Jurors Excused.

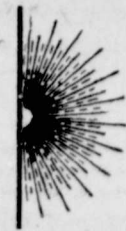

A child in Paterson, N. J., was rendered unconscious by inhaling the exhaust gas from a passing automobile.

An epidemic of "pink eye" at the Virginia military institute has necessitated the closing of the institution for sixty days.

Count Tolstoi of Russia, the reformer and author, is dead. His death was caused by exposure in endeavoring to hide himself from the world and spend his last days in solitude.

The federal troops at San Antonio have been placed at the disposal of Governor Campbell in enforcing the neutrality of this government in the Mexican revolution and the prevention of the mobilization of revolutionists along the border in Texas.

The United States authorities raided the office of Burr brothers in New York the first of the week and arrested the men in charge for using the mails to defraud. The firm claimed to be brokers and dealers in bonds and securities, and sold stocks and bonds of companies long since bankrupt or out of business. Other arrests in various parts of the country are to follow as a result of the dealings of the outfit.

The constitutional convention at Santa Fe, N. M., has completed its labors and adjourned. The report contains 20,000 words and 130 sections. It refused to prohibit the sale of liquor in that state, but left the way open for the legislature to deal with the liquor question. It provides for a railroad commission, and a stringent anti-pass section was adopted. It limits the tax rate to 12 mills the first year and 10 mills thereafter. Women are given the right to vote in school elections and are made eligible for school trustees and county superintendents of instruction. Separate schools for white people and Mexicans are prohibited, which shows where the greasers got in their work in the convention; and no distinction is made between the Mexicans and whites in the matter of elective franchise or jury duty. The judiciary of the state and all state officers are made elective.

Just how much of a revolution has been launched in Mexico can not be definitely known, because of the uncertainty regarding the truthfulness of the reports allowed to be sent out, but one thing is sure and that is "the old man of Mexico" has trouble on his hands and plenty of it, Gen. Reyes, who was sent to France on a military mission for the government last year, is believed to be in command of the revolutionists, and the plan appears to be to strike from every direction at the same time and keep the government forces and energies scattered. It has long been known that there was a spirit of unrest in Mexico, but the iron hand of President Diaz has fallen heavily upon all who have heretofore opposed the government. To judge from the reports sent out during the last few days, the opposition must have a thorough organization, and while the result is very likely to be disastrous to the revolutionists, there is sure to be much bloodshed before the end comes.

From Rev. Wilsford.

Seminole, Texas, Nov. 13.

Dear Old Eagle:

I take this means of letting my friends and brethren know of my whereabouts. I recently moved to this place from Cisco, Texas, having accepted the care of the church at this place. We have a nice little town and an enterprising people. This is a new place, only four years old, but it has grown very rapidly. It is the county seat of Gaines county. It is bounded on the west by New Mexico. It is a very fine county, and I dare to predict it a coming farming country. We have almost any kind of land here but the heavy black land. The larger portion of it is sandy, underlined with clay. It has proved to be a fine corn country. In some parts of the county they have raised fairly good corn considering the long drought, but we are very short on feed at the best. We are 40 miles from the nearest railroad, and until recently the nearest was 75 miles. We are hoping to get a road some time in the near future. Everything is very high here, especially to a fellow who has been where he could get it without going broke on the transfer. Freight is 70 cents a hundred; sack of chops cost \$2.75; bran \$2.65 a hundred; flour \$2.25 a sack, \$4.50 a hundred; bacon 20 cents a pound. So you see at present things look a little scary, but we are fixing to overcome this disadvantage, as merchants will put on teams of their own, as they claim they can freight stuff for 40 cents a hundred. We have a very energetic flock to serve and we are hoping and praying for a happy and successful year's work. I have already fallen in love with them and my work is such as every true minister should covet—to sacrifice for our Lord in this country is to lay a foundation upon which the coming west will be won to the Lord. I earnestly ask the prayers of all who pray, that you remember us in our work here. With best wishes to you, one and all, I remain,

The fewest number of us are really what we think we are, and should the light be turned on so as to give us a sudden revelation of ourselves, the real littleness of the picture would be a disappointment. Some men are on high horses with spurs and whips, riding for something big in life, yet never finding it, for their conception of the little things fails to show to them anything of real value, and they rush madly on, chasing something beyond their grasp. Some men won't try to do some of the little things in church matters, because they have conceived the idea that they are qualified for larger fields of usefulness.

The same in all the walks of life; hence, the road is paved with useless, self-conceited beings who thought too little of the little things that came their way. I had rather be a good worker in a little way than to be a failure on a large scale. The man on the mountain slopes in the gold fields of California, who noticed the little streams and veins, found a richer mine than the one who passed these by. When the Master said "Inasmuch as ye did it unto one of the least of these, ye did it unto me," perhaps some fellow was waiting, expecting Him to say "Your silver, gold and reputation for charity have won you much"; but alas! it was the little things He commended instead. A kind word from the heart, spoken or written, has often done more to cheer some despondent, troubled heart than gold or silver could ever have done.

Let us not despise the day of small things; the reward is to the faithful and not to those who would soar above their fellows. The boy who found the broken rail on the railroad track and stood for hours with his little lantern to warn the oncoming train of its danger, did more than the wealthiest man of the age could have done with his millions had the train gone down. The little girl who stood beside the aged dying woman and with a fan kept away the flies and cooled the fevered brow while the worn and tired body slept, did more than the man of wealth who furnished the casket to bury the poor lifeless body in after death had done its work. The widow who in love for her Master cast in her mites—all she had—did more than all the rich, who of their abundance cast in much. A penny given in humbleness and love goes further than the dollar tossed in for show or for the praise of man. Let us not worry because we can't do large things like others, but be content to do the little things which we are assured will grow and become great when we hear from them at the roll call in eternity, A LITTLE ONE.
