### Court House Plans.

The members of the commissioners court, together with Sheriff Priddy, returned the first of the week from a trip to several places in the state, where they went as the guests and at the expense of the various architects to inspect court houses and other public buildings, in order to in a measure decide the character of building to be erected for the court house in Mills county. They visited and inspected the court houses in Bell, Williamson, Travis, Bexar, DeWitte, Victoria and Cathoun counties. As far as expressions have been heard Williamson county court house at Georgetown came nearer the ideal than any other building inspected.

The commissioners are to meet in special session today to look after some official business and at this meeting some definite action may be taken in the court house matter. It is not at all unlikely that a mass meeting of the citizens of the county will be called by the court to determine what style and priced courthouse will suit the greatest number of citizens. It has been suggested that the court should select a number of representative citizens to go to Georgetown and make an inspection of the building and report their finding and decision before any definite plan is adopted by the court.

Both Mr. Taft and Mr. Roosevelt claim to be certain of the Republican nomination for the presidency, but they are still fighting for all the votes in sight.

The postmaster general has given his hearty approval to a parcel post bill which provides for the delivery of packages to the weight of 11 pounds. The measure has not yet received favorable action by the house and senate.

A charter has been secured by C. W. Post of Battle Creek, Mich., and others, for a cotton mill at Post City, Texas, with a capital stock of \$550,000. The purpose of the corporation is to convert the cotton into the finished products.

A negro uprising in Cuba, which has the support of the Spaniards, caused the United States to send battleships and marines to the relief of the government and to protect the rights of Americans. It is said the negroes desire to secure control of the government of Cuba and fashion it after that of Hayti.

The commissioner of the general land office has his semi-annual list of public free school land ready for distribution. Most of these lands are for sale to actual settlers, but some of the tracts can be purchased without settlement. The lists are free upon application and may be of interest to some of the Eagle readers.

The rumor was started several days ago that Senator Lorimer had decided to resign and end the contest over his election, which has been shown to have been secured by bribery and corruption. He claims to be innocent of any wrong-doing and to have been ignorant of the corrupt methods used in his behalf and it is positively announced that he will not resign from the senate.

The senate report of the investigation of the sinking of the steamship Titanic some weeks ago severely condemns the management and conditions under which the great vessel was allowed to sail among the icebergs without sufficient life boats and without proper precautions for the preservation of life. It proposes legislation requiring better life-saving provisions.

Champ Clark has announced as a candidate for congress in his district in Missouri. He wants to be sure of an office and while he will continue to be a candidate for the Democratic nomination for president, he will hold on to his present job. This is at least unusual, if not unprecedented, for a man to offer for two important offices at one time.

## Fine Crops.

The Eagle editor, in company with Judge Allen, Mr. R. L. Banks, the farm demonstrator, and Mr. Leonard Skeggs, this week inspected some of the crops being grown under the supervision of the demonstrator and some cultivated by the old methods, and the difference shown in these crops certainly looks well for the demonstrator's plan. Not only are the crops cultivated by his method further advanced than those of the old plan, but the plants are more flourishing and show no need for rain. Notwithstanding the long dry spell the ground prepared under direction of the demonstrator is still moist beneath the surface, while the other ground is dry to a considerable depth. Of course, the main test of this method will be in the yield, but the cultivation to retain the moisture is one of the important features of the work and the showing so far certainly argues well for the government's plan of scientific farming if the crops visited this week are to be taken as samples.

**Capt. Cox Dead.**  
Capt. Wm. R. Cox died at his  
home in this city Tuesday after-  
noon at 5 o'clock, after a short  
illness, although his health had  
not been good for several years.  
The announcement of his death  
was a great shock to his friends,  
many of whom had not even  
heard of his illness when the an-  
nouncement was made that he  
was dead.

Capt. Cox was born at Yokum  
Station, Va., July 26, 1836. He  
entered the Confederate army at  
the call of Governor Letcher as  
first lieutenant in company A,  
64th regiment, Virginia volun-  
teers, and served under General  
James A. Walker. He was after-  
ward transferred to the army of  
Tennessee, served under General  
Albert Sydney Johnston, and  
was with General Kirby Smith at  
the battle of Perryville. At the  
close of the war he was with  
General Frazier, who sur-  
rendered his command at Cum-  
berland Gap. At Mulberry Gap,  
Tenn., in March, 1865, he was  
married to Miss Cynthia Pruett,  
who died in 1875. In 1878 he  
was united in marriage to Miss  
Laura Baker, who departed this  
life in 1883.

The following children survive:  
Hon. John J. Cox of San Angelo;  
Will P. Cox, Temple; Charles B.  
and J. F. Cox of Greenville; Mrs.  
Harry L. Turner, Floyd; Mrs.  
Mattie Chapman, Temple; Mrs.  
W. E. Pardue, Goldthwaite; and  
Mrs. Geo. Hill, Montgomery,  
Ala. Capt. Cox came to Texas  
in 1893 and lived in Montague  
and Hunt counties before coming  
to this place, where he has re-  
sided the past twelve years.

His daughters, Mesdames  
Chapman and Pardue and his  
grandson, Shelby Cox, were with  
him when the end came and his  
other children, except Mrs. Hill,  
arrived on the evening train.  
Mrs. Hill and her husband  
started from their home in Mont-  
gomery, Ala., Tuesday, but did  
not reach this city until Thurs-  
day night, too late for the funeral,  
which was held Wednesday after-  
noon, under the auspices of the  
Masonic fraternity.

Capt. Cox was a man of high  
ideals and sound principles and  
none knew him but to be drawn  
to him and admire his character.  
He was charitable, genial and  
kind and had the happy faculty  
of looking on the "bright side."  
He was one of the most loyal  
members of Jeff Davis Camp, U.  
C. V., and was at one time com-  
mander of the camp. A large  
number of the Confederate  
veterans gathered with his other  
friends at the residence and the  
cemetery to pay respect to his  
memory.

**EMPIRE BUILDING**

The Currents of Civilization Flowing Texasward—69,000 Homeseekers and \$123,000,000 of Property Moving Into Texas Annually.

There is no more inspiring scene than to watch the growth of an empire, and no viewpoint is more instructive than to sit by the highway of civilization and watch the currents of progress sweep life and property Texasward.

Along the roadstead of nations there passes annually 69,000 homeseekers and \$123,000,000 of property. **County Center Located.**

The commissioner of the land office has replied to Judge Allen's inquiry, locating the center of Mills county at 550 varas north, 50 1/2 west from the southeast corner of survey No. 2, Hays county school land. This places the center at a point west of Mr. J. W. Allen's home place and on the tract known as the Phil Morris land, about 3 miles and 300 yards northwest of this city.

It is believed that the land office report will settle any controversy as to the location of the county seat, as the gentlemen who appeared before the commissioners court asking that the center of the county be located announced that they would not ask for an election for the location of the county seat, if Goldthwaite was found to be within five miles of the center of the county, as a two-third vote would be required to make the change. The election can still be demanded, however, if those persons who favor a change desire to do so, but as it would put the county to the useless expense of an election it is not likely the demand will be made.

## Court Interviewed.

The members of the commissioners court gave interviews while inspecting the different court houses and in every case they gave the public to understand that Mills county was one of the fore most counties in the state and would build a court house that would reflect credit on the county. While the figures given were a little high, the result will be some good advertising for Mills county.

Following are two of the interviews referred to herein:

Austin, Texas, May 24.—Immediate steps are to be taken for the reconstruction of a new court house for Mills county, according to County Judge S. H. Allen of that county, who with a party of officials of that county, are here getting duplicates of certain records that were destroyed in the fire which burned that court house a short time ago. Judge Allen said that fortunately it was only the records of the tax assessor and surveyor that were destroyed, the deed and other court records were locked in a fireproof vault and escaped destruction.

The new court house, according to Judge Allen, will cost approximately \$100,000, while the one that burned had originally cost only \$40,000. While here the county officials conferred with several of the leading architects of Austin for plans, and before returning home they will visit the new court houses at San Marcos and Georgetown with some of the architects. The party included Judge Allen, County Commissioners M. H. Hines, J. W. Mason, J. B. Rentro and W. H. Nelson and Sheriff E. O. Priddy.

Judge S. H. Allen, accompanied by the commissioners, the sheriff and some other citizens of Mills county, spent a part of today in Cuero inspecting the court house.

The court house of Mills county was burned some time since and these gentlemen are very wisely investigating court houses in this part of the state that they may act wisely in building a new house. They expressed themselves as being delighted with South Texas and with Cuero. Judge Allen wanted to dig up our big well and move it to Goldthwaite, but Owen Priddy, the sheriff, objected on legal grounds, but thought they could use the well to good advantage if they had it.—Cuero Record.

He leaves a heartbroken wife, one son and one daughter and some grandchildren and many other friends to mourn, but not as those who have no hope. They know where to find him. He joined the M. E. church, South, in the year 1887, under the ministry of Rev. R. W. Welborn, who baptized him. It has been my privilege to know Brother Carswell intimately for sixteen years. He was one of the purest Christian men that I have ever known. He praised the Lord at meeting, at home and on the highway. He was ready at all times to give a reason for the hope that was in him. We laid his body to rest in the Payne Gap cemetery to await the morning of the resurrection. A large congregation was present on this occasion. Brother Carswell is not dead, but lives forevermore. "I heard a voice from Heaven saying unto me write: 'Blessed are the dead which die in the Lord, from henceforth. Yes, saith the spirit, that they may rest from their labors.'"
