NEIGHBORING NEWS.

Items Culled From the Leading Local Papers.

HAMILTON.

The Hamilton Public Schools opened last Monday with the largest attendance in the history of the institution.

Dr. W. W. Fowler was called last Sunday morning to Live Oak cemetery, south of town, to hold burial services at the grave of an infant of Mr. and Mrs. G. W. Landmon.

Col. G. R. Freeman has been lying very low for several weeks and is not expected to survive much longer. He is quite old and his strength has been gradually falling for several years.

Last Saturday a meeting of citizens was held to take a definite action in reference to the proposition submitted some time ago by L. E. Walker, of the Quanah, Seymour, Dublin and Rockport railroad, to locate the line and build it through our city. Mr. Walker had phoned Mr. Williams that it was necessary that some definite action be taken by the citizens of Hamilton at once, as the surveyors had completed the survey south as far as Dublin and the route must be located on toward Belton, the next point on the line. At the meeting it was decided that Hamilton accept the proposition, and on motion of John L. Spurlin a committee was appointed to go to work at once toward raising the amount necessary.—Herald.

BROWNWOOD.

The Brownwood public schools were opened today with all teachers present and an attendance of a few more than 1200.

The cotton receipts in Brownwood including shipments to compress amount to a little more than 8,000 bales to date. The press has turned out something over 5,000 pressed bales.

Some Persian Frauds.

Dr. M. C. Hutton, pastor of the Presbyterian church, this week furnished The Commercial a copy of the Christian Observer of September 7. The paper contains an article from the pen of Rev. I. M. Yonan, a native of Persia. Rev. Yonan says that while in the United States he found a number of Persia impostors raising money, alleging that it was for missionary purposes in that country. He stated that their credentials and seals were all frauds, and that these men are traveling in large numbers, securing from \$10 to \$50 per day, and not a cent of it goes to the mission cause. Rev. Yonan refers to them as "impostors and scoundrels." Recently a couple of these men were in Georgetown and declaring: "We missionary," they secured quite a large donation. The money they raise is kept by them and they return to New York, Philadelphia and other cities and live riotously until the money is gone. There are several hundred of them at work in the United States, and they are a part of the great swindlers who have quarters in New York. There are schools there for the purpose of teaching all kinds of beggars and cripples the best methods of fleecing the people. The article in the Observer deals with the effect, as Rev. Yonan knows that none of this money ever goes to the mission work in Persia.—Georgetown Commercial.

Evidences of Prosperity.

Among the many evidences of prosperity of Mills county people is the fact that individual deposits in the banks at Goldthwaite have increased fully \$100,000 during this month. This money mostly belongs to the farmers, which shows that they are in good financial condition and that the good prices of farm products has brought prosperity early. This, the Eagle believes, is a mighty fine showing, especially when it is considered that there are two other banks in the county and their deposits have very likely increased in proportion to those in the Goldthwaite banks.
