aught of the proposed wedding. Rev. John W. Marshall, who held a meeting here recently for the Christian church, performed the ceremony. The couple left on the train at once for Denver and other western points. Prof. Witt is superintendent and his bride has been a member of the faculty of the public schools.—Chief.

The long-awaited and anxiously awaited pugilistic contest at Reno, Nevada, took place Monday and Jack Johnson, the Texas negro, knocked out his white adversary, James Jeffries, in the fifteenth round. There was an immense amount of money wagered on the fight throughout the country and great odds were placed on the white man in most cases. Some think the fight was a "frame-up" and the governor of California publicly stated the belief that there was an understanding between the men and the fight was not to be a trial of skill or power, but if there was a former understanding the fact will probably never be known.

President Taft will have absolute quiet at his summer home at Beverly, Mass., for ten days, beginning Tuesday of this week, during which time no one will be allowed to see him on any kind of business of a public nature.

Address to Democratic Voters of Mills County.

We are in the midst of one of the most peculiar as well as important campaigns ever experienced in Texas. The four principal candidates for Governor have spoken at Goldthwaite. In reviewing their claims we desire to have you carefully investigate their platforms in regard to the best interest of Texas, without regard to the political fortunes of any man.

We call your attention to them in order they spoke in Goldthwaite:

April 25, the Hon. Cone Johnson spoke to an audience generally estimated at 1000. He contended that the people of Texas have complied with every reasonable and legal demand upon the legislature to obtain the submission for their consideration of a Prohibition Amendment to our Constitution and because a little more than one-third and yet a minority of said representatives refused to vote we were not allowed submission. Mr. Johnson severely arraigned the minority of the legislature for refusing to carry out the only plank the people ever placed in a state platform by their vote. He does not propose to rest and let the minority rule either at the ballot box or in the legislature, but will, if elected Governor, exercise any power at his command to let the people have submission and vote on and settle the state wide prohibition question that way. In case we fail another time, he asserts (and gives a number of supreme court decisions not only from Texas but U. S. as well, to sustain his position) that he will call upon and urge the legislature by a majority vote to pass a state wide law effectually putting the saloon out of Texas, and in case of failure, then he would advocate a law of regulation, such as Tennessee law prohibiting a saloon within three, four or five miles of a church, or school house, not only in the country but in town as well. Mr. Johnson was against prohibition in 1887. His opponent (not enemies) have not found where he has made a speech against prohibition since 1889, the year he married. He claims and those

who know him best at his home says he has been a pro seven or eight years, since he became a Christian. The endorsements from citizens in his own town and county is wonderful. The anti and some pros say he is a new convert, but only a few hard cases claim he is not a genuine prohibitionist. The saloons are all fighting him, and that's good evidence. We ask you to get his platform, read his policies, if you want to know his position on public questions.

Next in order is Hon. O. B. Colquitt, who (spoke to 700 or 800 people May 6, 1910) seems rather proud to be an out and out anti-prohibitionist and is not even willing to agree to the matter of submitting the question to a vote of the people. He is fighting for political rest in one sentence and in another talking about some law he would have passed or repealed. Like most all modern anti, he is a great advocate of "Local Option" until he gets a chance to vote, then his ticket would best read "For Local Saloons" instead of "Against Prohibition." There is one thing we suggest should cause every good citizen to look upon with suspicion, and that is the claim and we believe it is a fact that every gambler and outlaw, together with the saloon interest generally, and all immoral elements are rallying to his support, and aiding his campaign every way possible. The right side is usually the opposite to such a crowd. His picture is seen in most saloon windows.

Third, we call attention to Gen. R. V. Davidson, who spoke to about 800 people June 16, 1910, who has been Attorney General for five years and resigned said office to make the race for governor, (very different from Mr. Colquitt who is receiving more than \$10 00 per day for his services as R. R. Commissioner, where he is needed daily and is putting in his time going over Texas, asking to be governor, and at the same time telling us we shall not have a right to vote on changing our constitution on the prohibition question, if he can help it. It looks like Texas is paying the freight for him.) Mr. Davidson is claiming the nomination upon his record. Texas has honored him and freely vindicated him from any charge made by the Waters Pierce Oil Co. or by any one else, by electing him the third time. At this time we need not only a man of legal mind, but, to give us the best service, we want a man who is opposed to the open saloon and not an "anti from principle." Mr. Davidson said, when asked if he would oppose

or let a state wide prohibition statute become a law without his signature, that unless it was a platform demand he would have to wait until it was presented to him, and then let him exercise his conscience about it. This conscience matter upon such vital questions is important. Mr. Davidson being as he says an anti in principle, can we afford to put him in the very place where his conscience might have the balance of power to give us prohibition or deny it.

Judge Poindexter, who spoke to about 800 people June 23, 1910, is the fourth and last to speak, and like the criminal lawyer who is watching the opposing council, he tried hard to cinch his case and secure a verdict, but fortunately the voters are not "under court rule" after his argument is over. Judge Poindexter is just as unwilling to have a decision of the law upon statutory prohibition from the Supreme court of Texas, the only place to finally decide upon its constitutionality, when he says he would vote such a bill, as Mr. Colquitt is in not being willing to allow the people a chance to vote on the question of submission. They both seem to want to exercise too much power, or conscience. Judge Poindexter's position on court reform is practically what Johnson put in his original platform. The Judge, like most lawyers, tries to build himself up by asserting that Johnson was not sincere. He was not considered fair in his talk about his opponents by the friends of the other candidates. He made several statements that have been called in question. His yardstick in measuring a prohibitionist goes back to 1887, and yet he is accredited with saying May 1, 1908, at Waxahachie that he and Bailey both believed in state wide prohibition by constitutional amendment, in 1887, but the workings of local option had wrought such a change as to make him opposed at that time to state wide prohibition but in favor of local option. If that be true, he is newer than Johnson as a convert. His statement concerning the Hon. Cone Johnson's reception at Gainesville has been established as false by telegrams and other information. His attempt to discredit Johnson by reading one sentence from the middle of a strong prohibition letter and trying to pervert the meaning of said letter is condemned by all, and for him not to read the entire letter is not only unfair but ridiculous. The report, as shown by the Johnson county records, which shows that his property in Cleburne, known as the Porter Hotel, was used as a saloon from 1901 to 1904, has not been refuted or denied and makes the Judge look bad as a "simon pure" prohibitionist.

After summing up, as best we can, we gladly join the Smith county and Tyler voters (believing as we do that the Hon. Cone Johnson is an honorable man and intelligent, Christian gentleman, with sufficient experience and training and endowed with such faculties, and whose life and character as set forth in almost every utterance accredited to him in the past seven or eight years, standing out on such a platform as he gives us with the additional assertion that he will, if Governor, carry out the demands of the people of Texas and give them his best thought and service) in recommending him to all who feel that we should unite in one common interest—the protection of the homes of Texas against the saloon and its attendant evils, as a peerless leader and one in every respect qualified to be Governor of Texas. We ask you to join us in giving him the nomination at the Democratic primaries, July 23, 1910. Don't forget Submission, whether you are for Johnson or not. Every citizen living in a republic ought to be willing to vote on a proposition to alter or change the constitution, which can only be done by a majority vote of the people. Vote for Submission.

Johnson Meeting.

A meeting of the supporter of Hon. Cone Johnson for governor was held in the court house last Saturday afternoon. About 50 or 60 voters were present and most of them were enthusiastic supporters of Mr. Johnson.

The meeting was organized by electing Dr. M. L. Brown chairman and R. M. Thompson secretary.

A committee composed of Dr. Brown C. S. Welch, G. W. Jackson, W. E. Grisham and R. M. Thompson was appointed to outline an address to the public. The committee retired and in a few moments reported the outline of an address, which was adopted by the meeting.

A publication committee was selected, composed of Dr. J. D. Calaway, Walter Weathers, Jo H. Frizzell, J. C. Street and Dr. M. L. Brown.

The committee was authorized to publish the address that had been ratified by the meeting.

The names of the Johnson supporters present were enrolled and a list was also made of those in various parts of the county who were known to be friendly to Mr. Johnson, a finance committee was appointed and the meeting adjourned.

Offices Not Separated.

The offices of sheriff and tax collector will not be separated in Mills county for the next ten years, since the census report shows the county's population to be only 9694, which is 306 short of the number required to separate the offices and they will remain together until the next census, which will be in 1920. It is universally admitted, no doubt that there were enough people overlooked by the enumerators to have more than covered the shortage, but these oversights were to have been expected, for it was next to impossible to list every man, woman and child in the county.

The offices of district and county clerk will probably be divided, as only 8000 population is required to separate these two offices.

A produce dealer at Jacksonville this week sold twenty-five car loads of tomatoes to one buyer.

In a collision between a freight and passenger train on the Big Four railroad at Middleton, Ohio, Monday 23 people lost their lives and many others were badly injured.

The city council of Fort Worth will have presented at its next meeting an ordinance forbidding the display in moving picture shows of the films of the prize fight. This is a very wise move and should be followed by the council in all of the cities in the country.

The clashes between the white people and negroes as a result of the outcome of the fight at Reno have been numerous. There is no doubt that the negro's victory in the prize fight will cause a great deal of trouble for the white race in subduing the overly enthusiastic "coons."

The lower house of the Louisiana legislature has adopted a bill making kidnapping punishable by death and inflicting the same punishment upon an accomplice as on the principal. The measure is yet to be passed on by the senate, but it is claimed that it will pass that body without opposition.

Judge Melville W. Fuller, chief justice of the supreme court of the United States, died at his summer residence at Bar Harbor, Me., at 6 o'clock Monday morning, the result of heart disease, from which he has suffered a long time. He was in his 78th year and had been on the supreme bench for 22 years, having been appointed to the position by President Cleveland in 1888.

A young lady in Waco, Miss Nora Freelee, died from a shock last Saturday when she saw a buggy in which her mother was riding overturned. Her brother had fallen from a load of hay a short time before and she had seen the accident. Her mother was summoned to the young man and when nearing the house the accident to her buggy was witnessed by the young lady, who sank to the floor and died without regaining consciousness.

Sometimes friends and patrons enquire the reason for the Eagle's failure to endorse some one of the candidates for governor and advocate his election. The answer is easy: The Eagle is a newspaper and not a political organ, although its editor is a Democrat and advocates the principles of that party. The editor personally favors the election of Hon. Cone Johnson, but has no more intention of running a "Johnson paper" than has the advocate of some of the other candidates to conduct their business in the interest of their favorites. It would seem strange to see the advertisement of a grocery store or a dry goods, hardware or drug store conducted in the name and interest of one of the candidates. As a citizen the editor advocates men, but the paper only advocates measures and its columns are open to all the candidates and their friends on uniform terms.

A Plea For Reform.

Society is educating our people all out of proportion. Especially is this true in towns and cities. To develop useful and strong character as well as read good books and periodicals, people have always found it necessary to devote some time to sober, earnest reflection. Taking time to think well has resulted thousands of times in true and noble life, while the want of such thinking never did develop anything important or of value. We have passed into a stage of society which requires such frequent appearance in public or constant effort at social life that there remains no time for foundation upon which to build a life truly good and useful. When one begins to think of the endless number of clubs and lodges and society organizations and fashionable entertainments for the young, there is no wonder so many lives come up in weakness and result in little of value.

The rule has long been established that the country boy or girl goes into college or training school and gains honors and distinction over the city classmates. This is due not to difference in mental power or activity of mind but to difference in home environment. One has been reared in a whirl of excitement, which creates unrest amid the honest duties of practical life; the other has been remote from the feverish society which mainly grows mushroom people. I remember once having earnestly solicited a young man to come out to church on a certain night in midweek. He excused himself by saying that he had engagements for that night and also for most of the nights in each week. I knew then, as I know now, that nothing of merit could ever come to such a gad-about life. It goes without saying that socially mixing and mingling to some extent with any rank of people is well, but nothing worthy or amiable is found in the life trying only to fill the sentiments of present-day society. David did get the immortal plans for God's matchless edifice from the movements of outer life, but he gathered them in quiet reflection and serious meditation. "It came to pass as David sat in his house that he said to Nathan, 'Lo, I dwell in a house of cedar, but the ark of the Lord remaineth under curtains.'" A brighter day will have dawned upon our race when we come to think more of evolving useful mental strength and developing true character and less of complying with the expectations of a useless and restless society.

Then it happens sometimes that a society faddist marries because there comes a chance (it's mostly chance, you know). There is no such thing as raising up children—for society's sake that is purposely left off. The home is cheerless and dull without a child in it. It was designed so to be. I am in deep sympathy with the man and wife who have spent years in married life and know not the animation and joy of a parent's heart. No child of their own flesh and blood upon which to bestow affection and sincere pride! What is a more beautiful scene—even in society—than a healthy looking mother with a rosy, chubby, sweet, little one in her arms? If anything is more beautiful it is where both father and mother have one each in their parental embrace and in smiles and caresses betray a sense of richness which could not be bestowed by all the gold of Ophir. Jacob, after having been away

from his father's home for twenty years and on his return with his large family, met his inquiring brother and said to him, "These are the children which God hath graciously given me." Children are not a gracious gift in the mind of some.

To be moulded after the sentiment of present-day society creates unrest and uncertainty when life's real demands come upon us. It often results in failing health—broken-down health and shattered nerves don't always mean congenial climate. Divorce cases are growing on our race in a way to be alarming. The most frequent cause for divorces, as we hear it, is—"Their lives were not congenial." Truly so; but the want of congeniality arose from the light way of thinking and the constant rush filling up a false standard created in society days. It turns out always that those seeking pleasure in wrong paths finally find themselves very far from happiness—in many cases blighted and pitiable. SAM SAY.

Proposed Amendment to the State Constitution Authorizing the Establishment of a Home for Wives and Widows of Confederate Soldiers and Sailors

House Joint Resolution No. 7

Joint Resolution to amend Section 51 of Article 3 of the Constitution of the State of Texas, as amended in 1903, so as to authorize the grant of aid in the establishment and maintenance of a home for the disabled and dependent wives and widows of Confederate soldiers and sailors and such women as aided the Confederacy, and making an appropriation.

Be it Resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

SECTION 1 That Section 51 of Article 3 of the Constitution of the State of Texas, as amended in 1903, be so amended as to hereafter read as follows:

Article 3, Section 51. The Legislature shall have no power to make any grant or authorize the making of any grant of public money to any individual, associations of individuals, municipal or other corporations whatsoever; provided, however, the Legislature may grant aid to indigent and disabled Confederate soldiers and sailors who came to Texas prior to January 1, 1880, and who are either over sixty years of age or whose disability is the proximate result of actual service in the Confederate army for a period of at least three months, their widows in indigent circumstances who have never remarried and have been bona fide residents of the State of Texas since March 1, 1880, and who were married to such soldiers or sailors anterior to March 1, 1880; provided, said aid shall not exceed eight dollars per month, and provided further, that no appropriations shall ever be made for the purpose hereinbefore specified in excess of five hundred thousand dollars for any one year. And also grant aid to the establishment and maintenance of a home for said soldiers and sailors, their wives and widows and women who aided in the Confederacy, under such regulations and limitations as may be provided by law; provided, the grant to aid said home shall not exceed one hundred and fifty thousand dollars for any one year, and no inmate of said homes shall be entitled to any other aid from the State; the Legislature may provide for husband and wife to remain together in the home; and provide further, that the provisions of this Section shall not be construed to prevent the grant of aid in case of public calamity.

SEC 2 The Governor of the State is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for the submission of this amendment to the qualified voters of the State of Texas at the regular election of State officers, in November, 1910.

The sum of \$5,000 00, or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated to pay the expenses of carrying out the provisions of this Resolution.

Proposed Amendment to the State Constitution Authorizing the Establishment of a Home for Wives and Widows of Confederate Soldiers and Sailors

House Joint Resolution No. 7.
Joint Resolution to amend Section 51 of Article 3 of the Constitution of the State of Texas, as amended in 1903, so as to authorize the grant of aid in the establishment and maintenance of a home for the disabled and dependent wives and widows of Confederate soldiers and sailors and such women as aided the Confederacy, and making an appropriation.

Be it Enacted by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

SECTION 1 That Section 51 of Article 3 of the Constitution of the State of Texas, as amended in 1903, be so amended as to hereafter read as follows:

Article 3, Section 51. The Legislature shall have no power to make any grant or authorize the making of any grant of public money to any individual, associations of individuals, municipal or other corporations whatsoever; provided, however, the Legislature may grant aid to indigent and disabled Confederate soldiers and sailors who came to Texas prior to January 1, 1880, and who are either over sixty years of age or whose disability is the proximate result of actual service in the Confederate army for a period of at least three months, their widows in indigent circumstances who have never remarried and have been bona fide residents of the State of Texas since March 1, 1880, and who were married to such soldiers or sailors anterior to March 1, 1880; provided, said aid shall not exceed eight dollars per month, and provided further, that no appropriations shall ever be made for the purposes hereinbefore specified in excess of five hundred thousand dollars for any one year. And also grant aid to the establishment and maintenance of a home for said soldiers and sailors, their wives and widows and women who aided in the Confederacy, under such regulations and limitations as may be provided by law; provided, the grant to aid said home shall not exceed one hundred and fifty thousand dollars for any one year, and no inmate of said home shall be entitled to any other aid from the State; the Legislature may provide for husband and wife to remain together in the home; and provide further, that the provisions of this Section shall not be construed to prevent the grant of aid in case of public calamity.

SEC 2 The Governor of the State is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for the submission of this amendment to the qualified voters of the State of Texas at the regular election of State officers, in November, 1910.

The sum of \$5,000.00, or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated to pay the expenses of carrying out the provisions of this Resolution.




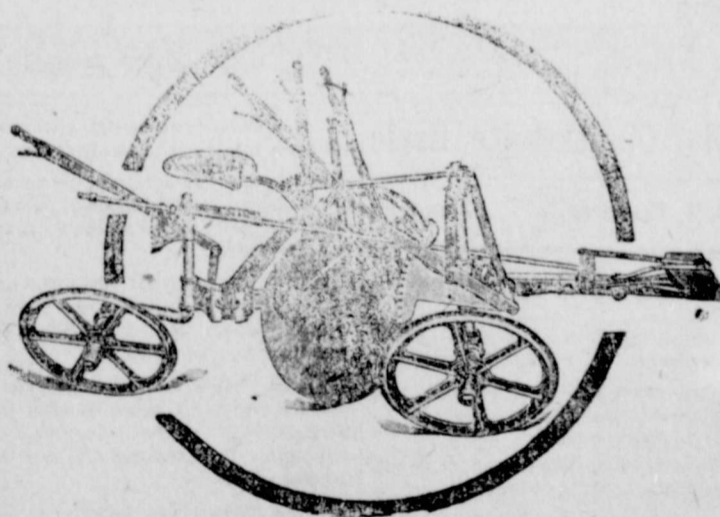
