

**School Tax Authorized.**

The election held here last Saturday to determine whether or not a special tax of 6 cents on \$100 valuation should be levied for school purposes in this district resulted in 96 votes being cast, 80 favorable to the proposition and 16 against it.

This special tax was in addition to the special tax of 25 cents on \$100 valuation already levied on the property in this district, making a total of 31 cents special tax on \$100 property valuation. A sufficient amount of this has to be set apart, however, to create a sinking fund and pay the interest on the outstanding building bonds.

**Commissioners Court.**

There was an extra session of the commissioners court Saturday to transact some important business, such as receiving the treasurer's report and arranging for a legal place for holding county court.

It was decided that the opera house would be the best place for the county court to be held and that place was designated by the commissioners for court purposes.

The lower story of the jail building was designated as the place for posting legal notices of all kinds.

The quarterly report of the county treasurer was examined and approved, as was also the report of the county clerk.

The court will meet in regular session Monday morning.

### County Seat Controversy.

It is understood that some of those who favored an election on the question of moving the county seat from Goldthwaite still insist upon the election being ordered, notwithstanding the fixing of the center of the county within about three miles of this city would make a two-thirds vote necessary to make a change in the location of the county seat. Such election would cost considerable money and would delay the rebuilding of the court house and it is hoped the contention will not be insisted upon when it is known that the commissioner of the general land office is required by law to make the calculation and designate the center of the county and there is no appeal from his ruling. A petition was filed with Judge Allen some time ago, asking for the county election and he has no legal right to refuse to comply with the petition if it is insisted upon. He will go to Mullin today to confer with those who want the election and it is hoped they will abandon the plan, not that Goldthwaite has anything to fear from such election, but because of the unnecessary delay and expense.
