Commercial Club.

The meeting of the Commercial club Monday night was devoted largely to the discussion of plans and arrangements for the forthcoming fair and reunion.

The arrangements committee announced that plans were all made for the apportioning of the grounds to those who bought rights and for other purposes. The committee was confident that all would be in readiness for the big event, which starts next Tuesday morning.

The committee appointed to solicit premiums reported good success and a very satisfactory list of premiums.

The arrangements committee was authorized to employ a night watchman and a marshal of the day to remain on the grounds for the three days and night of the fair and reunion.

It was announced that the baseball grounds had been arranged at the south end of the park and that a number of games had been matched for Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday of next week.

The committee to secure speakers announced progress. While a sufficient number of speakers had not been secured, a large number of invitations had been sent out and the committee was confident of enough good speakers to fill the time allotted for speaking.

It was agreed that the local candidates should all be given an opportunity to speak Thursday night, July 25.

The secretary was instructed to issue invitations to the Commercial clubs at Mullin, Star and Indian Gap to attend the barbecue and reunion.

The club meeting was interesting throughout and business men who failed to attend this meeting have reason for regret.

It will be seen from the advertisement of the Methodist church services, published in this issue, that the pastor invites men to come to church without their coats, if they so desire. 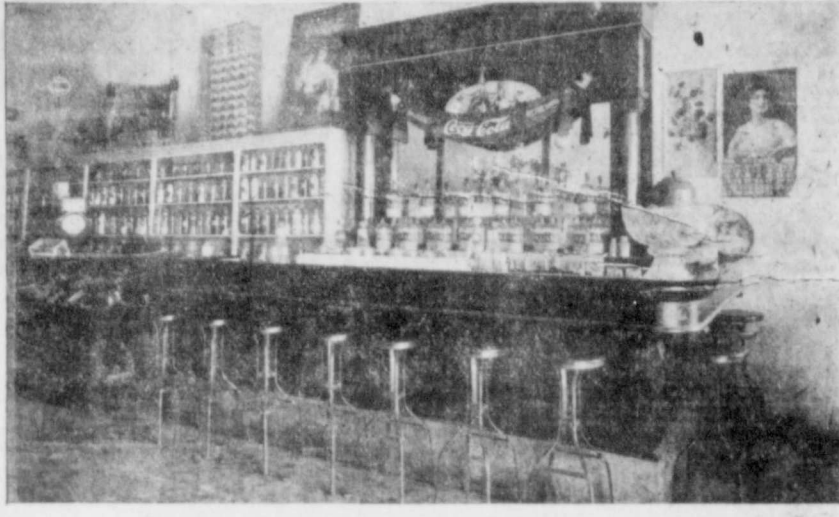

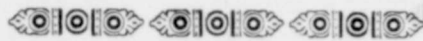
