As to the great amount of the cost in interest and taxation it seems that the most the writers on the cost have no considered the value of the roads for use in saving the wear and tear of our vehicles, etc. It costs me \$10, or more, to clear one acre of land, but the land is of no use to me without taking the brush off; when I get it in good condition I get \$3 per acre yearly. So in three and one-third years I have my money back, and may be in one year. It takes money and labor to get good roads. You are bound to spend money on them to get labor. The people are opposed to working the roads under our present road laws, for they are unjust. I am willing to be taxed to get good roads and think it will be money well spent.

Bulla, superintendent of Wesley Adult Bible classes, and Rev. E. H. Rawlings, missionary secretary, will be the out of state speakers on the program, and leading Texas workers will be prominent in the discussions.
Much of the time of the conference will be Round Table work and the plain, practical every day problems that confront the workers will be openly and freely discussed by all.
A list of rooms and prices will be furnished and every visitor will, upon arrival, go at once to the First Methodist church, where this information will be given. BUSINESS COLLEGE ASSURED.

It Will Begin Next Wednesday Morning—Teachers Have Arrived.

The Draughon's Business College has been secured for Goldthwaite, which is another of the good results from the Commercial club. Mr. Pentz, who is here organizing the school, authorizes the Eagle to state that it will open next Wednesday morning sure. Twenty-five pupils had been enrolled up to the time the Eagle was put to press and it is confidently believed the full list of thirty will be secured by tonight. When that number has been enrolled the special rate will be withdrawn and, therefore, those who expect to enter will have to hurry to get in at that reduced rate. Mr. C. A. Kenny of Nashville, Tenn., who has had charge of one of the Draughon colleges at Tullahoma, Tenn., and Mr. H. I. Evans of Bartlesville, Okla., who has been teaching in Foster's business college, have arrived to take positions in the Goldthwaite college and everything is in readiness for the opening.

Bond Issue Defeated.

In the road bond issue election in precinct No. 1 at Comanche last Saturday the proposition failed to secure the necessary two-thirds majority and was, therefore, defeated. The total figures are, for the bond issue 758; against the issue 430. In the city of Comanche the vote stood: For the bonds 580; against the bonds 195.

Notice of Election.

State of Texas—County of Mills
On this the 24th day of March, 1911, this court being in special session, came on to be considered the petition of J. C. Street and 263 other persons, praying that bonds be issued by said Commissioners Precinct No. 1 (same being Road District No. 1) of Mills county, Texas, in the sum of fifty thousand dollars, bearing five per centum per annum rate of interest, maturing forty years from date hereof, for the purpose of constructing, maintaining and operating macadamized, graveled or paved roads and turnpikes, or in aid thereof; and it appearing to the court that said petition is signed by more than fifty of the resident property tax paying voters of said precinct No. one (same constituting road district No. one) of Mills county, Texas, and that the amount of bonds to be issued will not exceed one-fourth of the assessed valuation of the real property of such precinct No. one (same constituting road district No. one) of Mills county, Texas.

It is, therefore, considered and ordered by the court that an election be held in said precinct No. one (same constituting road district No. one) of Mills county, Texas, on the 25th day of April, 1911, which is not less than thirty days from the date of this order, to determine whether or not the bonds of said precinct No. one (same constituting road district No. one) of Mills county, Texas, shall be issued in the amount of fifty thousand dollars, bearing five per centum per annum rate of interest and maturing forty years from the date hereof; and whether or not a tax shall be levied upon the property of said precinct No. one (same constituting road district No. one) of Mills county, Texas, subject to taxation for the purpose of paying the interest on said bonds, and to provide a sinking fund for the redemption thereof at maturity.

Notice of said election shall be given by publication in a newspaper published in said county for four consecutive weeks before the date of said election, and in addition thereto there shall be posted notices of such election at three public places in the county, one of which shall be at the court house door, for three weeks prior to said election.

Said election shall be held at Goldthwaite, Nabors Creek and Antelope Gap, in said Mills county, Texas, and the following named persons are hereby appointed as managers of said election: B. F. Geesin, manager for Goldthwaite voting precinct; K. O. Johnson, manager for Nabors Creek voting precinct, and J. W. Morgan, manager for Antelope Gap voting precinct.

Said election shall be held under the provisions of the Road Improvement District Act passed at the first called session of the Thirty-first Legislature, and only qualified voters who are property tax payers of said precinct No. one (same constituting road district No. one) of Mills county, Texas, shall be allowed to vote, and all voters desiring to support the proposition to issue bonds, shall have written or printed on their ballots the words, "For the issuance of the bonds and levying of the tax in payment thereof," and those opposed shall have written or printed on their ballots the words, "Against the issuance of bonds and the levying of the tax in payment thereof."

The manner of holding said election shall be governed by the laws of the state governing general elections.

A copy of this order signed by the county judge of said county, shall serve as proper notice of said election, and the county judge is directed to cause said notice to be published in a newspaper published in said precinct No. one (same constituting road district No. one) of Mills county, Texas, for four consecutive weeks next proceeding said election, and cause to be posted a notice thereof at three public places in the said precinct No. one (same constituting road district No. one) of Mills county, Texas, one of which shall be at the court house door, for three weeks prior to said election. Commercial Club.

The Goldthwaite Commercial club held its regular weekly meeting Monday night.

The street sprinkling committee, composed of L. E. Miller, J. H. Burnett and T. F. Toland, was instructed to raise money by subscription of business men to buy a car of oil for street sprinkling. It is understood that a car of oil will cost about \$275 and will be sufficient to keep down the dust on the public square and the principal business streets for the entire summer. While no pledge was made, it was intimated that the city council would pay for applying the oil if the business men would buy it. The oil sprinkling is said to be very satisfactory in cities where it has been tried.

A committee composed of E. M. Boon, L. E. Miller and B. F. Geeslin was appointed to prepare a new constitution and set of by-laws for the club, the constitution and by-laws of the club having been misplaced.

A committee composed of P. D. Yarborough, Proc McCulloch and Prof. Goodman was appointed to ascertain the cost of a system of water works for the business part of town.

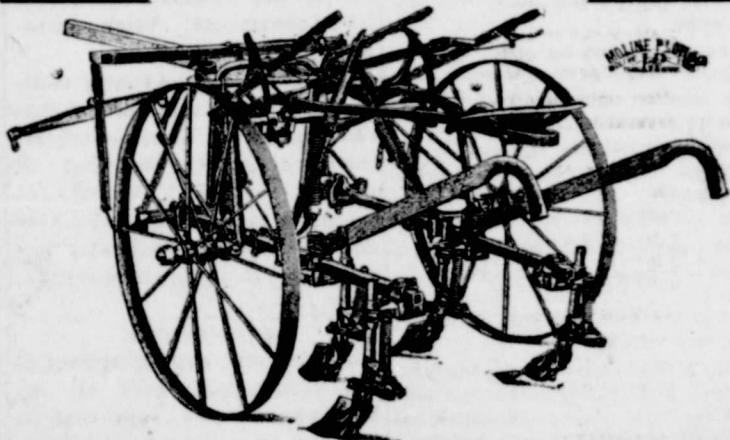

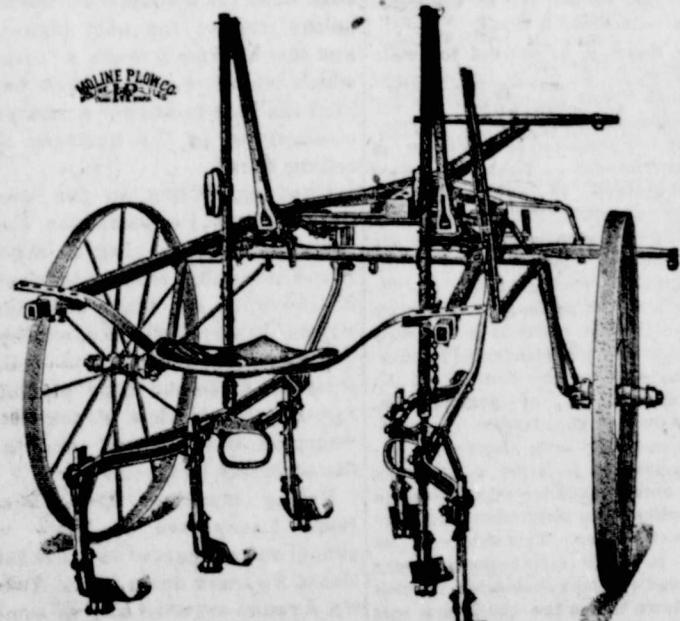

The council decided to hereafter use the office of J. C. Darroch, up stairs in the Clements building, for holding regular meetings.

The finance committee reported having examined the books of the secretary and treasurer and finding them balanced and in proper condition. The balance in the treasury on April 1 was \$925.32; of which amount \$158.82 belonged to the street fund and \$766.47 to the general fund.

In San Antonio the novelty of a Chinamoo as a juror is being experienced.

A report made to the mayor of Chicago says the coal smoke in that city costs the citizens \$17,000,000 in extra laundry bills and other cleaning and scouring of clothes and buildings.

The new law requiring physicians to report vital statistics to the county clerk has already become effective and the physicians who fail to make such reports are subject to fines from \$10 to \$1,000.

Dr. S. A. Kaapp, one of the best known authorities on agriculture, died at his home in Washington, D. C., Saturday. He was especially well known for his efforts toward extermination of the boll weevil and his advocacy of diversification of farming in the southern states.

President Diaz of Mexico, in his message to the federal congress, advocated many reforms demanded by the insurgents, but he has so far failed and refused to resign, which is one of the conditions upon which the insurgents agree to peace negotiations. Indications point to forced retirement for the aged monarch or president.

The state wide prohibition campaign is beginning to warm up and speakers are getting their voices in tune for spell-binding. Very little will be accomplished by this "hot air" or oratory, for men who have attained the age necessary to become voters are already well fixed in their ideas on the prohibition subject and but few will be changed on either side of the question. The main advantage to be derived from spell-binding is to induce men to go to the polls and vote.

If it were possible to go back and retrace the route we traveled from childhood to mature age, how many would consent to take the trouble? Not many. Certainly no sensible one. We all love life and value the privilege of living, but we don't want to rejourney the old journey. Not that it was a dull or stale or unprofitable trip; not that it was a hardship, but because it isn't worth while. There isn't enough to it. When we reach the great divide and look toward the sunrise and the sunset regions, we may not wish to hurry westward, but no more do we yearn to go east again. —Dallas News.

Mental bad habits are as bad or worse than physical bad habits. The latter kill the body and the former kill the soul. The morose man, the grim, glum, gloomy individual who has no love for other men, no patience with his family and no pleasure in the society of his fellows, is a temperamental cripple. He is wounded in the head. To have healthy brains is much easier than to have a healthy body. Merely to think sweet thoughts habitually will illumine the sourest face and make a man with a paintbrush beard good-looking. To think happiness is to be happy; to nurture misery in the mind is to be miserable. Nine-tenths of every man's capital is above his collar. —Dallas News.

Boosts for Texas.

Park building is as necessary to the growth and development of a city as any other commercial or industrial enterprise.

The educational facilities of the state are rapidly increasing, and new schools and colleges are being added to all sections of the state.

Texas is one of the world's greatest centers for the production of oil and natural gas, and oil is being shipped to all parts of the world from the Texas fields.

The McKinney Commercial Club has recently had fifteen large trash cans made for use throughout that city, and have placed them on the leading streets, for the purpose of encouraging the residents in keeping the city clean.

A recent press dispatch from Beaumont announces that East Texas has discovered that her cut over pine lands are adapted to celery raising and that the new industry bids fair to soon take on commercial proportions.

Although Texas leads all other states in the Union in railroad mileage, there are still large areas of the state without railroad facilities, and to give the state a railroad service equal to that of Illinois, would require four times the present mileage.

During the season of 1910 Laredo shipped approximately 2,000 cars of onions, according to the Laredo Board of Trade, while the shipments during the coming season are expected to reach at least 2,500 cars.

Scarcely a day passes that the newspapers of the state do not record some important discovery in agriculture. Texas is truly a great agricultural state and we have scarcely formed a working acquaintance with the soil.

In many counties of the state the good roads movement is attracting attention and improved public highways will be the result. The old system of keeping up the public roads by the work of those subject to road duty is being abandoned and the more progressive methods are resulting in better roads.

The farmers of the Farmersville community held a convention last week at that place to discuss improved farming methods and to urge the conduct of their operations upon a strictly business basis. Assistant Agriculturist B. Youngblood of the National Department of Agriculture addressed the convention and promised the co-operation of his department with the farmers in any movement looking to the agricultural advancement of the state.

The Texas farmer has learned well the lessons of diversification. Our corn crop is making rapid gains on King Cotton; we are raising our own wheat, oats and hay, and our vegetables supply the northern and eastern market. We are not only diversifying our products, but we are feeding it on the farm, fattening our stock and using it in raising another crop. The March Federal Crop Reporter shows 61,435,000 bushels of corn in the granaries of the Texas farmer on March 1, which is 34 per cent of the total output; we have 4,865,000 bushels of our oats on hand, which is 20 per cent of the total output and we have 2,629,000 bushels of wheat, which is 14 per cent of the total yield. Our supply of cereals is sufficient to carry us through until the next crop, which adds to the independence of the Texas farmer. The proper disposition of a crop is as important as raising it and the above figures show that the Texas farmer is a close student of practical farming and is financially able to manage his affairs. —Commercial Secretary.

It is, therefore, considered and ordered by the court that an election be held in said precinct No. one (same constituting road district No. one) of Mills county, Texas, on the 25th day of April, 1911, which is not less than thirty days from the date of this order, to determine whether or not the bonds of said precinct No. one (same constituting road district No. one) of Mills county, Texas, shall be issued in the amount of fifty thousand dollars, bearing five per centum per annum rate of interest and maturing forty years from the date thereof; and whether or not a tax shall be levied upon the property of said precinct No. one (same constituting road district No. one) of Mills county, Texas, subject to taxation for the purpose of paying the interest on said bonds, and to provide a sinking fund for the redemption thereof at maturity.

Notice of said election shall be given by publication in a newspaper published in said county for four successive weeks before the date of said election, and in addition thereto there shall be posted notices of such election at three public places in the county, one of which shall be at the court house door, for three weeks prior to said election.

Said election shall be held at Goldthwaite, Nabors Creek and Antelope Gap, in said Mills county, Texas, and the following named persons are hereby appointed as managers of said election: B. F. Geeslin, manager for Goldthwaite voting precinct; K. C. Johnson, manager for Nabors Creek voting precinct, and J. W. Morgan, manager for Antelope Gap voting precinct.

Said election shall be held under the provisions of the Road Improvement District Act passed at the first called session of the Thirty-first Legislature, and only qualified voters who are property tax payers of said precinct No. one (same constituting road district No. one) of Mills county, Texas, shall be allowed to vote, and all voters desiring to support the proposition to issue bonds, shall have written or printed on their ballots the words, "For the issuance of the bonds and levying of the tax in payment thereof," and those opposed shall have written or printed on their ballots the words, "Against the issuance of bonds and the levying of the tax in payment thereof."

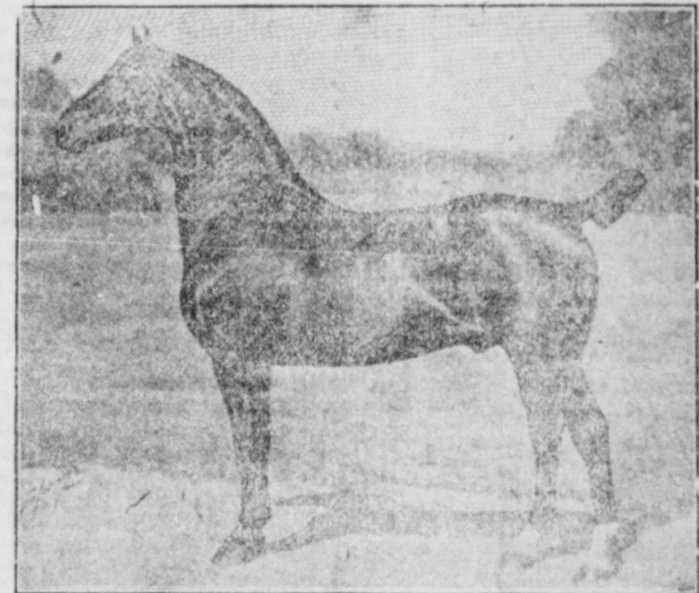
The manner of holding said election shall be governed by the laws of the state governing general elections.

The factory, the railroad, the mine and the canal have not a single fiber of idleness in their construction, and inactivity inflicts upon them self-destruction. The land owner may let his farm lie idle and it will increase in fertility and value, but the manufacturer must run his factory as fast as the wheels will turn or his property decays and declines in value.

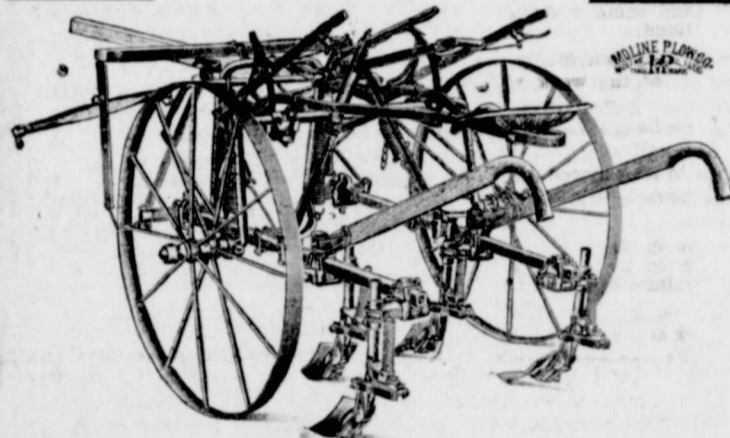


Industrial Activity.

What we have said of the factory is also true of all lines of constructive industry. The irrigating canal builds farms, the factory makes cities, and transportation facilities build both farms and cities, and any sort of property that has inherent characteristics of generosity and activity should be encouraged. Improved public highways constitute a most convincing invitation to industry, as the farm, the factory, the railroad, the mine and all the people are vitally interested in public highways, says the Texas Commercial Secretaries' Association.

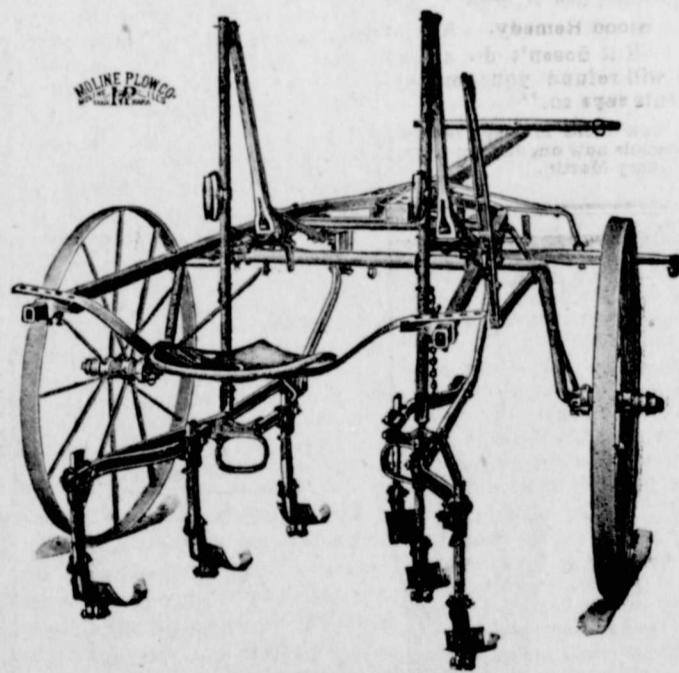

Some of the business men of Temple have organized a company to build another interurban line from Temple to Belton.

The West Texas ginners association is to hold its second annual meeting in Brownwood on April 6 and 7. The ginners of this county have been extended a special invitation to attend the meeting.

The breaking of an axle on an engine pulling a passenger train on the Atlantic Coast line caused a disastrous wreck near Tifton, Ga., last Saturday morning. The train fell into the river and eight people were killed and a large number injured.

Americans who volunteer in the insurrection in Mexico should be as brave when they are captured by the federal soldiers as they profess when they enter the insurgent ranks, but in many cases they plead "innocence" and appeal to this government to have them released.

In a fire in a New York building Saturday night 141 persons perished. Most of them were girls at work in a shirt waist factory. The inadequate fire escapes were undoubtedly responsible for the disaster and the authorities promise prosecution for those who are responsible for this criminal negligence.

The headquarters of both sides of the state wide prohibition contest have been kind enough to keep the Eagle well supplied with literature regarding their plans and purposes and the suggestion is frequently made that the matter be given publication for the information of the public, but there is "nothing doing" unless such requests are accompanied by the necessary amount to pay for the publications. We are not in this business for our health alone and if the "other fellow" wants to tell his views let him pay the price—that is the way the editor of this paper has to do when he has his opinions put in type.

The internal trouble in Mexico continues to give concern to the world and the indications point conclusively to the final victory of the revolutionists. Whether or not such a termination will be advantageous to the republic remains to be seen. While General Diaz undoubtedly has ruled the country with the hand of a despot, it is by no means certain that a successor from among the revolutionists would be able to govern the people of that nation at all, and the overthrow of the Diaz government might mean endless wars and turmoil for that country. Mexico is rich in resources but they are undeveloped and there is no hope that much advancement will be made as long as General Diaz has control of affairs, for he is not alive to the progress of the age. The resignation of his cabinet, which was the first victory for the reformers for which the insurgents contend, may be followed by other developments that will result in the cessation of hostilities, but it is doubtful if the revolutionists will be satisfied with a short of the removal of Diaz from the presidency.

Boasts for Texas.

From the beginning the farmer has been the biggest man in history, not excepting the man on the throne and the man behind spear and gun, and it is a hopeful sign that this fact is now recognized by the best thinkers in the world.

Farming is becoming a science in Texas. It is being conducted on a business basis for the purpose of making money, not purely for scratching from the soil a bare existence. As a result the percentage of agricultural failures are becoming less and the proportion of success is taking rank with other lines of industry.

Another industry has been added to Texas' list of accomplishments in the Sugarland Pulp mills in Brazoria County, which opened up a plant in that section last week for the purpose of manufacturing wrapping paper out of sugar cane stalks.

A rich bed of asphalt has been discovered near the mouth of the Rio Grande River in Southwest Texas, and there is every reason to believe that vast beds of this valuable paving material exist in large quantities in that section of the state. Most of the asphalt used for paving in Texas is imported from Colorado and other states, the expert geologists have declared the Texas material equal in every particular to that of Colorado. Nature has given us large deposits of the best of road material and we will need it all in building 150,000 miles of permanent highways.

The Federal Bureau of Statistics has announced its report on the average wages paid farm hands in the various states. The average price paid farm laborers is \$18 per month with board and \$24.50 per month without board. This shows an increase of \$5 per month during the past ten years and indicates that the farm laborer is getting a share of the increased price of farm products.

The cry of "Back to the Soil" has not been in vain. Its echo reverberates against sky scrapers; it startles the banker, the merchant, the clerk and the laborer; it is permeating the very core of our municipal life, inviting the buffeted and careworn to the bosom of nature. Rural possibilities have awakened in our citizenship new hope and inspiration and the farm is taking back some of its very best, and that too, after they have been finished in business experience.

The United States Department of Agriculture estimates that 2,000 pounds of butter, which is worth \$500, takes less than fifty cents worth of plant feed from the ground, and that the industry in which the Southern farmer can engage. The opportunities for dairying in Texas are almost unlimited, and with the excellent ranges and plenty of domestic grasses there is no reason why the Texas dairyman should not prosper, without being subject to the proverbial charge of "watering his stock."

About 700,000 acres of oats were harvested in Texas during 1910, the yield varying from twenty to seventy-five bushels per acre and the total amounting to about 24,325,000 bushels. More attention than ever is being paid to the oats crop by Texas farmers, and Texas ranks with the best oat producing states in the Union.

The clay products of Texas are attracting attention of Northern and Eastern manufacturers and it is known that Texas clay makes the finest of chinaware and that crude material from a number of points in Texas give as satisfactory results as the best of the East.—Commercial Secor

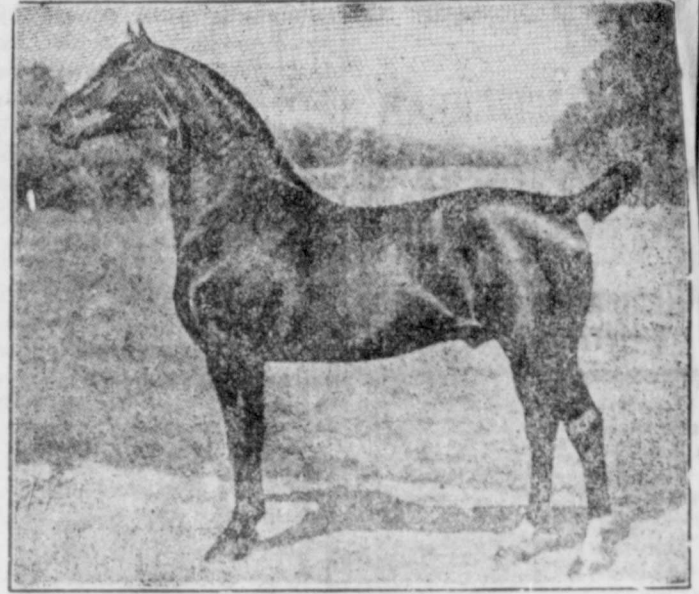
