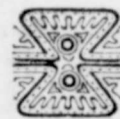

THINGS IN GENERAL.

Over \$60,000 will be expended in farm demonstration work in west Texas this year. The federal government appropriated \$27,000 and the balance was set aside by county commissioners courts.

There are 275 boys and girls clubs with a total enrollment of 14,000 members in Texas. These clubs raise farm products under government instructions and \$30,000 in prizes were offered this year for best specimens.

A franchise has been granted to a number of east Texas capitalists for the construction of an interurban to connect Austin and Lockhart. Actual construction must start within six months, according to the franchise, but it is expected that work will start at once.

The Texas sky line was never brighter or more full of promise than at the present time. The passion for results was never stronger than at this hour. The desire for progress was never so overpowering as it is today. As the sun of the 33rd legislature approaches the eastern horizon and dissipates clouds of distrust, the thought life of the state bursts into a new world. The Texas Welfare commission which has just closed its labors has pushed the state forward a hundred years; patriotism and common sense pulse through their recommendations and many politicians who have been spinning whifflings over the graves of our illustrious dead have pinned under the timbers of fallen ideas; others more sagacious have sniffed public sentiment and found it red hot, those who possess a streak of genius have already adapted themselves to a higher order of civilization. The Texas sky line blossoms with prosperity.

The Texas County Farm Demonstrators representing the federal agricultural department have just closed a session at Fort Worth. Dr. Bradford Knapp, special agent in

charge of farmers' demonstration and co-operative work; Elbert Gentry, field agent for Texas and Oklahoma, and Isaac W. Hill, special agent of boys and girls demonstration work, were among the Washington officials of note who addressed the meeting. There were fifty-three county farm demonstrators present and they were in session four days. They study the problems of the farmer; the adaptability of crops to soil and climate; the conservation of moisture and better farm methods. These evangelists of prosperity are spending their lives in putting intelligence behind the plow and they police our crops from the ravages of pests. Uncle Sam is the farmer's best friend.

The mines of Texas produced approximately \$2,110,375 in oil and minerals during September, an increase over the preceding month of \$264,375, or 14.2 per cent. There were 90,000 tons of coal mined as against 60,000 tons in August. The oil production was approximately 1,400,000 barrels, an increase of 312,500 barrels, or 3 per cent. The Electra fields report an average daily production of 14,163 barrels and a total output for the month of 424,890 barrels. This is an increase over the preceding month of 24,339 barrels. The largest producer during September was the Producers' Company with a total of 198,000 barrels. The Corsicana Company reports an output of 165,000 barrels, while the Guffey Company, which did not figure in the August production, shows a total output of 27,000 barrels. The Petrolia fields report a total output for the month of 20,100 barrels, the daily production being 670 barrels.—Commercial Secretaries.

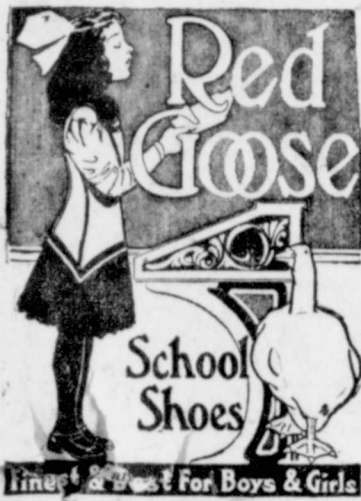

The Dallas fair opened last Saturday and the attendance on Sunday was much larger than the attendance on the first Sunday last year.

Because of the continued drouth the San Gabriel river at Georgetown became dry and the water from the Old Settlers lake was turned into the river Saturday, to be run to a reservoir for the city.

The mutiny among the prisoners in Wyoming penitentiary at Rawlins, after the escape of several convicts, necessitated the forming of a posse to guard the jail while others scoured the country for the escaped criminals.

The fact that John Mitchell, vice president of the American federation of labor, would speak in Dallas Sunday attracted an immense crowd to that city. Labor leaders were there from all parts of the state and the speech was said to be interesting to all classes.

In the trial of Alex Johnson at Waco, chagrined with killing his employer, A. P. Duncan, in that city some months ago, he was found guilty of murder in the second degree and given five years in the penitentiary. Johnson was a travel agent and frequently visited Goldthwaite.

A circuit judge in Georgia wrote a newspaper article criticising the court of appeals of that state for reversing one of his rulings. He was cited to answer a charge of contempt of court and his lawyer dropped out in the court room immediately after making an argument of the case. The court fined him \$500 or ten days in jail.

The cold blooded proceedings of the criminals in New York, under directions of a police lieutenant, is being revealed in the trial of the police officer on the charge of having the gambler, Rosenthal, murdered. The evidence is that there is a band of these criminals who rob people at will and demand large sums of graft money from people in many vocations.

An assassin attempted the life of Col. Roosevelt at Milwaukee, Wis., Monday night, and but for the fact that a bundle of papers in Col. Roosevelt's inner pocket was in the way of the bullet and the further fact that the would-be murderer was seized by one of the members of the Roosevelt party a most deplorable tragedy would have been enacted. The Roosevelt party was just leaving their hotel en route to the hall where Col. Roosevelt was to speak when a villain flashed a revolver and fired point blank at his intended victim before his murderous play was suspected. Col. Roosevelt proceeded to the hall and delivered his speech, notwithstanding the fact that he was bleeding from the wound made by the bullet, which struck him in the breast.

Robert Burdette, in a talk to young men, said: "Get away from the crowd for a while, and think. Stand on one side and let the world run by, while you get acquainted with yourself and see what kind of fellow you are. Ask yourself hard questions about yourself. Ascertain, from original sources, if you are really the manner of man you say you are; and if you are always honest; if you always tell the square, perfect truth in business details; if your life is good and upright at eleven o'clock at night as it is at noon; if you are as good when you go to the city as you are at home; if, in short, you are really the sort of man your father hopes you are and your sweetheart believes you are. Get on intimate terms with yourself, my boy, and believe me, every time you come out of one of these private interviews you will be a stronger, better, purer man. Don't forget this and it will do you good."
