On account of the illness of Judge Meek there will be no fall term of the federal court at either Abilene or San Angelo.

Fire in a cotton warehouse at Navasota Monday night destroyed 450 bales of cotton, more than half of which was not insured.

Governor Campbell announces that he will return to Palestine at the close of his term of office and will again engage in the practice of law.

In a family row at Lake Charles, La., a few days ago Dr. Temple Smith was shot by his wife. He died Sunday from the effects of the wound.

William Ludwig Piutti of Berkeley, Cal., a musician of note and a composer of considerable distinction, died at Houston Monday, of tuberculosis.

As a tragic sequel to the death of Edmund Poillot, the French aviator, his fiancée who has been grieved beyond control went to his grave Sunday in Paris, and fired a bullet into her heart.

An Italian was perhaps fatally wounded and his 9-year-old daughter was killed in Dallas Monday night. It is supposed that a "black hand" plot was formed against the man and the parties detailed to kill him.

Mrs. Viola Arnold aged 34, was killed by a pistol wound through the heart Monday morning at Fort Worth. After the inquest, it was decided to have been a case of self-destruction, as she was kneeling beside a lounge with her head upon it and the pistol lay upon the floor beside her.

A former mail carrier in Chicago was arrested a few days ago charged with the theft of \$75,000 worth of notes from the mails. He acknowledged his guilt and implicated a negro lawyer, who had a part of the notes in his possession. The notes belong to a manufacturing company.

Stinginess is an affliction, and may become as repulsive as the sores of Lazarus. Economy is an admirable virtue, but there is a line, indefinite and elusive, between it and stinginess which is easily crossed, and which marks one of the boundaries between right and wrong. To be stingy is to be selfish, and to be selfish is to be unsuccessful, for no man who lives for himself alone lives life to the full.—Dallas News.

The Los Angeles, Cal., Times office was dynamited last Saturday morning and a score of the workers were killed and thousands of dollars worth of property destroyed. Soon after the explosion and fire an infernal machine was found at the residence of the chief stockholder in the Times, which showed that the anarchists intended to kill the man and his family as well as destroy the the property and kill the workers in the office. The Times has refused for several years to have its business conducted by the labor unions and the management believes that the responsibility for the terrible crime is at the door of these unions. Rewards of more than \$100,000 have been offered for the apprehension of the guilty parties.

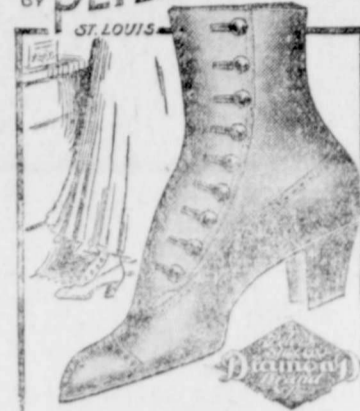

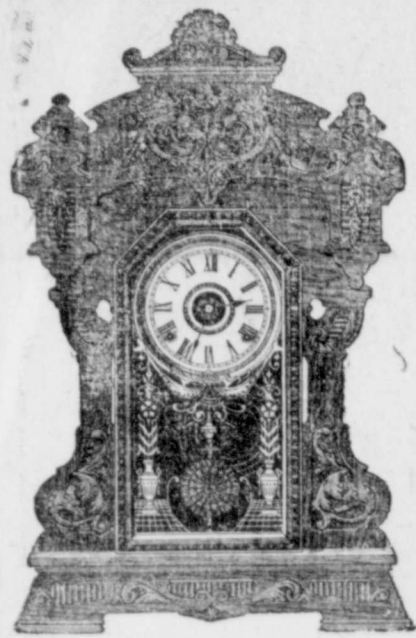

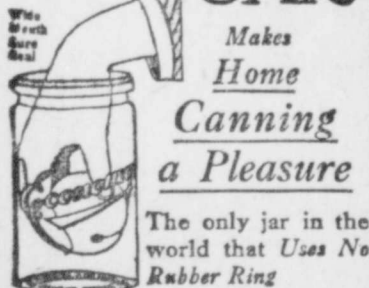
