The fleecy staple is coming in rapidly now. No one estimates the Brown county crop now at less than 20,000 bales. The cotton, seed and all, brings about \$60,00 a bale.

Sunday night while passing along by the Brownwood Drug company a horse, driven by a young man from the country by the name of Armstrong, took fright at an auto and jumped into a wagon that was passing at the same time, and the buggy was completely demolished.

Sunday morning at about 2 o'clock a fire alarm was sounded calling the department to the corner of the square and West Broadway where it was found that the Grinnan building, in which the Senate Cafe was located, was burning. The fire was quickly extinguished, but not until the fixtures and stock in the lower story were consumed.

The wholesale produce firm of C. H. Cox & Company, doing business in Brownwood for the last fifteen years, is closing its affairs, and on tomorrow will retire from business in Brownwood. The stock has been moved to Temple and the force has been turned loose.

Using a long and keen knife early Saturday night George Brown, a negro porter at the Gilliam-Sawyer barber shop, stabbed L. P. Baugh, Jr., and inflicted four ugly wounds, from which he confined to his room and suffering considerably. That Baugh is now alive is perhaps due to the fact that the negro broke his knife blade after inflicting the fourth wound and trusted to his legs to carry him to safety.—Bulletin.

Special Policeman T. H. Bennett, who was shot Saturday morning by a band of freight car robbers in East Dallas died Sunday morning.

On Friday of last week a heavy wind and hail storm in Brazos county near Bryan destroyed many bales of cotton just open, killed chickens and knocked great holes in the roofs of houses.

The grand jury at Chicago has indicted several of the big meat packers for maintaining a trust. Judge Landis requires that each of the indicted men make bond for \$10,000 and refuses to accept surety companies on the bonds.

Two automobiles valued at \$7,000 were destroyed by fire near West, Texas, last Saturday. One of the cars was disabled and was being towed by the one that turned over in making a short curve to cross a small bridge.

The 8-year-old son of Mr. Ballinger at Saratoga was killed by a vicious hog on last Friday. The hog gored him in the thigh and bit him in the fleshy part of the leg severing a large artery from which he died in a short time.

A lad at Enid, Okla., drew the spikes from a railroad track near that place and stated that he intended to warn the first train approaching and thereby secure a Carnegie medal for heroism. He was caught in the act and given a year in the reformatory at Guthrie.

In a duel at Rogers, between J. A. Lewis and Sam and Eugene Smith, brothers, Saturday afternoon, Lewis was killed the Smith boys badly wounded, C. C. Dean had his leg broken by a stray shot and a negress received several shots in her arm.

The Texas Commercial Secretaries Association recently sent inquiries to Commercial Clubs throughout the state asking for an estimate of money to be expended on the improvements on public highways during the year 1911, and the replies received indicate that there will be approximately \$20,000,000 of bonds issued for building and improving public highways during the coming year.

If it did not meet with their approval they had to do without a ride. Hence the proverbial expression. "Hobson's Choice" used to signify a choice without an alternative.—Strand Magazine,

## Rural Mail Service.

The establishment of rural free delivery routes is receiving the attention of the Texas Commercial Secretaries Association. Uncle Sam is doing a great service for the farmer in providing rural free delivery routes and every community that has 100 heads of families within a distance of 24 miles can secure a free rural delivery route, provided they have good roads. Uncle Sam does not build roads but he will deliver the mails free over them after they are built. The Association has gathered some interesting data from Texas Post Masters and from the Department at Washington concerning the Texas Postal Service and finds that Uncle Sam employs 7,884 people and has a payroll of over \$5,000,000 per annum in Texas.

There are forty postoffices in the state that have City Free Delivery Routes. There are 1850 Rural Free Delivery Routes reaching 250,000 homes and serving approximately a million people and it is this service the Secretaries are undertaking to rapidly extend throughout the state. We have 2,628 Post Offices in the state, The Federal Government owns 19 of these buildings and rent 2609 buildings for post office purposes. The gross postal receipts for the past fiscal year amount to \$5,064,919 40, No accurate figures are available on the expenditures but as the Government shows a total deficit of five million dollars in the operation of its postal department throughout the entire country, it is likely that we have received from the Government as much money as we have paid them. The Post Master at Dallas receives \$8,000 per year for his services, which is the highest salary paid a Post Master in Texas. There is only one post office in the United States that pays its post master more than Dallas office and that is New York City, which pays \$8,000 per annum.

The improvement of public highways now contemplated will make eligible five thousand miles of road for rural free delivery and the secretaries are expecting to follow the road graders with the free delivery cart.

The young couple came to Goldthwaite late in the afternoon and are comfortably domiciled here, where Mr. Moorland has charge of the Farmers Union warehouse.

Fire at Amarillo Sunday destroyed five cottages and an old Presbyterian church. The loss is estimated at \$25,000.

Old John Barleycorn continues to land his victims. One of the latest was a man near Miles who stopped in at a neighbor's house out of the rain, became engaged in a fight with his host and was shot and killed by the 11-year-old son of the man whom he had attacked. Plenty of such instances fill the papers constantly.

In the state election in Wisconsin, Frank P. Tucker, who was known to have been drowned while crossing a swollen stream recently, was nominated for attorney general. His death occurred after the time for placing names on the ballot for officers and the state committee will have to name a candidate.

Quite a rumpus was kicked up at Chicago the other day because ex-President Roosevelt demanded that Senator Lorimer, who is accused of bribing the members of the legislature in order to secure his election, be denied the privilege of a banquet else the ex-president would not attend. There are none to condemn the act of Mr. Roosevelt in demanding that public officials, and especially those of high station, purge themselves of even the appearance of wrong-doing.



**Fire.**

**Editor Eagle:**  
At the request of the Secretary of the Business Men's Club I am pleased to submit the following for the earnest consideration of the citizens of Goldthwaite.

We have reached a point in the affairs of the city where we must have some sort of Fire Protection. Speaking from an experience of years of active fire service, I offer the following suggestions. What we want is the greatest fire fighting efficiency at the minimum cost. How can we obtain it? There are a great many people who do not know that fire can be put out without water. Very few people know that fifty to ninety per cent of the fires throughout the country today are put out without water. As an illustration I will mention Dallas, Texas, for last 7 years, 60 per cent, San Antonio, 4 years, 60 per cent, Albany, New York, 3 years, 90 per cent, Minneapolis, Minn., 20 years, 65 per cent have been extinguished with chemical solution? A mixture of sulphuric acid, bicarbonate of soda and water, producing carbonic acid gas, will flow through a hose nozzle at a pressure of fifty to seventy five pounds per square inch. In action it instantly and effectually smothers out fire, a fifty gallon mixture having an extinguishing efficiency equal to six thousand pails of water. One charge or fifty gallons costs approximately two dollars. The fifty gallon size engines cost at the factory one hundred and eighty five dollars. With two of these engines, a ladder truck to cost approximately including ladders, two hundred dollars, a dozen fire axes, lanterns, etc. the whole equipment to cost approximately seven hundred dollars and a duly organized company of forty or fifty men, we would be in a position to save property from fire destruction and eventually lessen the present insurance rate very materially. The cost or up keep of such an equipment would be exceedingly small. This is a question everybody should be interested in. Let us all work together to the end that we may secure this greatly needed enterprise.
