Items Culled From the Leading Local Papers.

SAN ANNA

Mrs. Ed. M. Dickerson and Miss Essie Hudson are attending the district convention of the Christian church which is in session at Santa Anna. The members of this church are striving hard to get a pastor for the local church.

The revival meeting in the big tent at the Baptist church closed Monday night. The preaching of Rev. Holland was direct and much good was accomplished. There were 26 professions, and about as many restorations and 15 additions to the Baptist church.

H. H. Doran and wife will leave today for Washington. They will first visit Mr. Doran's brother, Jas. Doran, at Mt. Vernon, after which they will spend the summer there and at other points on the Pacific coast. Mr. Doran is sure he will go as far as British Columbia and it is likely he will see Alaska during the summer.

A contract has been closed with the Goldthwaite band to play at the Fair and Encampment August 2 to 5. Many of our people will remember that this band played at the fair two years ago and did splendid service. It is a good band of nice, clean, young men, well disciplined, and their selection assures the management of some good entertaining music during the Encampment.

The commissioners court was in session last week for the purpose of making a final pass on plans and specifications for the new court house, if anything was presented which was satisfactory. After carefully considering everything presented the plans submitted by Mr. Chamberlain of the firm of Chamberlain & Co. of Birmingham, Ala., with branch house at Fort Worth, Texas, were adopted. Mr. Chamberlain is to meet the court on July 26, and turn over his detailed specifications for the approval of the court.—News.

LAMPASAS.

Ed Standefer and Miss Blanche Lastley were married at the home of the bride's mother Wednesday afternoon at 4 o'clock.

Mrs. W. E. Huggins died Saturday night, after an illness extending over several months. The disease was pronounced pelegra by the local physician.

Mesdames T. I. Rosser and A. D. Gentry, of Rochell, are visiting at the home of their sister, Mrs. T. E. Harwell, two miles south of Lampasas.

W. F. Hearne, of Goldthwaite, was among the visitors here Monday. He owns some valuable property at this place and makes occasional visits here.

A fatal accident occurred near the W. H. Lanford home Saturday afternoon. In company with a number of other men, Albert Fowler was bathing in the Lampasas river, when he made a dive from a high point, and coming to the surface at once announced that he was killed. He was completely paralyzed from his hips downward, but perfectly conscious and related that his

foot slipped as he made the spring to dive, and that he could not live. Medical aid was summoned at once, but he expired in spite of all that could be done to relieve him.—Leader.

HAMILTON.

Judge J. W. Warren returned Wednesday from Dallas and Fort Worth where he went to have his eyes treated. He received no relief and his condition at present is considered quite serious. His general strength is falling him

rapidly and his recovery is very doubtful.

On Monday night the S. N. & S. T. people, (now the Cotton Belt) in advance of its track laying crew out of Gatesville, proceeded to a point in Hamilton county, some ten miles east of Hamilton, where the new survey crosses the right-of-way of the projected T. & N. W. railway, and there laid some two hundred feet of steel, being the first to lay actual track at the proposed crossing. Tuesday night this

track very mysteriously disappeared and upon investigation was found torn to pieces and stacked several yards away. It was also ascertained that a detachment of T. & N. W. men who left Hamilton some time during the night had done the work and had sued out a writ of injunction which has been served upon the Cotton Belt people restraining them from replacing the track across the T. & N. W. right-of-way.—Rustler.

Stay Out Of The Democratic Primary Election.

There are three excellent reasons why voters should stay out of the democratic primary elections to be held July 23.

1st: If you are a prohibitionist you may pledge your vote to an anti. This would be extremely repulsive to you when in November you would remember you had taken a pledge way back in July to support the ticket nominated, regardless of its personality or its principle. By entering the July primary you may be contracting for a mess of crow in November which would be hard for you to take on a weak stomach.

2nd: If you are an anti you may be agreeing to take your crow in the person of a prohibitionist in November. This would be hard to do as your stomach would be very weak and a mess of crow would be as nauseating for you as it would for the other fellow.

One side or the other is sure to have "crow" for November. To say the least of the mixture if it is not all "crow" for the prohibitionist or for anti-prohibitionist the mess fixed up for November by this Democratic primary will contain such a seasoning of "crow" that it may not look good to any one who ordered it. You subscribe for your portion of this mess when you vote in the Democratic primary, therefore, don't subscribe for any of it, but refuse to enter the primary.

3rd: Have you lost anything, have you lost any of your rights as a citizen, by staying out of the primary. Most certainly you have not, but you have preserved all of your rights as a free American citizen, as a citizen of the great state of Texas, for you are absolutely free when the election comes off in November to vote for whom you please. You will have acted wisely and will feel that you are a voter without any strings to you and will be at perfect liberty to cut out all the "crow" and fix up a ticket to your liking.

The primary is a bunco game and always has been, and if you are not capper or the managers of the game you will be buncoed as you have been many times before. Stay out of the primary and let the capper or the managers bunco each other, if they can, but don't let them bunco you. There will be two tickets in the field this fall and you will once again have the privilege of a free citizen, viz: of pulling off an honest, intelligent election in November instead of helping manipulate a bunco game in July to the end that you may participate in a farce in November.

Cut out the primary and you out out the "crow."

Cut out the primary, and you will out out your share in the bunco game. The primary only gives you one chance in seven to get the man you want. Will you take odds of seven to one on this primary game and forfeit your rights as a free citizen? We hope not.

Better Service For Priddy.

The Eagle has hopes that the postal service for the Priddy community will be greatly improved in the near future. At present the people of that community are served by only one rural delivery and there is no post-office at Priddy. A great many of the citizens live a long way from the rural route and in some instances mail boxes are several miles from the residences of the patrons of the route. Besides this, the round-about way in which the mail is conveyed to that community is decidedly slow and unsatisfactory. As an example: A letter mailed at Goldthwaite for a citizen of Priddy community must go to Brownwood, then over the Frisco to Stephenville, thence by the S. N. & S. T. to Hamilton and from there to Indian Gap, where it is delivered to the carrier.

The Eagle's editor called the attention of Congressman Sargent to this condition when he was here this week and he secured full information on the subject and promised to take the matter up with the Washington authorities with a view to getting for the people of Priddy better postal service.

A Joint Discussion.

There was a misunderstanding and considerable dissatisfaction because of some of those in authority at the reunion grounds having agreed for a political discussion to be held at the tabernacle during the reunion, and while the arrangements had been made and speakers invited for the occasion, the speakers and others interested decided that they would rather cancel their dates than to cause dissension among the old soldiers, so they changed the place of the speaking from the tabernacle to the court house Thursday afternoon.

Judge Swayne of Fort Worth, representing Hon. Cone Johnson, Hon. J. Cox of Temple, representing Mr. Colquitt, and Hon. D. A. Paddieford of Cleburne, representing Judge Poindexter, each spoke something near an hour to an audience of not more than 100. There was considerable partisan enthusiasm displayed by members of the audience as well as the speakers, but nothing new was developed further than the statement by Judge Swayne that he was a friend and advocate of Mr. Davidson for governor, but that he had come to realize that those interested in Democratic policy and submission must "get together," and that Mr. Johnson could be elected if the united support of those opposed to Mr. Colquitt's policies was given him. Aside from this statement by Judge Swayne, the speeches were along the usual lines.

Notice To The Public.

As the primary is almost here, and knowing that sometimes some men's zeal for the success of their favorite candidate leads them to resort to schemes and misleading reports at a time too near election day to be corrected, we take this method of saying to all Mills county voters that we have tried to make this race on a high plane of principle and manhood. We are both in the race to stay till the votes are counted on July 23. Should any reports to the contrary be made, or should any statement be uttered against either of us of a derogatory nature that has not hitherto been reported, we ask all voters to consider such as political trickery. What has not been revealed on us during the several months we have been in this race, is not likely to come to light at the last when too late to allow men to know the truth before they vote.

Proposed Amendment to the State Constitution Authorizing the Establishment of a Home for Widows and Widows of Confederate Soldiers and Sailors

House Joint Resolution No. 7. Joint Resolution to amend Section 51 of Article 3 of the Constitution of the State of Texas, as amended in 1903, so as to authorize the grant of aid in the establishment and maintenance of a home for the disabled and dependent wives and widows of Confederate soldiers and sailors and such women as aided the Confederacy, and making an appropriation.

Be it Resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

SECTION 1. That Section 51 of Article 3 of the Constitution of the State of Texas, as amended in 1903, be so amended as to hereafter read as follows:

Article 3, Section 51. The Legislature shall have no power to make any grant or authorize the making of any grant of public money to any individual, associations of individuals, municipal or other corporations whatsoever; provided, however, the Legislature may grant aid to indigent and disabled Confederate soldiers and sailors who came to Texas prior to January 1, 1880, and who are either over sixty years of age or whose disability is the proximate result of actual service in the Confederate army for a period of at least three months, their widows in indigent circumstances who have never remarried and have been bona fide residents of the State of Texas since March 1, 1880, and who were married to such soldiers or sailors anterior to March 1, 1880; provided, said aid shall not exceed eight dollars per month, and provided further, that no appropriations shall ever be made for the purpose hereinbefore specified in excess of five hundred thousand dollars for any one year. And also grant aid to the establishment and maintenance of a home for said soldiers and sailors, their wives and widows and women who aided in the Confederacy, under such regulations and limitations as may be provided by law; provided, the grant to aid said home shall not exceed one hundred and fifty thousand dollars for any one year, and no inmate of said home shall be entitled to any other aid from the State; the Legislature may provide for husband and wife to remain together in the home; and provide further, that the provisions of this Section shall not be construed to prevent the grant of aid in case of public calamity.

SEC. 2. The Governor of the State is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for the submission of this amendment to the qualified voters of the State of Texas at the regular election of State officers, in November, 1910.

The sum of \$5,000 00, or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated to pay the expenses of carrying out the provisions of this Resolution.

Be it Resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:
SECTION 1. That Section 51 of Article 3 of the Constitution of the State of Texas, as amended in 1903, be so amended as to hereafter read as follows:

Article 3, Section 51. The Legislature shall have no power to make any grant or authorize the making of any grant of public money to any individual, associations of individuals, municipal or other corporations whatsoever; provided, however, the Legislature may grant aid to indigent and disabled Confederate soldiers and sailors who came to Texas prior to January 1, 1880, and who are either over sixty years of age or whose disability is the proximate result of actual service in the Confederate army for a period of at least three months, their widows in indigent circumstances who have never remarried and have been bona fide residents of the State of Texas since March 1, 1880, and who were married to such soldiers or sailors anterior to March 1, 1880; provided, said aid shall not exceed eight dollars per month, and provided further, that no appropriations shall ever be made for the purpose hereinbefore specified in excess of five hundred thousand dollars for any one year. And also grant aid to the establishment and maintenance of a home for said soldiers and sailors, their wives and widows and women who aided in the Confederacy, under such regulations and limitations as may be provided by law; provided, the grant to aid said home shall not exceed one hundred and fifty thousand dollars for any one year, and no inmate of said home shall be entitled to any other aid from the State; the Legislature may provide for husband and wife to remain together in the home; and provide further, that the provisions of this Section shall not be construed to prevent the grant of aid in case of public calamity.

SEC. 2. The Governor of the State is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for the submission of this amendment to the qualified voters of the State of Texas at the regular election of State officers, in November, 1910.

The sum of \$5,000 00, or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated to pay the expenses of carrying out the provisions of this Resolution.

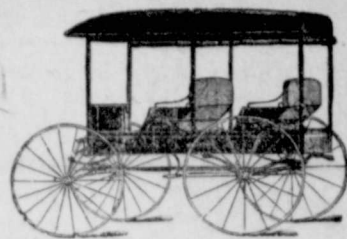

The Poindexter Cleburne Property.

In order that I might be sure of the records as reported of Liquor Dealers' Bonds in Johnson county—from 1901 to 1904—of the different firms who occupied a room in the Porter's Hotel as saloon men, I spent three hours in Cleburne Tuesday of this week. The information from the Bonds, the statement of the County Clerk and his deputy, also of Dr. Eugene S. Scheble and a number of others, most of them friends of Judge Poindexter, give me positive assurance that there was a saloon, known as the "Headlight Saloon," running wide open in the Porter Hotel building for several years before the Local Option went into effect in Johnson county in 1904. Every one I talked to seemed to be surprised that Judge Poindexter or anyone else would deny such a fact.

This statement is made to let the people in Mills county know the facts, and you can judge for yourself whether this matter is proper for a member of the church and a prohibitionist to do. If Judge Poindexter and his friends, O. T. Plummer and W. K. Williamson, had all made an open, plain statement of the facts about this property, each in harmony with the other, the matter would have been of less concern to many people; but their own statements are so at variance that it looks like the Judge wanted the real facts withheld.

I want to say that from all the information I can gather I believe the Hon. Cone Johnson will have a nice plurality on July 23, 1910. It is a little gratifying that the Hon. Mr. Paddelford, who spoke at the Court House Thursday, agrees with Mr. Johnson that the recent decision of the Texas Higher Court held that statutory prohibition is constitutional.

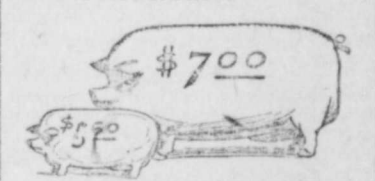

Texas Live Stock

Texas has more live stock than any other state in the union. We have 15,981,000 head of live stock, valued at \$212,857,000 by the Federal Government Agricultural Department on January 1st, 1909. We have four head of live stock per capita. We lead all other states in production of cattle and mules; Illinois and Iowa lead us in horses and we stand third in hogs. To increase the value of our live stock we must raise the grade, improve the market condition and increase the market price.



Texas has 1,312,000 head of horses valued at \$93,152,000. The average price of an Illinois horse is \$109 and the average price of a Texas horse is \$71 as shown in the cut below.



This difference in price is largely due to the grade of horses. By improving the grade we can add about \$40,000,000 to live stock values of the state. This is equal to \$10 per capita and would be net money to the farmer as it costs no more to raise a good horse than it does a poor one.

We have 3,304,000 head of hogs valued at \$5.00 per head while Illinois hogs are valued at \$7.00 per head as shown in the cut below.

We have 1,853,000 head of sheep valued at \$2.70 while the Illinois sheep are valued at \$4.80 per head. This difference is due to difference in grade and accessibility to the market. By raising the grade of the live stock of Texas to the Illinois standard we can increase values \$50,000,000 per annum, says the Texas Commercial Secretaries Association.

The spirit of progress that makes the farmers want better public highways, more factories, more railroads will stimulate them in improving the grade of live stock.

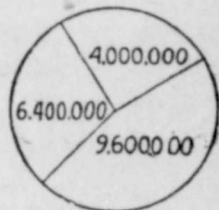

Cotton Production

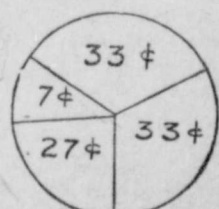
Production does not make a country influential in trade; in fact excessive production makes us helpless. The cotton factory will make us powerful in commerce, as cotton is used all over the world. The following illustration gives the cotton production of 1908.



World's Cotton Production.

Texas produces 4,000,000 bales of cotton annually; the United States except Texas produces 9,600,000 bales and the world except the United States 6,400,000. The United States produces 67 per cent of the cotton of the world but when we want to know what cotton is worth we wire England's factories for prices. If we doubled our production without home factories we would have even less to say about fixing prices of cotton; but, on the other hand, if we had 67 per cent of the cotton factories of the world, we could fix prices ourselves and take our rightful place as master of the world's commerce. English manufacturers located a thousand miles from the cotton field fix the prices. We have but one alternative; we must manufacture cotton and other staple articles in Texas or forever pay tribute to outside manufacturers, and governments, says the Texas Commercial Secretaries' Association.

When we buy cotton goods to the amount of one dollar, the farmer gets 27 cents, the transportation companies 7 cents, the English manufacturer 33 cents and the government 33 cents while with the factory in Texas the entire dollar would remain with us. The following illustration brings out the situation with clearness:



"Distribution of Cost."

The factory creates a large amount of wealth on a small area; rapidly circulates money and rapidly creates wealth. England can place all her cotton mills on a thousand acres of land and within that area will create more wealth and employ more labor than all the cotton fields of the South which approximate 35,000,000 acres. Out of every dollar received for the finished product the manufacturer must pay 50 cents for raw material; 25 cents for labor and the remainder for fuel, supplies, depreciation, use of capital etc.; the manufacturer must circulate wealth. The factory will take the raw material which the farm is months in producing, the forest years in maturing and the mines centuries in creating and within twelve hours double its value. The factory is a city builder and will build empires.
