Good Roads.

The Texas Commercial Secretaries are enthusiastic on the subject of good roads, and surely no more important subject could attract the attention of the great organization. The following paragraphs have been sent out to the press by the association:

A chain is no stronger than its weakest link, and a mud hole or a hill between a farm and town reduces the carrying capacity of the wagon to the level of the bog or grade. Build roads and haul fewer loads and better loads.

The improvement of public highways add three times their cost to adjoining property, and every argument that applies to the improvement of private property applies with multiplied force to the improvement of public property, and especially to public highways, as everyone must use the roads. Build roads and increase the value of your property.

The ravages of the boll weevil in Texas are estimated at millions of dollars annually, but the mud hole has been a more costly foe to the producer than the boll weevil. The federal government has spent millions of dollars in trying to find a way of eradicating the boll weevil, but we do not have to spend money to learn how to eradicate bad roads—build good ones. The boll weevil in destroying cotton decreases production and consequently increases the price of the remaining products, but bad roads levy their deadly toll against the producer and destroy the value of the remaining roads. Bad roads are the worst pest the farmer has to contend with and they are the easiest to get rid of.

Farming conditions have undergone a radical change for the better during the past few years in Texas, and the improved methods of agriculture, better conditions of public highways, and the increased prices which the products of the farm are bringing have all served to make the farmer monarch of all he surveys. From his own private throne he is in position to dictate to all other classes and conditions for it is to him we must look for the food we eat and the clothes we wear. All hail to the Texas farmer.

A Temple poultry dealer this week contracted with a New York firm to ship them \$50,000 worth of turkeys for Christmas.

The cases of peonage in Alabama were affirmed by the United States supreme court this week. The convicted parties are men of prominence and under the judgment of the court they must serve terms in prison.

In Brockton, N. Y., Sunday night an explosion of gas in a cellar destroyed a piano on which two young women were playing a duet, but the players were not hurt, while two young men who were listening to the music were thrown into the street by the force of the explosion.

The revolution in Mexico appears to be on the wane. There have been a few battles of minor importance between the rebels and the government troops, but the troops have been victorious every time. The report that 500 revolutionists were put to death by order of the government is denied by officials.

Governor-elect Colquitt has a good deal of work and responsibility in making the appointments necessary for his administration. He has announced a few of his selections but the most of them are yet to be made. For 35 positions at his disposal there are 1200 applicants who are supported by 35,000 letters and petitions; besides there are 500 applicants for just any place the governor can give them.

It appears to be the universal opinion among the newspapers of the state that the "tin soldier" who was convicted in Dallas for bayoneting a citizen to death was given his just deserts and that the verdict should be allowed to stand. The action of the volunteer militiamen in defending the soldier has not added to the popularity of the organization.

There is great rivalry between San Francisco and New Orleans for government recognition and support for a Panama canal expedition to be held about the time of the completion of the big ditch. Both cities will have delegations before congress and every influence is being brought to bear that will help either place. New Orleans, it seems to the Eagle, is the logical point for the expedition, and undoubtedly that city will be given the support of Southern people, or most of a.

Means Business.

A dispatch from Washington says; "Newspapers from over the entire county have been recently given to understand that Uncle Sam's postoffice department meant business about two years ago when it said that all mail subscriptions in the future must not be allowed to be more than one year in arrears. Newspapers are now being called on by postal officials for a sworn list of their subscribers, indicating how many are in arrears for three months.

The department is headed south and is as rapidly as possible covering the whole nation.
