COMPULSORY EDUCATION.

The Texas Federation of Women's Clubs has inaugurated a campaign for compulsory education in this state. The federation has sent out the following bulletin on the subject:

Forty-two states of the Union have Compulsory Education.

Alabama, Florida, Georgia, Louisiana, Mississippi, South Carolina and Texas have not compulsory education. In the United States there are 5,516,693 illiterates 10 years of age and over.

2,022,599 or nearly one-half live in these seven states.

There are 3,184,953 illiterate whites 10 years of age and over in the United States.

522,207, or more than one-sixth of them live in these seven states.

Germany, France, England, Scotland, Austria, Hungary, Italy, Norway, Sweden, Denmark, Switzerland, Japan, British Columbia, New Zealand, Prince Edward Island, Tasmania, Queensland, South Australia, and Canada have compulsory education.

Russia, Spain and Turkey do not have compulsory education.

More than 80 per cent of the enlightened people of the world live in these compulsory education states and countries.

No country that has ever had compulsory education laws has ever repealed them.

In the United States some states have had compulsory education for 50 years.

Such laws once enacted have never been repealed in a single state in the Union.

Arkansas enacted a compulsory education law in 1909, limited in extent. In 1911 the laws were extended over a larger section of the state.

In Arkansas nearly one-half the population ten years of age and over is negroes.

In Texas only about one-fifth the population ten years and over is negroes.

In Arkansas in ten years, illiter-

acy has decreased from 29.4 per cent to 12.6 per cent.

In Texas in ten years, illiteracy has decreased from 14.5 per cent to 9.9 per cent only, while the number of illiterate whites has increased.

If Arkansas, with nearly one-half of her population ten years of age and over negroes, has found compulsory education practicable, why should Texas, with only about one-fifth negroes, find compulsory education too expensive on account of "the large negro population?"

PREACHERS PLACED.

The Methodist annual conference for the West Texas district was held at Beeville and the following appointments were made for the next conference year:

Rev. F. M. Jackson was sent to South Heights, San Antonio, and Rev. R. S. Pierce, late of El Campo, was sent to Goldthwaite. Rev. J. W. Cowan, who has been pastor at Lampasas, was made presiding elder of this district and Rev. J. D. Scott was stationed at Elgin. Rev. R. D. Moon was changed from Mullin to Kempner and Rev. J. H. Clark was sent to Mullin. Rev. W. B. Moon was given a supernumerary relation and Rev. J. T. H. Miller was sent to Lometa. Rev. R. L. McIntyre was given charge of the new Star circuit and Rev. R. R. Randles was sent to the Center City circuit. Rev. L. W. Walker, who has had charge of the work of the Goldthwaite circuit, was sent to Lytton Springs circuit, in the San Marcos district. Rev. J. S. Bowles was changed from Cuero to Midland, Rev. N. G. Ozment was returned to Marble Falls and Rev. H. E. Draper was returned to San Saba. Other appointments in which Mills county people may be interested are: R. P. Schuler, formerly of Temple, transferred to this conference and given charge of the University church at Austin, Rev. Theophilus Lee, Lockhart.

SYNOPSIS OF GAME LAWS.

Sportsmen are looking forward with joyful anticipation of the arrival of November first, which date marks the opening of the hunting season for all game protected by law.

A synopsis of the new game laws of Texas are published below:

Deer—November 1st. to January 1st Limit three bucks for season; unlawful to kill does or fawns.

Turkey—December 1st. to April 1st. Limit three turkeys for the season.

Quail and Doves—November 1st to February 1st. Limit twenty-five birds in any one day.

Prairie Chicken—Season closed until 1917.

Open season—Ducks, geese, snipe, plover, robins, curlews all the year. Limit twenty-five birds one day.

Not protected—Rabbit, opossum, coon, bear.

You may ship or transport to your home such game as you have lawfully killed, by making proper affidavit.

You must not buy or sell any wild game or game birds at any time.

You may kill hawks, buzzards and blackbirds at any time.

Resident license is required of party shooting outside county adjoining one in which he lives. Resident license \$1.75.

Non-residents unless a bona fide inhabitant of, and resident citizen of this state, for six months last past, must take out a non-resident license costing \$15.00.

Three days' consecutive kill of ducks, twenty-five each day, total seventy-five ducks, may be shipped or transported on train when party killing same accompanies shipment and has made the required affidavit.

Possession at any time of the year during which game birds are protected shall be prima facie evidence of the guilt of the person in possession thereof.

A days' bag must not contain more than twenty-five birds, either mixed or of one kind.

One of the Texas railroads makes the following statement in its literature. "It is estimated that the Texas cotton crop occupies about 10,000,000 acres, while the cotton factories of England will not cover over 10 square miles of ground, and yet the Englishman makes twice as much out of the staple as the Texan. It is said that if only 25 per cent of the crop in this state was manufactured, it would mean \$100,000,000 in added value. If each cotton grower would give the tenth bale each year for ten years, with a like amount from cities, towns and railroads, the state would soon be full of cotton mills and ahead of any state or country in the manufacture of her raw cotton." There has been a great deal of talk for years about having mills to manufacture our cotton, but in the actual securing of the factories there seems to be a nigger in the woodpile somewhere. According to the above extract the railroads certainly favor the home manufacture of cotton. Whatever the hindrance may be in securing the mills, a state committee should be appointed to inquire into the matter to find where the trouble lies and endeavor to remedy it and then go after the business. If not, the state should quit talking about cotton mills and give up the idea. If the difficulty lies in a ten per cent rate of investment money or any other remedial trouble, the Texas Farm Life Bureau of the Commercial Secretaries Association will work out the solution of the problem.—Commercial Secretaries.

Newspaper men especially regret exceedingly the accident that befell Col. R. E. Yantis of Athens, who fell down an elevator shaft in the Landon hotel in San Angelo Monday morning and was dangerously injured. Col. Yantis is ex-president of the press association and stands high in the estimation of the newspaper workers of the state.

CONTRACT AWARDED

Work On New Court House To Begin At Once.

The commissioners court was in session Monday and Tuesday for the purpose of receiving bids and awarding the contract for building the new court house. There were a number of bidders, but Gordon, Jones & Co. of San Antonio secured the contract being approximately \$1200 lower in their price than the next lowest bidder. The contract price is \$68,031.10 and the work is to begin in ten days from the date of the signing of the contract, but in reality it was commenced Thursday morning. This amount is for the completed building, including plumbing, wiring, etc.

The building is to be of brick and concrete, reinforced with steel and will be absolutely fire proof. The basement floor is to be six feet beneath the surface of the ground and there are to be three stories above the basement.

The contractors appear willing to give the Mills county labor the preference in the work and a number of workmen were employed by P. M. Gordon, who was here the first of the week. W. N. Sullivan secured the contract for making the excavation for the basement and he commenced the work Thursday. He also secured the contract for furnishing rock and some other supplies.

The time allowed for the completion of the building is 240 days, but the contractors expect to have the building finished in much less time and Mills county will have one of the best buildings in Texas for the price, if the estimates of people who are familiar with such work can be taken as correct.

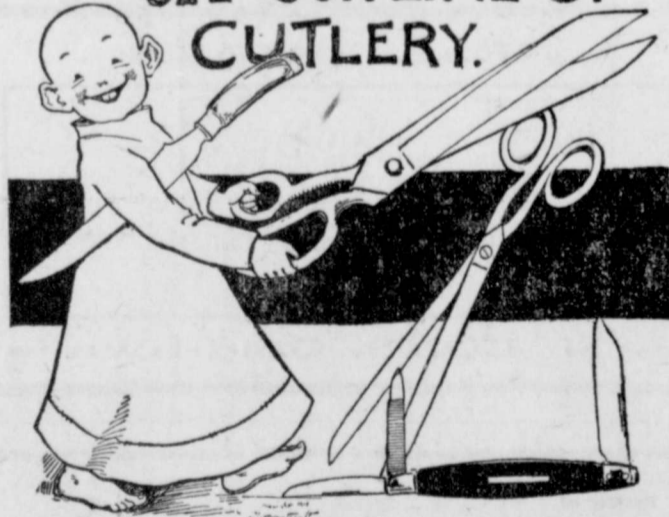

The election takes place next Tuesday and Democrats all over the nation are looking forward with hopes of great victory for Wilson and Marshall.

Three men robbed the southbound limited express train on the M. K. & T. road near Crowder, Okla., Monday night. The robbery was committed in the usual way, the train being forced to run the engine and express car some distance from the remainder of the train and the safe was dynamited. It is believed that a large amount of money was secured.

The overthrow of the Diaz revolution in Mexico last week was accomplished through treachery. He trusted men who claimed to be in sympathy with him and the result proved his undoing. Had he ordered his soldiers to fire upon the traitors before he was overpowered he would have been considered a general of ability, whereas, he is now a condemned prisoner, convicted and sentenced to be shot.

Many people who have read the evidence against Police Lieutenant Becker in New York have serious doubts as to his guilt, but if it was a "frame up" on the part of the crooks with whom he had been associated, they arranged every detail so perfectly that it is not likely that he will escape the electric chair, although he professes to believe that he will yet be exonerated. Becker was sentenced this week and will spend the intervening time in the "death house" at Sing Sing prison.

The suspended sentence act of the last legislature is held to be unconstitutional, by the higher courts. The act provided that a district judge could suspend sentence in a conviction, where the act was a first offense, and could parole the convicted one, the leniency amounting to a pardon where good conduct should follow. The ground of the higher court opinion was that the pardoning power lies in the governor of the state, and that the legislature could not delegate such power to district judges.—Temple Telegram.

A clerk in the Alvin postoffice was arrested last Saturday on complaint of a postoffice inspector on a charge of stealing a 2-cent stamp from a letter passing through the Alvin office. The affair on its face appears to be a very small offense, but the very smallness of it makes it more aggravating. To remove a stamp from a letter was such a little thing to steal that it really looks more like a desire to commit theft than to possess the value. If the man is guilty he should be punished, for while the value of the stamp was small, loss of great proportions might have resulted to the citizen who affixed sufficient postage on his mail to insure its delivery.

If any heritage is precious to the American people, it is that of our public school system and higher and technical education. In some respects Texas has excelled in value of methods and support of schools, but in many other ways the state is below the average, according to a table issued by the Conference for Education in Texas, comparing Texas with twenty-one other states. This should not be so, as general and technical education combined is generally considered the truest and best barometer, denoting or marking the progress of a section or a people. The highest record should represent the most advanced progress, providing the moral plane is at the same time high. The above being true, Texas voters should be careful to support those measures of all or any party which will represent the greatest advance of education in this state. Party affiliations should not interfere with educational progress in the mind of any true Texan, for that is one thing that should be above politics, which only stand for party interests.—Commercial Secretaries.

NEIGHBORING NEWS.

Items Culled From the Leading Local Papers.

BROWNWOOD

Jack Coggin is here from El Paso for a visit with home folks. Jack says the war troubles in Mexico have a tendency to interfere with business affairs, but that he is hoping for some lively trading at an early date.

"Uncle George" Cox, one of the best known citizens of the Blanket country, was adjudged insane on last Wednesday and brought to Brownwood Sunday, where he is now confined in the jail, to await a place in the asylum at Austin.

S. J. Dowty, an old and highly respected citizen of the town, died yesterday afternoon at his home on Vine street following an attack of apoplexy. Mr. Dowty was out in the yard when he was stricken and rendered unconscious and he never regained consciousness.

On August 28 there was an order issued by the postal department changing the mail route for the Cross Cut country to a rural route from Cross Plains, but a strenuous kick was registered from Brownwood and the Cross Cut people which caused the department to revoke the order of that date and issue one calling for the mail to be furnished that section out of May as has been the plan heretofore.—Bulletin.

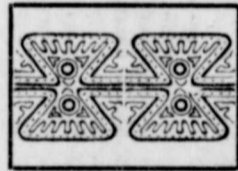
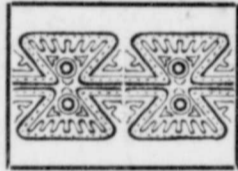

STATEMENT OF FACTS

Usually gross misrepresentations are best treated with silent contempt. We believe, however, that the true facts with reference to the charges of graft recently made against our court house architect and O. L. Hitchcock of Dallas and Judge Allen, should be placed before the people.

As to Mr. Hitchcock's character, we know comparatively nothing, and have made no investigation in regard thereto as he is in no way connected with our building. As to the architect's character, we have made investigation, and have ascertained from what we consider reliable sources, that no man stands higher as an architect than does he, and that his integrity and honesty have never been brought in question among the people who know him. As to Judge Allen, we will state that unsigned letters were received by two members of the court, intimating that he was guilty of improper conduct. We, at the request of Judge Allen and the architect, made a thorough investigation into the charge, and found from the evidence that the charges were probably made by a rival architect, who hoped thereby to get the county architect discharged, and his own designs of a court house accepted, and all of the above named parties discredited. This party appeared in Goldthwaite in response to a telegram sent by Mr. Hines at the dictation and request of Judge Allen and the architect, and brought with him (we are reliably informed) new plans and specifications for a court house, although not requested to do so, and although requested by three members of the commissioners court, and others, to come before the court and substantiate his charges, declined to do so, and disclaimed any knowledge of any improper conduct. We concluded from our investigation that the charges were absolutely false, and maliciously so, and gave them no further consideration. We further desire to state, in justice to Judge Allen, that he has incurred considerable expense and performed considerable unselfish labor in trying to protect the interests of the county in the matter of the building of the court house. We make the foregoing statement in the hopes that it will set these unfounded rumors at rest by giving the people the benefit of the facts in the case, and in justice to Judge Allen, whose conduct has been brought in question.
