The meeting of the club Monday night was one of the most interesting sessions held in some time.

Secretary Edward Geeslin being absent, E. M. Boon was elected secretary pro tem.

B. F. Geeslin reported from the road committee that work on the Schuster road in the Priddy community had been completed and there was some money left in the road fund.

The arrangements committee for the Fair and Reunion reported progress. A subscription list had been circulated and a considerable sum subscribed for a barbecue on July 25, which will be the last day of the fair.

E. M. Boon was appointed to complete the work of soliciting subscriptions for the barbecue fund.

A number of communications were received from parties desiring to buy concessions on the picnic grounds and the matter was referred to the arrangements committee with full authority to act.

It was decided to invite candidates and others to speak at the time of the barbecue, but no political speaking will be allowed on the grounds July 23 and 24, as it is against the rules of Jeff Davis camp to allow political discussions during the reunion.

The arrangements committee was instructed to notify the advertising committee when advertising for the fair and barbecue should be begun.

The offer of the West Texas Telephone company to furnish bulletins of the primary election on the night of July 27 was accepted with thanks and the president was authorized to make arrangements to receive and display the bulletins.

Col. A. J. Baker, a prominent banker of San Angelo and at one time land commissioner of Texas, died at Los Angeles, Cal., a few days ago and his remains will be shipped to San Angelo for burial. Col. Baker had announced his candidacy for vice president of the United States on the Democratic ticket and some of the counties in Texas instructed for him.

There need be no uneasiness among those who have brought themselves to believe that Bryan and Roosevelt will jointly head a new political party. They may eventually each head a new party, but neither would be willing to "play second fiddle", consequently a party headed by the two men is out of the question. Besides, they both know that political parties are bigger than politicians and there is not a man alive today who could lead a new political party to victory by his own personality. A party to receive the support of the great mass of thinking people must stand for principles and not men.

The severe drouth last year should teach the importance of plenty of good stock water. When ponds, lakes and creeks are dry and the pasture has not water for the animals, the stockman is under the necessity of hauling stock water or driving the animals to water. Either of these contingencies is unfortunate and causes considerable expense, not to mention the loss in flesh of the animals as a result of insufficient water. There is no improvement on the farm more desirable than a sufficient water supply. The manager cannot afford to take chances of a failure caused by a few weeks' drouth. This might take his time when it was most needed in the crops. While the water supply is of paramount importance, the manner in which it is given the animals should not be overlooked. If the source be a deep well, it must be easily and cheaply drawn; if a lake, pond or creek be the source, the pasture fences must be arranged so that the animals may have access to the water. Pumps with engine or windmill power are not expensive; they save an enormous amount of labor; they reduce the necessity of suffering animals and insure an abundant supply when it is needed.—Farm and Ranch.

Texas' experience of the past few years with the destruction of public buildings merely accentuates a fact that should have been considered long ago, namely: Public buildings should be built for permanence. There is nothing ephemeral about the state of Texas. It will, like the brook, go on forever. Why, then, have our various state administrations, without exception, been guilty of erecting state buildings as if they were to be used only for a few years? Outside the state capitol, we believe there is not completed a single state building in which the idea of permanence came first. The various colleges and elementary buildings are, as a rule, contracted on the plan of getting the most space for the least money.—Denton Record and Chronicle.

The same argument will apply to the building of court houses and other public buildings by counties and the commissioners of this county should, and the Eagle believes will, recognize the fact that Mills county will never diminish and will always have need for a first class, substantial and fire-proof building for a court house.

The Democratic national convention in Baltimore is the center of interest just now and people of all political faiths are watching the proceedings of the convention that is to furnish to the nation its next president. Wm. J. Bryan is the most prominent man in the convention and his movements and words are given more attention than any of the candidates for the presidential nomination, notwithstanding he lost the fight to prevent Judge Alton B. Parker being made the temporary chairman of the convention. He was offered the chairmanship of the platform committee but refused the honor and Senator Kern of Indiana was given the place. During the contest over the temporary chairmanship Cone Johnson of Texas made a speech that brought forth such tremendous and prolonged applause that there was danger for a time that the convention would have to be adjourned. They have been having a strenuous time every minute since the gavel fell and there was an all night session Thursday night, when nominating speeches were being made. On the first ballot Governor Harmon received the largest number of votes of any candidate.

If we were commissioned to write over the doors of the homes of the American people what we consider to be the chief cause of the misery and unhappiness that is sweeping men and women into the vortex of ruin and premature decay, it would consist of one simple word—thoughtlessness; simple in its construction; but far-reaching in its meaning and its results. Very few people willfully and wantonly say things or commit acts calculated to offend or injure, and oftentimes what is intended as an evidence of good fellowship, a friendly regard, is taken as a shaft aimed from the bow of evil intent. Thoughtlessness upon the one and a misunderstanding upon the other proves the reef upon which the years of confidence, esteem and friendship is wrecked.—Denton Herald.

In the center is a boiling lake of acid-charged water, covering fifty acres and surrounded with blow holes from which steam and sulphurous fumes are emitted with great force and noise. With care a boat can be navigated on the lake.—Exchange.

The circulation of subscription lists among the candidates for office in Harris county have become so burdensome that the candidates appealed to the county executive committee for relief.
