SAN SABA

A deal was closed the first of the week by which O. Inabnit sold his drug business to E. A. Murray.

Rita Roberts sold 60 head of yearling steers to Frank Bull of Mills county last week.

J. W. Hurst and Miss Sallie Maxwell were married last Friday at noon at the home of U. T. Chamberlain.

Charlie Carroll and Miss Willie Clark, accompanied by a number of friends, drove to town Saturday night and were married at Judge Hartley's office at the court house.

G. W. King died at the home of his son, Charlie King, near Locker on Thursday morning. Wednesday morning he suffered a stroke of paralysis and it was evident that the end was near.

At a meeting of the stewards of the Methodist church last Wednesday evening the pastor's salary was raised from one thousand dollars to twelve hundred. This makes this church, with the exception of Lampasas which pays an equal amount, the best salaried church in the Llano district. The above is evidence of the wide awake, progressive men constituting the official board of the church, as this increase of salary was without the asking on the part of the pastor. The short session of the sixty-first congress convened Monday at noon.

The newly elected sheriff of Dallas has commenced a fight on the Sunday theatres in that city.

Governor-elect Colquitt acted wisely and well when he appointed Col. Henry Hutchins of Austin adjutant general.

The American good roads congress has been in session in Indianapolis this week. Nearly every state in the Union was represented in the conference.

Mrs. Eddy, head of the Christian Science organization, died in Boston Saturday night after a short illness with pneumonia. Her estate is estimated to be worth a million dollars.

A hardware store in Corpus Christi was burglarized Saturday night and \$500 worth of automatic pistols were taken. The fact that no other goods were stolen leads to the theory that sympathizers with the Mexican revolution are guilty of the robbery.

It is said that Mrs. Hettie Green, reputed to be the wealthiest woman in the world, will come to Texas after the holidays and spend some time investigating the proposition to extend the Texas Midland railroad, owned by her son, E. H. R. Green, from Dallas to the Gulf.

The commercial secretaries association says: In no country are the processes of nature so easily interpreted and the hidden veins of new and bountiful industries so easily tapped as in Texas, and the man with money to invest will make no mistake by coming to the Lone Star state.

Among the appointments made by Governor-elect Colquitt there was none that gave more satisfaction to the newspaper workers than that of Editor S. J. Thomas of the Comanche Chief, who is to be superintendent of the deaf and dumb asylum. Mr. Thomas is a man of fine ability and is held in high esteem by the members of the fraternity.

Prosperity follows good roads as commerce follows the flag, and no community has advanced far in civilization that has not improved its public highways. The condition of the public roads and the commodities handled usually gauge the progress and development of communities. Get in line and build good roads, says the Texas commercial secretaries association.

A young fellow in Houston last Friday night becoming enraged on account of having been jilted by a young lady, forced his way into her home and entering her room attacked her with a razor. She jumped from the window to the ground, a distance of twenty feet, when he ran down the stairs and cut her throat, breaking his razor. He then attempted to suicide by cutting his own throat. They were both carried to the hospital and will likely recover. He will be dumb, however, as he cut his vocal cords in such a manner as to destroy them forever.

President's Message.

President Taft submitted his message to Congress Tuesday and the following synopsis of it is taken from the Houston Post:

He declares it is time to stop legislating with reference to regulating corporations and to witness the effect of a vigorous execution of the laws already on the statute books.

He recommends strongly some form of ship subsidy to increase American shipping, especially to South America.

The tariff commission is not ready to submit a report on any of the schedules of the Payne law, and Mr. Taft says he will not recommend any tariff legislation until the new congress convenes in 1911.

He urges that the tariff board be made permanent and that all future revisions be made schedule by schedule. He vigorously opposes another general revision.

Recommendation for anti-injunction and federal incorporation laws are renewed.

It is proposed that second class mail rates shall be readjusted so as to charge magazines a much higher rate on their advertising sections.

Strong representations are made for the establishment of a new banking and currency system.

Two new battleships and several auxiliary vessels are urged for the navy.

The president recommends that coal, phosphate and oil lands and water power sites be disposed of in the future by leasing.

Estimates for government expenditures during the next fiscal year have been out to \$620,494,013.12, which is \$52,964,887.35 less than the actual appropriation or the current year. The estimated receipts for the next fiscal year are \$680,000,000.

The president urges the extension of the civil service principle to all classes of postmasters and to the diplomatic and consular corps and the acquisition by the government of residences and offices for the diplomatic officers.

Regarding the Panama canal, the president says: "Progress of the work is most satisfactory. It will be completed well within the time set, January, 1915, and within the estimated cost of \$375,000,000. The slides in Cuba cut off offer no great reason for delay."

Failure to fortify the canal would leave the United States powerless to enforce the universal and equal use of the waterway against a desperate and irresponsible enemy, and would defeat the object of the canal in increasing the military effectiveness of the American navy. An appropriation of \$19,000,000 is recommended for this purpose.

Regarding the courts the president declares the crying need of the United States is cheapening the cost of litigation by simplifying judicial procedure and expediting final judgment. The supreme court should be relieved from unnecessary appeals. The salaries of Federal judges should be increased.

Postal saving banks will be established in a number of cities January 1. A parcels post on rural delivery routes is recommended.

The president recommends that congress give some fitting recognition of the polar discoveries of Commander Robert E. Peary.

The stupendous value of the agricultural products, amounting to \$8,926,000,000 this year, indicates a good prospect for business throughout the country. The present census promises to be the best ever taken, but it is not perfect. The census takers are to be vigorously prosecuted.

ART WORK STAYS IN ROME.

"The Girl of Anzio," a superb statue, supposed to be the work of Lysippus or Praxiteles, has been brought to Rome and placed temporarily in the "Terme" museum. A great storm in 1878 washed it out of the ruins of Nero's palace at Anzio, on property belonging to Prince Aldobrandini. An American collector looked it over and offered more than \$100,000. The agreement for the purchase of the statue was sealed and signed when Sig. Bistolfi, a sculptor himself and inspector of works of art in Italy, vetoed the sale. This was three or four years ago. Since then haggling has been going on. The Italian government offered \$50,000. The Aldobrandinis demanded more. Recently the government offered \$80,000 and that sum was accepted.

NEW BRITISH NAVAL MONSTER

The Neptune the Largest of Modern Vessels of Dreadnought Type of Construction.

The Neptune is the eighth British Dreadnought battleship built for the admiralty. She is 530 feet long, 84 feet beam, with displacement of 20,250 tons (a thousand tons heavier and 30 feet longer than the St. Vincent, the battleship of the same type launched from the same slip about a year ago). Her engines, which are to be on the turbine principle, will be of 25,000 indicated horsepower, which will give a speed of 26 knots. The Neptune is to be armed with ten 12-inch guns, like the previous Dreadnoughts, but they will be differently disposed. The fore barrette will be in the same position on the forecastle, but the side barrettes will be on an echelon, one being a little more forward than that on the other side, while the superstructure will be so constructed as to enable guns to fire on either side. The broadside fire will therefore be ten guns to the Dreadnought's eight. The other two barrettes will be on the center line astern, but one will be on a higher level than the other so as to enable its guns to fire over the other; four seven-inch guns are to be placed in the superstructure as the anti-torpedo armament. The armor protection will be similar to that of previous ships of the class, and so will all the internal arrangements, and the new ship will also have four propellers and twin rudders.

AN ORDINANCE of the City of Goldthwaite, amending Section 1, Chapter 34, of the Ordinances of the said City of Goldthwaite:

Be it ordained by the City Council of the City of Goldthwaite; That Section 1 of Chapter 34 of the Ordinances of the City of Goldthwaite be and the same is hereby amended so as hereafter to read as follows, to-wit:

SECTION 1. Be it ordained by the City Council of the City of Goldthwaite; That there is hereby provided for a volunteer fire company for the City of Goldthwaite; which said company shall be composed of able-bodied men between the ages of 18 and 50 years; and shall be composed of as many members as the City Council may from time to time allow, not to exceed 30, unless by ordinance otherwise provided.
